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LA PALOMA WANTS A TRY FOR HAWAII CHALLENGE CUP

Local yachtsmen are endeavoring to revive a contest for the big "Hawaiian Challenge Cup," valued at \$375 and at present held by its last winner, Ex-Commodore T. W. Hobron of the Hawaii Yacht Club and owner of the sloop Gladys. To that end they were endeavoring to get the trustees to admit La Paloma into the competition, meaning to hold such a race on Saturday week, September 19, that being the local Regatta Day.

CONDITIONS OF THE CUP.
The Hawaiian Challenge Cup is open to all yachts over five and not exceeding ten tons measurement, this limitation not applying to yachts which were in Hawaiian waters and entered for the race previous to July 4th, 1899. The course set runs from Waikiki to Pearl Harbor and back, finishing off the Oceanic wharf, making a course of twenty-three miles. The Helene is the only yacht admitted of over tonnage, she having entered for the race in accordance with the limitations. Time allowance for tonnage under the Royal Canadian Yacht Club rules is given and allowed according to the conditions.

The cup was originally donated by the Hawaiian Rowing and Yachting Association, the conditions under which it was sailed being drawn up at a meeting of the Association in the Iolani Boat Club hall on June 28, 1889. Their resolutions placed the cup under the control of the following trustees: C. B. Wilson, J. M. Dowsett, C. P. Iauka and W. M. Giffard. Three hundred and seventy-five dollars was appropriated to pay for the cup which was to be annually sailed for by yachts over five and under ten tons excepting boats already in Hawaiian waters and entering for that year's regatta. (The Helene thus qualified).

WINNERS OF THE CUP.
The history of the cup is as follows: Won first by yacht "Hawaii," July 4, 1889.
Won second by yacht "Hawaii," July 4, 1890.
Won third by yacht "Healani," July 4, 1891.
Won fourth by yacht "Bonnie Dundee," July 4, 1892.

From this time the cup lay fallow for seven years until the advent of the "Gladys" into our waters. A race was then sailed between the "Bonnie Dundee" (now "Mary L."), and the Gladys on September 13, 1899, when the Gladys won by 22 minutes or one minute to the mile. Governor Dole called the Bonnie Dundee and T. W. Hobron the Gladys.

ATTEMPT TO CHANGE CONDITIONS.

In August, 1900, the Myrtle, George A. Crozier, and R. H. Brotherton owners, was desirous of entering for the cup but was debarred by the action of the trustees who claimed that the cup had been given for the purpose of encouraging the large yachts. C. B. Wilson, trustee for the cup and chairman of the regatta for that year, held further that according to the terms of the resolution neither the trustees of the cup nor owners of eligible yachts had any authority to change the limit of measurement or waive the conditions.

LA PALOMA INELIGIBLE.

The La Paloma, Commodore T. W. Hobron, is, under the original terms, not eligible to compete. Present eligible yachts are the Helene, Marion, Mary L. (Bonnie Dundee), Dewey and Gladys. Believing that the cup was intended for the larger class of yachts and knowing that since her overhauling and remodeling his sloop, once a

schooner, is on much more even terms with his opponents than formerly, Commodore Macfarlane wants a crack at the cup. At the time of the Myrtle controversy L. A. Thurston stated his belief that the original intention of the cup was to promote the growth of the large yacht class, the Healani, owned by King Kalanikou, being for a long time the only five ton yacht in Hawaiian waters.

LEGITIMATE RACERS WILLING.
Commodore Macfarlane in his official capacity and from a personal standpoint, is popular with his fellow yachtsmen while his efforts for local yachting and the money he has spent on his own craft are warmly appreciated. Therefore the captains of the Mary L., Helene, and Gladys are anxious to see him allowed to enter, and have presented the following petition to the trustees, proposing to race for the cup on Regatta Day.

A CHANGE ASKED FOR.
"To the Trustees of the Hawaiian Challenge Cup, Honolulu, Hawaii.
"Sirs:—It is desired by the undersigned, to effect a change in one of the conditions governing the competition for and holding of the Hawaiian Perpetual Challenge Cup for which you are the trustees, that being the stipulation as to the dimensions of yachts which may compete.
"Although the measurements determined upon include the yachts racing in these waters at that time, they now effectually exclude 'La Paloma' and it is the wish of the Hawaii Yacht Club and the undersigned that said regulations be amended to include 'La Paloma' it being necessary that she be allowed to participate in order to make satisfactory competition.

TRUSTEES FAIL TO AGREE.

The trustees are divided at present in their ability to allow La Paloma in competition. J. M. Dowsett with Curtis Iauka is willing to admit the big sloop. W. M. Giffard is absent. C. B. Wilson holds firmly to his original opinion that they as trustees cannot change the resolutions which, as "La Paloma" was not in our waters at the time, effectually shut her out. La Paloma measures 22 tons. The Helene which was admitted through actual presence measured 14 tons.
Mr. Sproule who was present at the original meeting in the Iolani clubhouse, backs up Mr. Wilson. He says: "The intention was to create a class of boats from 5-10 tons. The Healani being on the spot was admitted. She is 14 tons. If the intention had been to allow boats larger than 10 tons to enter at any future time, the limit would naturally have been stretched to 14 or 15 tons, but the Helene was admitted as a favor."
A meeting of the trustees will in all probability be formally called when the matter will be settled. Striking an average, La Paloma would have to allow the Gladys some fourteen minutes over the course. Gladys measures 8 tons and La Paloma about 22. Gladys allowed the Mary L. about one minute in the last race and will get about 6 minutes from the Helene.

AN ELABORATE TROPHY.

The cup is an ornate affair, etched on one side with the title of the trophy and on the other with a view of Diamond Head and racing yachts. On the shoulders cunningly wrought objects typical of the sport are attached. The names of previous winners are engraved on the cup.

The two games played yesterday afternoon made no change in the standing of the teams, as the two leaders won their games handily. The Malles went to bat and Lemon hit the first man up but caught him at second on Jones's weak hit. Clark bunted and Lemon dropped the ball in attempting to put out. Jones tried to reach third on the play but was easily stopped. White forced Clark at second.

Hardee struck out the first two men. Jones singled and Vanatta flew to left field. Fernandez got the first hit for the Malles in the second but two strike-outs and a fly ended the inning.

The Kams were more successful in their half scoring two runs on two hits, an error and a hit by the pitcher. With two out in the third Jones reached third on Lemon's error and Clark's two bagger but White was not equal to the occasion and made an easy out.

The Kams got three men on bases in their half but D. Kekuewa failed to connect safely. Lemon retired the Malles on strikes in the fourth though Fern picked up a base hit. A pretty double play by Hardee, Macfarlane and Akau was the feature of the last half.

The Malles tied the score up in the fifth, Akau getting a hit, and going to second on Hardee's hot one which glanced off Lemon, the umpire and Vanatta. Jones struck out but Clark chose a nice one and the bags were full. Wilbur scored two men on his safety and Fernandez fouled out. The Kams earned a run in their half on

Jones' three cushion shot to the right field fence and Vanatta's single.

Nothing transpired in the sixth but the last run of the game came in the seventh. Lemon reached first when his grounder took a false bound over Macfarlane's head. He scored on a steal and by fast running on Vanatta's hit. Both sides were retired in one two-three order in the eighth.

The Malles tried hard in the ninth. Macfarlane beat out his grounder to third base but could not get back to first in time when Akau sent a hard drive to Jones in left who cleverly doubled him up. Two more reached the bases but the Malles last chance disappeared when Clark hit the ball in front of the plate and went out at first.
