FRIEND OF AMERICANS IS SALVADORAN PRESIDENT

**Gets Seat Peacefully--Delaware Elects Senators.
Roosevelt and Negro Problem--Rebels
Threaten Venezuelan Capital.**

SAN SALVADOR, March 2.—President Escalon has been inaugurated without any disturbance. This is the first peaceful transfer of the office of President during the past fifty years. There is general public rejoicing over the event.

The peaceful election of Escalon is of considerable interest to American merchants who hold extensive coffee interests in Salvador. In electing their presidents the people of Salvador are not moved by party spirit but vote for the man who, in their individual opinions, is most qualified to hold office. Pedro Escalon is popular with all classes and particularly with American planters and American merchants in Salvador. He is a wealthy merchant. He was educated in Boston and his children are being educated in San Francisco. In the election he was opposed by Dr. Reyes, Thomas Regalado, the late president of the Republic, and practically a dictator, refused to run for the office this time and of late has been on the Guatemalan frontier fighting Salvadoran rebels.

AFTERNOON DISPATCHES FROM ASSOCIATED PRESS

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 2.—Brazil is seeking the intervention of the United States for the protection of her demands on Venezuela. The government declines to interfere at present.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 2.—Several of the Powers have made a demand that French be the official language of The Hague tribunal. The arbitration protocols have been changed accordingly.

CARACAS, Venezuela, March 2.—Eight thousand revolutionists are mobilizing near here for an attack on the city. The government is making preparations to meet them, and an important battle is expected.

PITTSBURG, March 2.—Tributaries of the Ohio river are flooded and overflowing, causing fatalities and great damage. Forty thousand persons have been thrown out of employment as a result of the damage caused by the floods.

DOVER, Delaware, March 2.—Frank Alee, Union Republican Congressman, and Ball, Republican, have been chosen Senators from Delaware. This gives the state a complete representation, which it has not had since Addicks began his long fight for a senatorship and succeeded in bringing about a deadlock.

WASHINGTON D. C., March 2.—President Roosevelt has issued his proclamation calling for an extraordinary session to convene on March 5, the day following the end of the present congress. This has been expected for some time in view of the President's determination to force the ratification of the Cuban and Panama treaties.

ATLANTA, Ga., March 2.—A letter has been made public by Clark Howell in which President Roosevelt's attitude in the matter of appointment of negroes to office in the South is defined. The letter states the President's views to be that the negroes should be appointed on a basis of character and capabilities and that race or color should not be a factor in the matter at all.

OFFICIAL AND COM- MERCIAL RECORD

Journal of Notices for Business
Men Issued and
Makes Gift.

The first issue of the Official and Commercial Record was distributed yesterday, and the new candidate for popular favor has met with most agreeable comment from those who are interested in its field.

The new paper, which is issued by the Gazette Company, is of four pages, set in clear, bright type and giving at once a business-like and impressive appearance. There is nothing frivolous about the Record, for it wastes no time in telling how good and great it is or will be; but gets down to business from the word go.

The first column holds official notices under the "By Authority" head, containing calls for tenders and notices to the people. Sheriff's sales follow, as of prime importance, and then several columns are devoted to what are technically known as Court notices. These are of probate and guardianship, and matters connected with the judicial department of the government. Notices of intention to foreclose and sell to creditors and by administrators complete the legal features of the Record.

One page of the new paper is occupied with the notices of corporations, both as to the dates for holding meetings and the listing of the officers chosen for the ensuing year. Lost share certificates and dividend notices fill out the page.
