### THE ADVERTISER'S GROWING LIBRARY



A CORNER OF THE WORKING ROOM.

Irreverent reporters call it a graveyard. In reality it is a library. But it is conducted on an entirely different principle than are the rooms, filled with books, which are ordinarily known as libraries. The above illustration shows but one small corner of the library of the Advertiser.  
And the principle on which it is run? To the newspaper man it is very simple—only a question of gathering a mass of information on every conceivable subject, carefully classifying it, and then stowing it away in carefully indexed envelopes in the many boxes and pigeon holes arranged around the room. But the outsider is lost on entering it. He asks the librarian, for instance:  
"Can you give me any matter concerning General Nelson A. Miles?"  
The man who runs the library simply goes to his index. The index gives him the number of an envelope in a box of a certain number, and then he takes out an envelope crammed with newspaper clippings. These are of many dates. They cover a wide extent of time, and rapidly reading the head-

ings of these clippings the librarian can give his visitor an idea of the matter he has about Miles: "Threat to Resign from the Army"—"Sensational Statement Before Senators"—"Declares Favoritism Is Behind the General Staff Bill"—"General Miles May Be Court-martialed"—"Suspected of Having Furnished Secret papers to Senator Culberson"—"General Miles Arrives in Honolulu"—"Camp McKinley First Point Visited"—"Pearl Harbor Will be Looked Into Today"—"Inspects Pearl Harbor Station"—"Says He is Well Pleased by Scenes"—"Will Look Over Site for Barracks at Kahauli"—"Miles May Resign"—"Miles Given Audience by Empress Dowager in Peking"—"Miles Travels from Port Arthur to Taku on Russian Cruiser"—"Chinese Empress Gazettes General Miles as an Admiral"—"Miles at Moscow, Russia"—"Miles is Guest of King Edward"—"Miles Returns to New York From Tour of the World"—"General Miles as a Student"—"Robbed of Important Papers in Honolulu"—"Miles Scores the Army Staff Bill"—"Roosevelt to Force Miles out of the Army"—"General Miles on the Grill"—"His Losing Battle With Secretary Root"—"General Miles Intriguing for High Office"—"General Miles Makes Many

charges and Recommendations Concerning Conduct of the War in the Philippines"—  
"Hold on," says the man who asked for information of General Miles.  
But the librarian has enough more information, opinions of various newspapers, and stories concerning the Commanding General of the American army, to fill three books. His visitor takes all of this information and, seated at a table, takes out what he wishes.  
And what is the use of all this information? Well, some night, a cable may come, saying: "General Miles died today of heart failure." That is about all the cable would say, but the Advertiser would wish to print several columns about General Miles the next morning. It would wish to print his full biography, tell of all the honors he gained in the Civil War, his early training and many other facts. It would wish to give the public a graphic account of the career of Miles and the editor of the Advertiser would summon all this information from his library.  
In this way the lives of thirty thousand of the most prominent men in the world's affairs today are being carefully recorded in the library—ready for instant use when occasion requires it.  
But there is not only a biographical library. All matters of interest of whatever nature are kept in the same way. All Hawaiian matters are care-

fully recorded. The information that the Advertiser has of a few of the local politicians would fill several volumes. Every item ever printed in the Advertiser is being carefully indexed so that it can be referred to at any time. Photographs are carefully indexed and the Advertiser library today contains perhaps a hundred thousand pictures of people, towns, etc. There are maps, atlases, engravings, and general information on almost every subject. As an instance of thoroughness, it might be mentioned that there is not a naval vessel in the world today that the Advertiser could not produce a picture and a complete description of.  
It may be "a graveyard," as reporters irreverently term it, but at times it is a very lively one.
