IN TERROR FOR NAUGHT

Maui Natives Moved By False Rumor See Governor.

A deputation of native Hawaiians from Keanae valley, Maui, waited in a state of perturbation on Governor Carter yesterday. They had been made to believe in some way or another—perhaps through the inhalation of Home Rule campaign hot air—that the Government land at Keanae was to be sold at public auction on the fifth day of January next.

This was news to Governor Carter and he sent for Commissioner Pratt.

"It was a complete surprise to us," the Governor said after the interview.

"Mr. Pratt assured me that the only thing in connection with the Keanae lands which was purposed was the stopping of the tenancies at will of a number of Chinese on rice lands. Mr. Pratt had sent the sub-agent, Mr. Alken, along to notify them that on and after the first of January the tenancies at will must cease.

"The leases will be sold at auction, when the present tenants will have an equal chance with other people to secure them for definite terms.

"The natives who took alarm at the rumor that the land was all going to be sold are people living in the valley."

also the double case of Loo Hong and Lai Ho, who had a fight and then blamed each other for starting it. Fifteen gamblers were fined in amounts ranging from \$15 to \$3 and the rest put over until this morning. Five drunks were fined the customary \$3 and costs and the young Portuguese hoodlum, Vasconcellos, had to pay \$5 for his fun. Bare-footed Bill's trial for burglary comes up today. The Japanese stabbing case on Maunakea street Sunday evening is being investigated. The hurt was not serious.

Republicans in the Rain.

The Republicans met in the rain at Queen and South streets, Kakaako, last evening. Liliha presided and Dowsett, Faxon Bishop, Quinn, Long and Aylett spoke. Interpretations were made by the Boy Orator. Aylett decried on the need of a two-thirds majority to pass bills; Jack Dowsett attacked Mossman for saying the Republicans meant to disfranchise the Hawaiians and Faxon Bishop said a Democratic victory would mean the stopping of street work and a quarrel between the Legislature and the Executive.

NUMBER OF ALIENS

ARRIVING IN PORT

The Advertiser has received from the Department of Commerce and Labor a statement by ports showing the number of aliens landed and debared together with those returned by the immigration authorities after landing, during the months of July and August of the current year. Honolulu's showing is as follows:

Month ending July 31—Landed, 1314; paupers, 1; diseased, 5; contract laborers, 2; exclusion act, 1; total debared, 9.

Month ending Aug. 31—Landed, 1008; paupers, 1; diseased, 0; contract laborers, 0; exclusion act, 1; total debared, 2.

Grand total—Landed, 2322; paupers, 2; diseased, 5; contract laborers, 2; exclusion act, 2; total debared, 11.

Appeal to Politicians.

In forwarding permits for the Home Rule candidates on Maui to visit the Leper Settlement, President Pinkham of the Board of Health addressed an earnest letter to John Richardson on the inadvisability of making partisan appeals to the lepers on the basis of their affliction. He mentions that \$76,838.85 has been expended by the Territory the past six years in caring for those people, besides relating what had been done the present year, through the contributions of Dr. Cooper, M. P. Robinson, W. O. Smith, H. P. Baldwin, G. N. Wilcox, A. S. Wilcox and himself, in bringing before the highest medical authorities of the United States the needs, medical and other, of the afflicted people.

BY AUTHORITY.

RULE AND REGULATION BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF AGRICULTURE AND FORESTRY, CONCERNING THE IMPORTATION OR INTRODUCTION INTO THE TERRITORY OF HAWAII OF BIRDS, REPTILES AND INSECTS INJURIOUS OR DETRIMENTAL TO AGRICULTURE, HORTICULTURE OR FORESTRY.

The Board of Commissioners of Agriculture and Forestry hereby make the following Rule and Regulation:

SECTION 1.—For the purpose of preserving and protecting the forests and the agricultural and horticultural interests of the Territory of Hawaii, all persons, companies and corporations are hereby prohibited from importing or introducing into the Territory of Hawaii or into any of its ports for the purpose of debarkation into the said Territory, any live animal or animals known as "Flying Fox" (Pteropus) or "Fruit Eating Bat," or any crustacean known as "Land Crab," or any other animal, bird, reptile or insect injurious or liable to become injurious to forests, trees, plants, or other vegetation of value.

SECTION 2. If any animal, bird, reptile or insect is imported or introduced into the Territory of Hawaii, or into any of its ports for the purpose of debarkation into the Territory of Hawaii, contrary to law or this regulation, the same shall, in the discretion of the Board of Commissioners of Agriculture and Forestry or its duly authorized agent, officer or inspector, be immediately destroyed or deported at the expense of the importer or introducer, and the person or persons or corporation introducing or importing the same shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be liable to the penalty or penalties provided by law.

SECTION 3. This regulation shall take effect from and after the approval thereof by the Governor.

RULE AND REGULATION BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF AGRICULTURE AND FORESTRY, CONCERNING THE IMPORTATION OR INTRODUCTION INTO THE TERRITORY OF HAWAII OF FRESH FRUIT FROM EAST AND WEST INDIES, ASIA, AUSTRALASIA, OCEANIA, MALAY-SIA, MEXICO, CENTRAL AND SOUTH AMERICA.

The Board of Commissioners of Agriculture and Forestry hereby make the following Rule and Regulation:

SECTION 1. For the purpose of preventing the introduction into the Territory of Hawaii of fruit flies, their larvae or pupae and other insects injurious or liable to become injurious to trees, plants, fruit or other vegetation of value, all persons, companies and corporations are hereby prohibited from introducing or importing into the Territory of Hawaii, or into any of its ports for the purpose of debarkation into the said Territory, any fresh fruit from East or West Indies, Asia, Australasia, Oceania, Malaysia, Mexico, Central or South America.

SECTION 2. If any fresh fruit shall be imported or introduced into the Territory of Hawaii, or into any of its

ports for the purpose of debarkation into said Territory, contrary to law or this regulation, the same shall, in the discretion of the Board of Commissioners of Agriculture and Forestry or its duly authorized agent, officer or inspector, be immediately destroyed or deported at the expense of the importer or introducer, and the person or persons or corporation introducing or importing the same shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be liable to the penalty or penalties provided by law.

SECTION 3. This regulation shall take effect from and after the approval thereof by the Governor.
