THE MAILES WILL PLAY THE H. A. C.'S

The first baseball game this afternoon will be between the Mailes and the H. A. C.'s. If the former team keeps on improving and plays the way they have been doing the last two games, the result today may not be such a foregone conclusion. It is hardly possible that the Mailes will win but they may be able to hold their opponents down to a few runs.

The Mailes will have Hardee in the box probably throughout the entire game. Smith will play at second base in place of Fernandez, who has gone to the other islands.

In the game tomorrow the Punahou team will probably play the same as last week. Lemon will have to find a man to play in place of Koki in center field, who broke his arm during the past week and probably will not be able to play the rest of the season.

FLAG-RAISING DAY SPORT AT KAHULUI

Results of the races at Kahului on Wednesday, fifth anniversary of the raising of the Stars and Stripes over Hawaii, were as follows:

W. H. Cornwell's Pua Ilma won the pony half mile dash, Walluku purse \$100.

Cyclone won the Puunene purse \$200, trotting and pacing to harness, best 2 in 3 heats. The winner had to run a fourth heat with Billy Lempe. Best time 2:23 1-2.

Racine Murphy captured the Walluku purse \$150 for three-fourths mile dash in 1:22 1-2; also Maui merchants' purse \$150 for half mile and repeat, in 52 seconds.

Jennie E. owned by Tom Cummings, won the Lahaina purse \$150 for mile dash by Hawaiian bred; also the Kahului purse \$100 for half mile dash by same.

Denny Haley in two straight heats took the Bismarck Stables purse \$150, best 2 in 3 mile heats. Time, 2:29 1-2 and 2:37. McKinley was the only other entry.

Two or three purses were put up for Japanese events. After the races there was a baseball game, in which the All Maui defeated the Morning Stars, 13 to 12, in ten innings.

SIBERIA BROUGHT FIFTY PASSENGERS

The S. S. Siberia arrived from San Francisco early yesterday morning after a pleasant and uneventful voyage, and docked at the Bishop wharf. She brought about fifty passengers for this port, and has over a hundred through.

The Siberia sighted the Clavering on the morning of the 10th. On Wednesday she also passed the America Maru and the Sierra. The Maru was passed at 8:35 p. m. and the Sierra at 10:10 p. m. The two vessels were about twenty miles apart. It is evident that the Sierra was gaining on the other steamer as they sailed from Honolulu six hours apart.
