Secretary A. L. C. Atkinson has under his hand from Washington the page proofs of the Governor's Report for 1904. There are 144 pages of the document.

A portion of the bitumen pavement being tried as an experiment on Queen street has been laid and the base is prepared from Hackfeld's to Alakea street.

Princess Theresa gave a luau at Bellina's ranch, Kaimuki, last night. Democratic politics were served with the viands, Prince David being the leading orator.

Governor Carter is subpoenaed to appear before the grand jury today, presumably to be asked for Detective Hatter's report, or an oral statement of its contents.

Judge Dole yesterday heard argument on Lyle A. Dickey's motion in arrest of judgment in the Kabayakawa distilling case and reserved decision. District Attorney Breckons opposed the motion.

A new die of the great seal of the Territory of Hawaii has been made in San Francisco. The old one had become unsatisfactory. Secretary Atkinson has received an imprint in lead from the die, which shows a clearcut impression.

Hilo having subscribed its share of \$965 to add to Admiral Beckley's \$1000, the Government appropriation of \$1000 is now available, making \$2965 in all, for erecting the pavilion in Moolohau park, Hilo. The work will therefore at once proceed.

L. H. Wolfe, who returned from a visit to the St. Louis Exposition in the Ventura, was in a bad street railway accident in St. Louis. Though so badly hurt as to need two days in hospital, he was one of the least injured of the passengers involved in the smash.

Admiral Terry expects to leave Honolulu with his family in the steamer Doric on November 18, going home by way of the Orient. Captain Lyon, his successor as commandant of the Honolulu naval station, is expected to arrive the same day in the steamer Sierra.




