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

**FRENCH MAN-OF-WAR THAT ONCE  
SAVED PANAMA FROM BOMBARDMENT**

**Crack French Cruiser  
Protet Again in the  
Naval Row.**

Once more the crack French cruiser Protet is in Naval row, where she will remain for six or seven days before going to Tahiti. The fast warship came down from Esquimalt in eight days, sighting two or three unidentified sailing vessels.

The Protet came into the harbor with Pilot Cameron on the bridge with Captain Adigard, Chief of the Pacific Division, and commander of the warship, and Captain Prat, second in command. The vessel was beautifully handled, and after throwing her anchor out opposite the Inter Island wharf, she backed easily into the Row. While this process was under way, Captain Rodman, commander of the U. S. Tug Iroquois, came across the harbor in his gig, flying old glory at the stern, and went on deck, where he was accorded the salute of honor. Capt. Rodman informed Captain Adigard that Admiral Terry would be pleased to accept the call of the French officers at 3 p. m. today.

As soon as the Protet came to anchor, the American flag was run up the foremast, the marines, under arms, lined up on deck, a ruffle on the drum was heard and then came a national salute of twenty-one guns from the warship's rapid-fire battery. Hardly had the smoke uncovered the Protet than the saluting battery at the Naval Station responded. These formal

honor concluded, the vessel was made tidy and the sailors had their first meal on smooth water.  
The acting French Consul, Mr. Albert Raas, went aboard ship yesterday evening and extended a welcome to Honolulu.  
A formal reception will probably be given aboard the warship the latter part of the week, and naturally the officers will be entertained ashore. None of them have before visited Honolulu save Captain Adigard, who was here many years ago as an ensign.

The Protet is a second class cruiser of 4110 tons register, has 9000 horse power, and has a complement of 381 men. She is capable of making twenty-one knots. She carries five 6-inch, ten 4-inch and 14 small calibre guns. The Protet's complete list of officers is as follows:

Honolulu people are so well acquainted with the French man-of-war Protet that many of them imagine that the powerful vessel is an old-timer. But such is not the case. She is a young ship, although she has already done considerable knocking about. Her wanderings around the Pacific have given the enemies of La Belle France, if there be any in Pacific waters, an idea of the ferocious sort of fighting machines that the country owning Tahiti and other Pacific islands has in commission and ready to do battle if occasion requires it.  
The Protet was launched on July 5th, 1888, from the Bordeaux ship yards. She is capable of making a speed of twenty-one knots an hour. The Frenchman measures his ships by the yard, so he will tell you that the Protet is 105 yards long, not just ordinary Yankee yards, but Parisian yards, which are a trifle longer than ours. The vessel is registered as 4,200 tons and has a crew of about four hundred men. Her fighting irons consist of five 6-inch and ten 4-inch guns, ten 6-pounders, and four 3-pounders.  
The Protet was placed in commission and started on her Pacific cruise just a year after she was launched. In rapid succession she entered the harbors of Rio de Janeiro, Montevideo, Buenos Ayres, Port Desado, Valparaiso, Juan Fernandez, Coquimbo, Iquique, Callao, Guayaquil, Panama, San Jose, Guatemala, San Diego, and San Francisco. From San Francisco she sailed to Honolulu, arriving here in June, 1900. The vessel sailed from Honolulu to the French possessions in the South Pacific where she speedily became a favorite.  
The vessel arrived in Honolulu again in January of last year and owing to the trouble in Panama sailed for that place in February. Commander Barnaud was then in command of the Protet. On the night of March 14, 1902, he saved Panama from being bombarded. Flushed with their victory over the Lautaro and other Colombian government vessels, the rebel gunboat Padilla and her two small consorts prepared to bombard and take Panama. On the night of the intended attack the rebel vessels steamed towards Panama but were met and discovered by the formidable little Frenchman and compelled to turn tail. No bombardment followed and the Protet and her commander received great praise from the Panama people.  
The Protet has visited various ports of the Pacific since that time.

**LONGITUDE OF  
GUAM AND MANILA**

The Manila Cable News of Sept. 4 says:

Last evening the first time signals were sent through the new cable between Manila and Guam. The work of determining the longitude of Manila from the United States through the new Pacific cable is now in progress. It being impracticable to work directly through the entire length of the cable it is necessary to determine the longitude of each of the landing places, working through each link of the cable separately.

Mr. Fremont Morse of the Coast and Geodetic Survey arrived in Manila recently for the purpose of carrying out this work, and another officer of this corps, Mr. Edwin Smith, is stationed at Guam. Each of these observers makes astronomical observations each clear evening to obtain the local time as accurately as practicable, and the time signals sent through the cable give the exact difference between the chronometers. Instruments especially designed for the purpose are used in the astronomical observations, and in recording automatically the cable signals.

The longitude station in use in Manila is located on the old foundation opposite the plaza in the walled city, and this is connected by wire with the cable office.

The longitude determination of Honolulu from San Francisco has recently been completed by the same observers and later the connections will be made between Guam and Midway Island, and Midway and Honolulu.

This may complete the first circuit of longitudes around the earth, as Manila has already been connected with Hongkong, India and Greenwich. The Canadians are engaged in making similar determinations between Vancouver and Australia through the new British cable.

**IROQUOIS MAY  
NOT MAKE CRUISE**

News reached the Naval Station yesterday that one of the naval officers assigned to the Iroquois in connection with the proposed cruise to Midway, has been granted a three-months' sick leave. On this account the cruise may be ordered off. Capt. Rodman cabled yesterday for information.

**Will Discard British Steamers.**

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 24.—It is stated here that the White Star steamers Doric, Contic and Gaelic, at present being operated between this city and Japan and China by the Occidental & Oriental Steamship Company, are soon to be replaced by bigger steamers flying the American flag. The three steamers mentioned, being British, are excluded from calling at Honolulu, the business of the company being thus handicapped.

**Shipping Notes.**

The schooner Lyman D. Foster will leave for the Sound today.

The four-masted schooner Aloha arrived yesterday afternoon from Port Gamble with lumber.

The Seattle Shipyards Company has completed its new marine railway at Ballard at a cost of \$50,000. The work has taken nine months. The length of the ways is 650 feet, and the cradle is 250 feet long.

A special cable yesterday from San Francisco to the marine exchange says: The S. S. Nippon Maru arrived this morning from Honolulu and the Orient. She was quarantined on her arrival on account of having had a case of plague between Yokohama and Honolulu.
