**WILL MAKE
NEW RATES**

**Garbage Law Soon
To Go Into
Effect.**

**May Reduce Sewer Rates
When System Is
Complete.**

**Garbage Crematory Is Rehabil-
itated and Will Be Put in
Operation Soon.**

Supt. Holloway intends to prepare immediately a new schedule of garbage prices under the law passed by the Legislature in extra session. The new prices may be higher than the ones now in force, although there will not be a great deal of difference. The law authorizes the Superintendent of Public Works to draw up regulations and schedules of charges for both garbage and sewers, but the list must be approved by the Governor before it becomes effective.

"The sewer rates will remain about the same," said Supt. Holloway yesterday. "There will be no change until the entire sewer system is completed and we know how many connections have been made. Then a schedule will be drawn up to cover the cost of operation and to pay the interest on the investment. It is quite possible that the sewer rates will be lower than at present if we get the number of connections that we expect. All we want to do is to make the sewer system self-supporting."

"The garbage system is not paying expenses at present and we intend, if possible, to make it pay its own way. I do not believe that the people of the entire Territory should pay for the support of a garbage or sewer system from which Honolulu alone benefits."

The new law provides for a penalty in case of failure to pay the sewer rates, although the garbage system is not included in that portion of the law. At present it is stated that many property-owners, although enjoying the benefits of the sewer system, are not contributing to its support, and it is intended to remedy this condition so that all will pay alike.

The old crematory plant has been thoroughly cleaned and will now be repaired. Supt. Holloway expects to have sufficient money in the appropriation to purchase new lumber and replace the rusted parts, so that the crematory may be put into operation.

**KALIHI CAMP
BEING DISMANTLED**

The old Kalihi camp is to be dismantled at once and the buildings are being sold and removed from the land. Willie Lucas who bought the buildings and unexpired lease at public auction from the Public Works Department for \$6600 has about disposed of the property at a profit of about a thousand dollars on his investment. The buildings are being purchased by Japanese and Chinese and are removed from the camp, to be erected elsewhere. The lease of the land reverts back to the Bishop Estate.

It was the intention at first to continue the camp as a lodging house, but this plan has been abandoned.

Confetti and Carnival.

Confetti, the very type and symbol of carnival, will be one of the novelties at the Flower Carnival next Saturday at St. Clement's church grounds. Honolulu has never seen confetti before, but the ladies having charge of the Carnival have provided a generous quantity of Florentine confetti, and the custom of confetti throwing on carnival occasion will have a fitting inauguration.

The affair next Saturday afternoon is to be essentially a Carnival and not a fair or bazaar. The things that are to be sold will all or nearly all bear some relation to the carnival idea. One of the features will be the "Mystery Rose Tree."

There will be some exquisite things for sale, among them emeries and sachets, in the form of pansies of satin ribbon, hand painted. Mrs. Pierre Jones, Mrs. T. J. King and Allan Dunn will contribute to this feature.

M. R. Counter has donated a beautiful heart-shaped oxidized 'chataleine watch and pin which is to be given to the "Carnival Queen" who will be chosen from among the children taking part in the carnival.

All children, carts, floats and ponies taking part in the procession, are to enter the grounds by the Makiki street gate, and as soon after 2 o'clock as possible.

**ROAD BOARDS AT LAST
RECEIVE THEIR DUES**

**So-Called Wilcox Shortage Made Good at the
Expense of Taxpayers---Chief Clerk
White Draws Warrants.**

Yesterday C. M. White, Chief Clerk of the Public Works Department, drew warrants on the Treasury to pay the so-called "Wilcox shortage" of \$2337.85, which cost Charles Wilcox his disbursing clerkship in that department and was the subject of a curious miscarriage of legislation in 1903.

Wilcox drew the warrants to pay the claims of various road boards and cashed them at the Treasury. The moneys never reached the claimants and when Wilcox was confronted with the shortage he alleged that he turned the moneys over to B. H. Wright, who was then the Chief Clerk under J. H. Boyd, Superintendent of Public Works.

A bill appropriating money to pay the road boards reached Governor Dole and was signed by him. Clerk Meheula had certified to its having passed three readings in the House of Representatives and it had also been duly certified up from the Senate. Speaker Beckley, however, after the bill had been signed informed the House that it had not passed all of the required stages in that body.

