

# THE CURRENT EXPENSES APPROPRIATION BILL

Following is the current expenses appropriation bill as it passed second reading in the Senate, excepting for the aggregate amount which was not inserted on passage. The net reduction from the original bill is \$3661:

An Act Making Special Appropriations for the Departmental use of the Territory during the Period Commencing with the First Day of July, 1904, and Ending with the Thirtieth Day of June, 1905.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the Territory of Hawaii:

Section 1. The following sums amounting to Nine Hundred and Seventy-nine Thousand, Seven Hundred and Forty-five Dollars, (\$979,745) are hereby appropriated, to be paid out of all moneys in the Treasury of the Territory received from all current receipts of the general revenue, for the current expenses of the departments, for the period commencing with the first day of July, 1904, and ending with the thirtieth day of June, 1905.

## Section 2. The Auditor shall not

draw a warrant in payment for any of  
the objects named in this Act, except as

herein provided, and the unauthorized  
expenditure of any money from the  
Treasury to be hereafter accounted for  
to the Legislature by indemnity bill, is  
hereby expressly prohibited.

Section 3. Any public official who  
shall falsely certify or approve for pay-  
ment any bill or voucher against any  
item of this Act, shall be deemed guilty  
of a misdemeanor, for which the of-  
fender shall, on conviction thereof, be  
fined not less than Fifty Dollars nor  
more than Five Hundred Dollars. (Dis-  
trict Magistrates shall have jurisdic-  
tion in all cases under this section.)

Section 4. No expenditure of public  
money for the construction or repair of  
public works (except street or road  
work) where the sum to be expended  
shall amount to Five Hundred Dollars  
(\$500.00) or more, or for the purchase of  
material, provisions or other supplies  
for public purposes amounting in the  
aggregate to Five Hundred Dollars  
(\$500.00) or more, shall be made, except  
by contract after public advertisement  
for sealed tenders; and no public work  
or the purchase of material, provisions  
or supplies for public purposes shall be  
so divided or parcelled out as to defeat  
or evade the provisions of this section.

Section 5. All agreements or con-  
tracts made and entered into by any  
officer of the Territory of Hawaii by or  
under which public money is to be ex-  
pended, shall be void and of no effect  
unless the Auditor shall endorse thereon  
his certificate that there remains,  
unexpended and unapplied, a balance  
in the fund or appropriation already  
made for such purposes, sufficient to  
cover the amount involved in such con-  
tract or agreement.

Section 6. This Act shall take effect  
on the first day of July, 1904.

reading a newspaper. Even the ir-  
repressible Kupieha was busted in look-  
ing into vacancy.

The bill once read, Representative  
Lewis moved an amendment to the sec-  
tion prohibiting the payment of more  
than one salary to any employee who  
received as high as \$100 per month. The  
amendment permits the holding of more  
than one office, but the employee can  
draw only the highest salary attached to  
any one office. The bill then passed  
third reading with four noes, Kupieha,  
Kaniho, Pulaa and Beckley. There  
were twenty-five ayes.

The House then took a recess to al-  
low the session expense bill to be sent  
in from the Senate.

## NEW BILLS.

After a recess Representative An-  
drade was given leave to introduce two  
bills submitted by the Governor. The  
first, providing for either salary or  
commissions for assessors, was accom-  
panied by the following letter to Mr.  
Andrade, as chairman of the Judiciary  
Committee, and signed by Governor  
Carter:

"Herewith, I hand you draft of an  
Act, the purpose of which is to allow  
the tax assessors, with the approval of  
the Treasurer, to put their deputies on  
salaries. As the law reads at present,  
only commissions can be paid. In the  
larger districts it has been found that  
salaries are more satisfactory to the  
employees than commissions. The small  
amounts allowed the tax assessors will  
necessitate the change in the law.

