BERRY'S COMMERCIAL REPORT

The semi-monthly report of Berry's Commercial Agency, issued under date of February 16, has the following to say concerning the business situation:

Business men all along the line say that "times are about the same." The real problem in commercial circles is to get in the money. Several remark that it is no trouble at all to dispose of goods, but that when it comes to making collections the discouraging stage is reached. Still all are hopeful for the future. Almost any man will declare that prospects as a whole are brighter, but will add that the great weakness is the scarcity of ready money and that the wait for a change is becoming burdensome.

Very largely through the exertions of Hon. George R. Carter at this end, the million dollars for the fire claims is practically on the way from Washington. The arrangement now is for a special agent to come on from Washington with the coin and superintend the disbursement of it here. Local men of means have expressed a willingness to take care of the half million of bonds authorized by Congress. It is a curious fact that this issue was offered in the East but was not looked upon with favor on account of the low rate of interest. No objection of this sort is made by the Honolulu capitalists and the fact that the whole amount of the loan is so readily offered locally shows the great financial possibilities of the community. Money is always brought out here when the demand for it becomes pressing and is partly on the basis of the credit or benefit of the Territory as a whole.

The market for sugar plantation shares shows improvement. There is a steady advance for nearly all the securities. Demand continues strong for Ewa, Pioneer, Oahu, Hawaiian Sugar, and several others. That Honolulu continues to control with the stocks that are listed at San Francisco is shown by transactions made here entirely without regard to quotations on the Coast. The tail-enders in the dealing here are Olaa and McBryde, and friends of these enterprises declare that both properties are in most promising condition and that the outlook at each place is certainly favorable enough to warrant the stocks standing several points better than they do. Olaa particularly is now free from financial bother, while McBryde is entirely within conservative bounds. Capitalist Pond has been visiting plantations on Maui and likes the appearance of the properties. There are a number of men of means here quietly looking into properties with the view of purchasing heavily unless the "bulls" spoil the market. Mr. Edward Pollitz still remains in the Islands. He says he is simply posting himself in the interests of his clients at San Francisco and in the East. There have been reports that Mr. Pollitz was called down on his present trip by proposals to merge Kihai with neighboring plantations on Maui. This plan has been figured down to detail, but there is nothing settled yet. Kihai's friends declare that this property will continue to stand alone.

The First National Bank of this city, on behalf of the Treasury Department at Washington, is pushing on with the redemption of Hawaiian coinage and should finish the task in a few months now. Large shipments of United States silver are being received by steamer frequently and as readily exchanged for the Hawaiian coin. In a few months the Kalakaua money of 1885 will be scarce. Large numbers of the coins will doubtless be reserved for jewelry.

A good stroke has fallen to the Island of Hawaii by the Kona-Kau Railway project reaching a solid basis. Mr. Cooper, who worked hard and intelligently as the promoter, has disposed of his interest to Wilson, Lyons & Co., of San Francisco, the well known Pacific Coast railway contractors. Members of this firm say that the railway will be constructed and put into operation without delay. The survey covers a rich country capable of furnishing a paying traffic. This railway promises to be a factor of the first importance in the development of the big rich Island. Another good thing for Hawaii is the favorable attitude of Congress towards the coffee industry in the proposal to pay a bounty on the Island product. This is such a stimulant that plans have already been made for the marketing of almost the whole of the large Hamakua crop in the United States, with St. Louis as the distributing point. The Hawaiian St. Louis Exposition Company, by the way, will ask the legislature for \$50,000 for building, etc., and it is expected that the means will be forthcoming.

The United States Court of Appeals at San Francisco has upheld the decision of Judge Estee that the Hawaiian income tax is a legal one and must be paid. This will be quite a little help to the Territorial Treasury. It seems certain, however, that the incoming Legislature will repeal the income tax law, as the levy is very unpopular and there exists a well settled opinion that property taxes are heavy enough, without adding any burdens that can be avoided.

It is the vote of the Merchants Association that the license feature of the new county bill should be thrown out. The expression of this body against license for merchandising was somewhat of a surprise. It is understood that the chief influence bearing on the conclusion is the recent fierce competition of the Coast agencies conducted so inexpensively in the city. The local merchants feel that their expense should be kept to the lowest possible figure.

The Legislature meets this week and it is confidently expected that both houses will get down to business without delay and that the results will be beneficial to all. There is an enormous lot of work to do, and much of it requires for proper performance business and political judgment of the highest order. Many caucuses have been held by the majority wing and several matters are already decided upon.

Mr. Levinston is opening up a new haberdasher store in the Young building. Isaac Noar, the Star block man, is still in the courts over the property. Colonel Will E. Fisher has given up the auction business and is agent for the Magoon and other sale and rental properties, with offices in the Magoon block. Dr. Sloggett is going out to China to take charge of the affairs of the Oriental Insurance Company, a Honolulu corporation. B. Griggs Holt, of the McCabe, Hamilton & Rennie stevedoring business, has been appointed shipping commissioner here, vice W. Porter Boyd, resigned. Dr. William C. Wile, of Danbury, Conn., who lectured at the Opera House on the Ober-Ammergau Passion Play, will take a Hawaiian lecture back to the States and will give the Islands good advertisement. It is now pretty well settled that the Odd Fellows will put up a three story structure on their own town property. L. E. Pinham, formerly manager, has retired from the Pacific Hardware Company and is succeeded by I. S. Dillingham. The Rapid Transit Company opened up its Waikiki line on the 1st inst., and has done an enormous business. The Union Express Company business has been taken over by E. Peck & Co., the pioneer draymen.