Under this showing of fact, Auditor Fisher refused to issue warrants under the purported Act. The matter then rested in abeyance until the Legislature in special session this year regularly appropriated the moneys. Mr. White drew the warrants payable to himself and having them registered will remit the warrants endorsed over to the parties named in the appropriations. They are as follows, with the amounts payable to each:

S. N. Hundley, chairman of Kawaihau (Kauai) road board, three sums of \$475.65, \$359.10 and \$424.10 respectively.
Eben P. Low, North Kohala, Hawaii, two sums of \$119 and \$685 respectively.
Hutchinson Sugar Plantation, Kau, \$275.
The total of these sums is \$2337.85.

**GOVERNMENT MAY TAKE OVER
LAHAINALUNA WATER RIGHTS**

**Attorney-General Andrews and Deputy Sheriff
Chillingworth Go to Maui for Purpose of
Asserting Territory's Rights.**

Attorney General Andrews and Deputy Sheriff Chillingworth left yesterday for Maui on the Claudine to take a hand in the Lahainaluna water rights controversy. It is not impossible that Deputy Sheriff Chillingworth will take possession of the water sources claimed by the Pioneer Mill Co. on behalf of the Territory and there is every prospect of a lively fight now that the government has decided to take the offensive in the matter.

The Pioneer Mill Co. has been enjoying the water rights claimed by the Territory, or Department of Education, for twelve years and it was at the request of the plantation that the government brought the suit to determine the ownership. The hearing has been in progress now for over a week before Judge J. L. Kaulukou, acting as special commissioner, and it was supposed that the trial would proceed smoothly. The Attorney General however received information yesterday that the Pioneer Mill Co. was taking advantage of every technicality and using every means to delay the trial, the understanding having been previously that the suit should be determined by the commissioner on its merits. Assistant Attorney General Noah Aluli and Mrs. Emma Nakuina, who is familiar with Hawaiian water rights, through her experiences as commissioner, have been representing the government, while D. H. Case and John Richardson appeared for the plantation.

Attorney General Andrews intends to conduct the case in person, and it is possible that forcible steps may be taken to put the government into possession of the water rights now enjoyed by the Pioneer Mill Co. It is the claim of the government that the plantation without authority or justification of any kind began the use of the water involved twelve years ago, and when the Department of Education attempted to assert its rights, the plantation claimed to control all the water. No lease to the water has ever been given, and it is claimed on the part of the Territory that a private corporation cannot acquire rights of ownership by adverse possession, as against the government. If the Pioneer Mill Co. secures possession of the water rights it is claimed that Lahainaluna Seminary would suffer very seriously as a result.

**HOLLOWAY IS ASKED TO
APPROVE GAS PLANT SITE**

"The Hawaiian Gas Co., Ltd.," by which the new corporation that holds the Diamond franchise is to be known, is making active preparations for beginning work on the plant. Applications have been made to the Superintendent of Public Works for his approval of a site for the proposed plant in the Kawaiahau block, between Alapai and Punchbowl and Hotel and King streets. The low swampy land in the block is the possible site of the gas plant.

Three other applications are to be made to Supt. Holloway by the company for approval of sites for the gas plant. One is back of Oahu prison, the second is below Iwilei in tide-water and the third is on the waterfront near the sewer outfall. The company wants a decision upon the various sites proposed for the plant, before it makes a final purchase of land for the purpose.

It was the intention of W. R. Castle, who is the main representative of the Honolulu stockholders, to go to San Francisco in connection with gas affairs on the Sonoma yesterday. He was unable to get away, however, and R. W. Shingle of the Waterhouse Trust Co. is making the trip instead. He is to confer with the San Francisco stockholders of the company and assist in the preparation of specifications for the necessary buildings. An expert gas engineer will probably return on the Sonoma on June 1st to make a careful study of the local situation, and look into the question of the site for the plant and of the location of the mains. As soon as the estimates and specifications for the work are completed bids will be asked.

The company has been receiving requests from residents daily for gas once the plant is in operation, and the promoters of the corporation are being told that they have solved the fuel question for Hawaii.