"I desire to call your attention to an  
oversight in the wording of the Salary  
Bill, which evidently is in conflict with  
the law: On page 3, line 31, is an item  
providing for Assistant Assessor, Oahu,  
while there is no such office provided  
for in the law. This was, of course, in-  
serted at the wish of the Tax Assessor,  
and I leave it optional with the House  
as to amending the law to make pro-  
vision for an Assistant Assessor, with  
the usual duties implied by such an of-  
fice, or striking it out and inserting  
'Salary of First Deputy, Oahu.' This  
office, as I understand it, is separate  
and distinct from that of First Deputy  
in Honolulu."

The bill introduced, which passed first  
reading, is as follows:

Section 1. Section 45 of Chapter 51 of the  
Session Laws of 1896 (Civil Laws 1897,  
Sec. 348) is hereby amended to read as  
follows:

"Sec. 45. Each assessor shall receive  
such compensation as the Legislature  
from time to time appropriates. Each  
deputy shall receive as full compensa-  
tion for assessing and collecting and all  
work done in connection therewith such  
percentage of the taxes collected by  
him, including road and school tax,  
not to exceed five (5) per centum, or  
such salary as the assessor, with the  
approval of the Treasurer, may decide.  
Provided, however, that the commis-  
sions so paid shall be a charge upon  
each tax separately."

The Senate expense bill providing for  
\$5,000 was transmitted and passed first  
reading by title.

## GARBAGE BILL.

Rep. Andrade also presented the fol-  
lowing letter from the Governor relat-  
ing to the garbage bill:

"Conforming to the general plan as  
outlined in my message, I hand you  
herewith draft of bill, through which  
the administration hopes to be able to  
collect sufficient to make the garbage  
department and sewerage system of  
Honolulu self-supporting. I leave it op-  
tional with the legislature as to wheth-  
er or not they shall include Hilo and  
other points in the same bill.

"Very respectfully yours,  
"GEO. R. CARTER,  
"Governor."

The bill which was introduced by  
Rep. Andrade passed first reading with-  
out a dissenting vote. It is as follows:

"Section 1. It shall be the duty of the  
Superintendent of Public Works, con-  
forming to the requirements of the  
Board of Health, to direct and super-  
intend the cleaning of the public  
streets and by-ways of the city of Ho-  
lolulu, the removal and disposal of  
garbage, dead animals and other  
nuisances therein, the cleaning of cess-  
pools and connecting of premises with  
the public sewer in said city.

"Section 2. The rates of charges for  
such services and for use of the sewer  
shall be fixed from time to time by the  
Superintendent, subject to the approval

of the Governor, and shall be reason-  
ably approximate to the cost of the  
work done and material used.

"Rates of charges for sewer use shall  
be fixed as nearly as reasonably may  
be, so that the entire yearly receipts for  
sewer use shall not exceed the total  
yearly cost of maintaining and repair-  
ing the sewers, together with the year-  
ly interest on the bonds representing the  
cost of the sewer system.

"Section 3. The rates and charges  
herein provided for collection of  
garbage shall be payable to the Super-  
intendent, quarterly in advance, and  
the charges for sewerage, yearly in ad-  
vance; charges for cesspools, sewer con-  
nections and removal of animals and  
other nuisances, shall be payable on de-  
mand, and to secure payment thereof,  
the Superintendent may require a de-  
posit in advance.

"If a sewer bill shall remain unpaid  
for 15 days after it is due, ten per cent  
in addition to the regular rate, shall  
be charged, and the Superintendent  
may, without further notice, shut off  
the sewer connection, charging the ex-  
pense for so doing to the person holding  
the privilege.

"All rates and charges shall be pay-  
able by the owners and occupants of  
the premises in respect to which the  
services are rendered, and who shall  
jointly and severally be liable therefor."

The bill passed first reading by title  
and the House then adjourned.

