

HONOLULU BOYS BEAT SILVERTOWN

It was rather a crippled crowd from the cable steamer Silvertown that went up against the Honolulu team in the game of association football at the Makiki grounds yesterday afternoon. At that, they put up a good game considering that the men were out of practice and that they were necessarily weak in team play. Honolulu began the trouble with a rush in the first half, putting the ball close to the Silvertown goal in the first few minutes of play. They did not score, nevertheless, for some little time in that half, the sailors rallying and putting up a long, hard fight to save their station. They even carried the ball well into the enemy's country, but Honolulu was too strong for them and scored about the middle of the half.

It was one to nothing when time was called, and so it staid well into the second half. Then, when Silvertown seemed about to score they lost on a foul, and Honolulu carried the ball clear across the field to goal and did the same thing. However, the city men got two in this half and Silvertown made one by a strong rally about the middle of the half. Just at the end Honolulu got the ball through the sticks despite the gallant defense made by the cable men, and that was the end of it. The score was 3 to 1. The line-up of the teams was as follows:

Silvertowns:—Goal, Dixon; backs, Welch and Bumpus; halves, Cakebread, Barker, Sangster, and Lumsden; forwards, Rutter, Jones, Butchard, Hills, Goodun and Wade.

MONUMENT FOR ETTA FRIEL

A beautiful monument of Italian marble, mounted on a base of Hawaiian stone, which now rests in the yard of J. C. Axtell on Alakea street, is to be placed next week over the grave of Etta Friel, the young school girl who was burned to death in the fire of November 1, 1902, which destroyed the home of Mr. Friel and caused the death of his wife and two daughters. The following inscription is graven on the face of the finely carved stone:

"To Etta Friel, Aged 15 years, This Stone is Erected by Many Loving Little Friends."

The money for the stone was contributed by school children and young friends of the unfortunate victim of the fire, Drs. Herbert, Humphris and Walters and Frank Hoogs acting in the capacity of treasurers of the fund.

Mrs. Rebekah Kahaawinaupu, a member of Kawaiahao church, died last Sunday and her cremated remains are to be laid in Kawaiahao cemetery after ceremonies in the church at 1 p. m. next Sunday.

Thilie Williams has sued Frank J. Williams for divorce alleging non-support. Williams accepted service immediately and consents to trial. He denies the allegations in the complaint excepting as to his marriage.

C. Winam, a former prominent Chinese merchant, was injured Wednesday near Heela, Koolau, in a collision with an excavator drawn by two mules. Winam's foot was somewhat hurt and his carriage was badly damaged.

August Richardt, a German, residing near the Brewery on Queen street, was arrested last evening by special officers Garcia and Chun Poon, for selling liquor without a license. As evidence the officers secured a bottle of beer and one of wine, from which the two officers had been served with drinks.

A telegram received yesterday from Lahaina gave the information that Wise, Colburn and Richardson, the three men arrested on a charge of malicious mischief on Lanai, had been acquitted. The defendants were alleged to have killed cattle which were the subject of litigation and under the protection of the court.

H. Hackfeld & Co., Washington Mercantile Co. and Hymán Bros. yesterday filed a petition in involuntary bankruptcy against the Wing Sing Lung Co. The claims amount to nearly \$2,000 and the alleged bankrupt is said to have admitted his insolvency. Judge Estece issued a restraining order to prevent High Sheriff Brown from enforcing district court judgments obtained by David Lawrence & Co., and H. P. Eakin and C. C. Eakin.

The resignation of both Dole and Cathcart will leave the Territory in bad shape in regard to the numerous embezzlement cases which are to come up for trial at the next term of court. Cathcart had the Boyd and Wright cases directly in his charge and his resignation will make necessary the early appointment of a successor or the engagement of special counsel to prosecute. Douthitt is now in Hilo and is not expected to finish the criminal work there for several months.
