ARTISTICS CONCERT AT THE YOUNG

Fascinating melodies, both vocal and instrumental, were the pleasing features of the concert given at the Alexander Young Hotel last evening by Mrs. Iola Barber-Ingalls, the violinist, assisted by Mrs. Ranney Scott, soprano; Miss Elise Werthmueller, pianist, and Mrs. Gerard Barton, accompanist. The concert was under the auspices of the Young Women's Christian Association. Although the attendance was not so large as the fine entertainment merited, yet every number on the program gave thorough enjoyment to an appreciative audience.

Mrs. Barber-Ingalls in her selections showed wonderful improvement since her last public appearance in this city a couple of years ago. Her rendering of the Chanson de Berceuse was exquisite, and in the more difficult pieces, especially the Adagio of Bazzini and Grieg's Allegro molto Vivace great artistic ability was displayed.

Mrs. Ranney Scott was heard in "The Waterfall" and "Noontide," the selections which appeared on the program and in a dainty encore solo. Clear and pure in her high notes, her renditions were something to recall as well as to hear, with genuine pleasure.

Miss Elise Werthmueller, one of the most recent additions to the musical colony of Honolulu, won plaudits by her masterful presentation of Rachmanoff's Prelude in C Sharp Minor, where strength and beauty combined to make the number one of intense interest. In Mendelssohn-Liszt's "On Wings of Song," and Sinding's "Spring's Rustle," a rippling, lilted melody, Miss Werthmueller was heard at her best, and was compelled to respond to an encore.

CALIFORNIA GROWERS HELPED BY HAWAII

California fruit growers may, according to information that has been received by the horticultural commissioner of California, be greatly benefited, to the amount of many thousands of dollars, by a proposed move in Hawaii to shut out fruits from portions of the world where insects dangerous to vegetation infest trees and fruit. This will compel purchases here. Alexander Crow, who is now the Hawaiian superintendent of entomology, has recommended to the board of commissioners of agriculture and forestry that all fruits from China, Japan and other Asiatic points shall be denied entrance into Hawaii.

The dreaded fruit fly abounds in these places. These flies belong to the same family as the melon-cucumber fly, against which California has quarantined. So great have been the ravages of the fruit flies that in Queensland and Western Australia fruit can hardly be raised. In Cape Colony, South Africa, fruit trees must be covered with mosquito netting to enable the horticulturists to raise a crop. This makes fruit growing a very expensive business, even where the government buys the netting and furnishes it to the farmers free of cost to them.

Importations of fruit from China and Japan have recently been received at Honolulu in which also were contained the larvae of the Chinese fruit moth.—California Fruit Grower.

TOTAL VOTE FOR DELEGATE

The delayed election returns from the Fifth Precinct of the Sixth District on Kauai, and from the Third Precinct of the First District on Hawaii, have at last been received, and the vote for Delegate to Congress has been tabulated.

The tables show that Kalaniana'ole, Republican, received a total of 6833 votes, Iaukea 2868 votes and Notley 2289. The present delegate therefore received a majority of 1676 votes over both his opponents and a plurality of 3965 votes over the highest of them. The total vote registered was 13,349 and the vote cast was 11,990. There were therefore 1359 voters in the Territory who did not go to the polls. In 1902 the total registered vote was 12,548, the vote cast for delegate was 11,326 and the non-voters numbered 1222.