## THE SENATE.

A report from the Finance Committee  
on the current expense bill was the  
first matter to come before the Senate  
when it met at 1:30 yesterday after-  
noon. The report was signed by all the  
members of the committee—L. L. Mc-  
Candless (chairman), Palmer P. Woods,  
D. Kalauokalani, C. H. Dickey and J.  
D. Paris. It recommended a few amend-  
ments and was adopted. A share of  
\$4000 was taken off the Park Commis-  
sion item, and this rider added: "Pro-  
viding the present race track shall be  
kept intact, any repairs being made by  
those using the same." Rent of the  
kerosene warehouse was reduced \$200  
to correct an error as believed. Asso-  
ciated Charities lost \$600. Traveling  
expenses of \$75 for the Third Circuit  
Judge and clerk and \$50 for the judge  
and clerk of the Fourth Circuit were  
eliminated, as the courts in question do  
not travel as formerly. An item of  
\$4000 was inserted for the Land Regis-  
tration Court. Police incidentals were  
put in as a lump sum of \$16,800 for the  
Territory instead of \$4800 for Hawaii  
and \$12,000 for Oahu, Maui and Kauai.

## REPEAL BILLS.

Mr. Achi presented a report of the  
Judiciary Committee on the bill to re-  
peal Act 13, Laws of 1903, signed by  
the whole committee—W. C. Achi, C. H.  
Dickey and John T. Brown. After due  
consideration they thought the bill  
should not pass, "for the reason that  
bills which may be incurred before or  
on June 30, 1904, may not be legally  
paid afterward." They recommended  
that the Act in question be amended by  
adding the following section:

"Section 6a. No payments shall be  
made under any of the appropriations  
under this Act for any bills incurred  
after June 30, 1904."

A similar report was offered by the  
Judiciary Committee on the bill to re-  
peal Act 17, salaries, etc., with the fol-  
lowing as the amendment to the Act:  
"Section 5a. No payments shall be  
made under any appropriations of this  
Act for any services performed after  
June 30, 1904."

With regard to the loan appropriation  
bill, the committee reported thus:  
"The Judiciary Committee to whom  
was referred Senate bill No. 5 report  
that the object of the bill is to repeal  
Act 18 of the extra session of 1903.  
After due consideration, we do not be-  
lieve that the bill should pass, for the  
reason that any new loan appropriation  
bill may require the approval of the  
President. We recommend that the bill  
be laid on the table."

Each report was adopted in its order  
and the amending bills submitted by  
the committee passed first reading.

## COURT COSTS BILL.

Mr. Dickey gave notice of a bill re-  
lating to costs of court. Under sus-  
pension of the rules it passed first read-  
ing. The same member submitted a  
concurrent resolution to the effect that  
warrants for the payment of salaries and  
mileage of members should not take  
precedence in payment of other  
Treasury warrants. President Crabbe  
informed him that the law did not al-  
low what the resolution was against,  
whereupon the introducer asked that  
the resolution might lie on the table  
until called up.

## ORDER OF THE DAY.

Senate bill No. 2, appropriating \$5,000  
for the expenses of the Senate in special  
session, passed third reading with the  
aves of the thirteen members present,  
viz: Achi, J. T. Brown, Crabbe, Dickey,  
Isenberg, Kaue, Kalauokalani, Kaohi,  
McCandless, Nakapahu, Paris, Wilcox  
and Woods.

Senate bill No. 6, providing that the  
salary of the Judge of the Land Regis-  
tration Court be \$1800 a year, that of  
the Registrar \$900 and those of other  
officers fixed by the Governor, the Act  
to take effect from and after the 1st  
day of July, 1904, came up for second  
reading.

Mr. McCandless moved it be referred  
to the Judiciary Committee, as the  
salaries might as well be placed in the  
appropriation bill.

Mr. Dickey said the bill only changed  
about four words of the Land Regis-  
tration Act. There was no appropriation  
about it, an item of \$4000 for the court  
having already been placed in the ap-  
propriation bill.

Messrs. Paris and Achi both thought  
the bill ought to go to the Finance  
Committee, the latter saying the idea  
of fixing the salary of the judge in the  
bill was to make him independent and  
prevent having his salary changed ev-  
ery now and then by the Legislature.

The bill was referred to the Finance  
Committee.
