The fame of Scott is almost world-wide and his pictures are found in the art galleries of many royal palaces including England, Paris, Berlin, Vienna and in almost every Rajah's palace in India. Up to the time Scott went to India and painted its wealth of scenery, no one in particular had taken up with the idea that India was an artist's paradise, although it had always been described as the land of the Arabian Nights. One of Scott's best paintings represents the vice-regal palace at Simla, including a most beautiful landscape view.

"Hawaii presents a field for the landscape painter," said Mr. Scott yesterday. "The atmosphere is beautiful and is just the sort I prefer. I am sure I will find a wealth of subjects here for my brush."
