AMPHITRITE CAPTURED

Cruiser Surrendered to Army of Four Thousand.

Without the firing of a shot the British cruiser Amphitrite was surrendered at 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon to the people of Honolulu. A prize crew of about 4,000 men, women, and children, comprising Americans, Europeans, Chinese, Japanese, Koreans, Polynesians, Africans and South Americans held the ship until about 6 p. m., when the vessel was quietly retaken by the officers and crew of the cruiser and all evidences of the visitation obliterated. The victory for the Honoluluans lasted only five hours, but in that time the prize crew had every opportunity to inspect the ship from keelson to truck, and from her steel ram to the cool gallery overhanging the stern. It was apparently a bloodless affair, no casualties being reported from either side. A small party went aboard the big cruiser a short time in advance of the main body of the assaulting force, with Colonel Sam Parker, Prince Kawananakoa, Prince Kalaniana'ole and Colonel Somers Vine in the van. The initial party met with no opposition to their boarding the vessel. Captain Windham of the Amphitrite and several of his officers were at the head of the gangway and received the vanguard with all the pomp and display in vogue in the navy. The vanguard was conducted at once to the captain's quarters, where the capitulation was completed. Sir Somers Vine wore his uniform as an officer of the City of London Fusiliers. When the signal was given for the main body to come aboard there was a rush up the gangway, and at no time during the afternoon was it free from a moving mass of humanity. The British cruiser, huge, formidable, and curious in appearance was the loadstone for the general Honolulu public, and it is estimated that more than four thousand people visited the ship. The visitors swarmed over the vessel and no part of the cruiser was sacred except the ward-room quarters, at the entrance to which marines stood on sentry duty, and none dared to pass by them. But if this portion of the ship was tabu, the curious throng found that there was an open sesame to every other section. After coursing over the main deck and in the dim casemates from which the big guns are fired, the upper works were inspected. Then in a short time the bridge, chart rooms, forward and after decks, men's quarters, engine room, galleys, gun rooms, armory, were soon black with humanity. In fact, wherever a foothold could be obtained, people took possession. Dozens even climbed the ratlines to the signal platforms half way up the masts. The sailors were extremely courteous to the visitors and almost every Jackie had a party in tow, explaining particularly the working of the big guns, which were a source of general interest to the landmen. The after-deck was covered with a canopy of flags of various nations, where women found beneath its folds a cool resting place. Officers were on duty in various parts of the cruiser, and politely turned parties of ladies and gentlemen over to members of the crew so that visitors could see everything of interest. On Wednesday Governor Dole, accompanied by his staff, is expected aboard the vessel to make an official call upon the captain and officers. Hereafter the cruiser will be open to visitors only from 3 to 5 p. m., from 2 to 3 o'clock being given over to private parties.

Spain for interment. As the request will doubtless be granted, the transport Sumner may be assigned to the duty of conveying them to Spain as the vessel has to pass through the Straits of Gibraltar in order to cross the Atlantic to New York. If this program is carried out the remains will reach Cadiz in July.

Aloha on the Way.
PORT TOWNSEND, April 14.—The schooner Aloha, Captain Frye, sailed tonight for the Hawaiian Islands. She is laden with lumber from Port Ludlow, consigned to Hilo and Lahaina.

Rain Prevented Loading.
The steamer Wallaleale arrived yesterday morning at 11:38 from Kukulhaele with 1,304 bags of H. S. Co. sugar and 1,216 P. S. M. The purser reported the Kauai on the way from Punaluu to Honouapo. Heavy rains fell on Wednesday and Thursday all over the Hamakua district, making it impossible to load sugar until Friday.

Hawaii Sugar Waiting.
The Noeau arrived yesterday at 11:10 a. m. from Kukulhaele with eight deck passengers and 4,258 bags of sugar. The purser reports the following sugar ready for shipment: H. S. Co., 3,500 bags; P. S. M., 600; H. A. Co., 1,600; H. 3,100. Total, 5,800 bags. Good weather was reported along the Hamakua coast, and the Kauai had arrived at Punaluu.

EMILY WHITNEY NOT HEARD FROM

Captain Parker, of the steamer Claudine, which arrived yesterday from Kahului, states that up to the time the Claudine left Maui nothing had been heard of the ship Emily F. Whitney, which sailed from Honolulu to Kahului on April 8. The only reason that shipping men can assign for the non-appearance at Kahului is that the high winds prevailing at the time of her departure may have blown her out to sea. However, the winds have been fair since, and there has been sufficient time for her to have beaten back. The ship was in fair condition when she sailed, so far as her timbers and sticks were concerned, but her hull was pretty well coated with green scum, which she collected at Caleta Buena, a nitrate port in Chili.

The Haydn Brown, which sailed for Kauai on April 19, had not reached her destination according to reports received yesterday. The Alice Cooke was reported beating off to Maui, having sailed Saturday for Kaanapali.

British Warships Due Today.
Officers aboard the Aphitrite expect the arrival today of the cruiser Amphion and the torpedo-boat destroyers Virago and Sparrowhawk, which sailed from Victoria about April 16.

Shipping Notes.
The Claudine arrived from Maui yesterday with a small cargo. The American brig Gallie, Captain Treanor, sailed from Kahului for Fanning Island on April 24. Purser Friel of the W. G. Hall reports 48,042 bags of sugar on Kauai awaiting shipment. The steamer brought 6,000 bags to Honolulu. Purser McNamara of the Ke Au Hou reports, from Kauai 138,665 bags of sugar awaiting shipment, of which 95,500 belongs to the Makee Sugar Company.

MORE RAINFALL DURING THE YEAR

The annual report of Curtis J. Lyons, Territorial Meteorologist, shows an extraordinary increase in rainfall for the past year. In nearly every district the reported rainfall is more than double the normal, and at some of the stations the rainfall is even more than twice the normal. The heaviest rainfall was at Laupahoehoe, on Hawaii, where the record was 272 inches, as compared to 132 inches normal.

SUMNER TO HAVE HISTORIC CARGO

The United States transport Sumner, which is reported to have sailed a few days since from San Francisco for Manila via Honolulu, en route to New York via the Suez Canal, will probably carry from Manila to Spain one of the most historic, and at the same time, gruesome cargoes, ever consigned to the hold of an American ship. When the warship Reina Christina, flagship of Admiral Montojo, who was in command of the Spanish fleet sunk in Manila bay by Dewey on May 1, 1898, was floated on April 12, the skeletons of about eighty of her crew were found in the hulk. One skeleton is believed to have been that of an officer, as a sword was lying by its side. Capt. Couden, who was here about a year ago in command of an American warship, took charge of the remains and intended giving them an American funeral. The Spanish residents of Manila objected, and expressed a desire to have the skeletons shipped to
