The chances are that the occasion of Kuhio's telegram was the arrival of Honolulu files congratulating him on not introducing the Perkins bill in the House.

The Department of Public Instruction must have employed H. C. Birbe by inadvertence or else it is starting a new course of theoretical and applied profanity.

If anybody supposes that vacant judicial places of Hawaii are to be filled at the recommendation of any United States Senator, he is going to be surprised at the news.

The Japanese refused the British medicines sent to Port Arthur from Wei-hai-Wei. It takes a long while for the world to learn that Japan runs its own hospital service as well as its own army and navy. The part of the foreigner is merely to look on and wonder how they do it.

If Gen. Stoessel and his paroled officers are to be sent home via Nagasaki, that probably means a chance for Honolulu to see them en-route. This city would welcome the brave defender of Port Arthur with honors scarcely less than those bestowed upon Prince Fushimi.

Mr. Pinkham's report fared badly at the meeting of the Trade and Labor Council last night, that body turning it down because of its misstatements of fact. When it goes forward, if at all, it will be signed only by Pinkham and his two colleagues of the Builders and Traders' Exchange.

Whitelaw Reid will succeed Joseph H. Choate as Ambassador to Great Britain. The position is one which Mr. Reid has long coveted and for which, in taste and training, he has a special fitness. His constant support of Roosevelt from the time when, in the New York Legislature, the young reformer thundered at Judge Westbrook, has accented the warm regard in which the President has held the Editor of the Tribune for his elevated and consistent public policy.

The Russian prisoners are in for the time of their lives, for Japan treats its captives as guests. They will live in a park, have comfortable houses, baths, hospitals, band music and good food. Officers may, on taking a local parole, visit near-by watering places. The prisoners will be permitted to receive money and other gifts from their friends and, if desired, a church building will be provided in the prison camp for Greek worship. It is fair to say that, from all accounts, the Russians are also treating their prisoners with much consideration.

The Wilcox revolution of 1895 broke out ten years ago yesterday and but one of the claims growing out of it has been paid. It was a coincidence that yesterday one of the ex-prisoners offered his claim at a generous discount with no takers. Foreign governments, whose subjects were imprisoned, have not interested themselves very much in the matter, being apparently convinced that the captives had all a finger in the pot and got off with light punishment. In any other country besides an Anglo-Saxon one, most of these gentlemen would have been drawn up in line and shot. But we're all glad they weren't.

There never was much chance of Mr. Young's selling his hotel to the United States. As a rule of which we remember no exception, the Government either rents or builds; it does not take structures already built for some other purpose and alter them. Whenever Uncle Sam has a million or two of dollars to expend for a public edifice, he prefers to put up the building himself in a way to precisely suit him. That is what may be expected of him here. However, if it eases the public mind to point out the strong objections to the federal purchase of the Young block, and to file protests at Washington, well and good. Such action will have the additional merit of keeping the public building project alive.

ANNUAL TOURNAMENT OF THE JAPANESE WRESTLERS

The Japanese are holding their annual ten-day wrestling tournament at the old Chinese Theater and the spectacle is worth seeing. The affair has been going on since last Tuesday and the more skillful wrestlers are becoming fairly well recognized by this time. The matches proceed from 7 to 11 p. m. and, as in the prize ring, the smaller fry come first. There are representatives from all over the Islands, but so far Honolulu has been more than holding her own, the fishing fraternity being especially well represented.

The little announcer would certainly make his fortune as a clown. A great deal of fun was created when Deputy Sheriff Rawlins sent him three bottles of beer with the statement that he (Rawlins) knew he must be dry. Speaking of gifts, some of the popular wrestlers get more than a year's earnings in presents from admirers during the ten days of the tournament. About \$150 were so bestowed last evening. Things were going along smoothly in the wrestling line until Hatanoya

won his bout in a sensational way by two straight falls. Following along it turned out in nearly every instance that the smaller man won or managed to make the contest a draw.

Last night about 10 o'clock Kashunada, a special favorite, came out and was cheered. He is tall and slender and looks more like a half white than a Japanese. The man against him must have had the advantage in weight by thirty pounds, but the youngster won in two straight throws, without seeming to make an effort. Then came Nestor of the ring. He is a man about 45 years old and is all scarred up. He could not have weighed more than 130 pounds, while his opponent was young and one of the largest Japanese in the city. The first round was a draw both falling together. In the second the elder man won in a sensational manner when it seemed sure he was gone. The third round was by far the longest of the evening. It was age and skill combined against great strength and somewhat less skill. After about five minutes of very active and exhaustive work youth won, making the match a draw.

PRINCE FUSHIMI TO MANAGER LAKE

Manager H. STRANGERS DANCED ON HAWAIIAN'S LANAIS


