**GENEAU'S OWN STORY**  
Everything Clear Up to Fatal Hour.

**Liquor Then Assumes Sway Over His Mind.**

**Defendant Says Nothing About the Tragedy—The Jones Jury.**

E. Geneau's testimony in his own behalf was the principal feature of the murder trial yesterday, taking the greater part of the day. After defendant had given a sketch of his own life, he told of his first meeting with Kennard, the witness for the prosecution, on the Wheeling at Samoa. His only trouble with that witness had been in the performance of his duty, and defendant told the story of these troubles from his view point, differing widely from the tale told by Kennard. As was his duty, he had reported Kennard for uncleanness, and had been ordered to see that Kennard took a bath every day.

**HIS MEMORY FAILS.**

In the evening he was looking in a window at the corner of Nuananu and Hotel streets, when he heard the voice of an apprentice boy calling out, "Don't hit me, Kennard." Turning round he saw Kennard and Harris a few feet away, standing at angles toward each other and the boy at the angle between them. He stepped between Kennard and the boy and told Kennard not to hit the boy. Immediately Harris hit him, Geneau, in the chest and then Kennard gave him a blow upon or under the jaw. He fell to the ground and next he knew sailors were raising him to his feet. All that he recollected thereafter was seeing Harris shaking his fist at him from across the street.

went to the dock with the ship's cook, and being introduced asked defendant to carry some messages to his friends in Samoa. Afterward he met Harris in Samoa when he was a coal passer on the Sonoma. Both meetings were casual. Geneau swore that prior to June 30 he had no hard feelings against either Harris or Kennard.

**CROSS-EXAMINED.**

Attorney General Andrews cross-examined defendant strongly on his powers of memory, trying to get an explanation of how he could recollect some incidents, such as that of Harris shaking his fist at him, and totally forget other incidents of the row on the corner. Witness said he had but a hazy recollection of the fist-shaking yet knew it was correct. There was a crowd on the scene he said, and, when asked if that was a hazy recollection or otherwise, qualified the assertion by saying that a crowd always gathered on such an occasion. Mr. Andrews had by a living diagram on the floor, Geneau showing his position until he fell, and placing Mr. Andrews as Harris, Mr. Douthitt as Kennard and a native clerk of the Attorney General as the apprentice, in the relative positions of the other actors in the original scene.

**JONES CASE PROGRESS.**

Three peremptory challenges exhausted, five new names called and two jurors passed for cause made the record of progress yesterday in empaneling a jury for the Jones murder trial. The drawing of the fifth name exhausted the panel and Judge Robinson then ordered a special venire for fifty jurors, returnable at 10 a. m. Monday.

**SEA WALL ENJOINED.**

L. B. Kerr by his attorneys, Kinney, McClanahan & Cooper, made an answer of general admission to the complaint of the Territory of Hawaii. This was consequent on the recent decision of the Supreme Court, and Judge De Bolt has made a decree accordingly, enjoining defendant against further construction of a sea wall below high water mark at Waikiki and ordering him to remove all structures and filling heretofore placed there by him, the decree to be carried out and fulfilled within ten days after a written notice by the Attorney General.

**DIVORCE GRANTED.**

Judge Robinson granted a divorce to Justina Franca against A. F. Franca, awarding the children to libellant, A. G. M. Robertson for libellant, J. J. Dunne for libellee.

**FIGHTS PETITION IN BANKRUPTCY**

I. Livingston is fighting the petition to have him placed in bankruptcy. He has entered a demurrer upon several grounds. It is not alleged, he sets forth, whether the petitioning creditors, or which of them, are copartnerships or corporations. The petition is uncertain because it is impossible to tell therefrom who are the petitioning creditors, the names of the persons composing the firms, if they be firms, not being stated. It is claimed that the petitioning creditors have no capacity to sue, and a defect of parties is alleged, in that it does not appear that the petition was filed by five creditors, each having the capacity to sue. The petition is said to be improperly verified. Cecil Brown, as attorney for petitioners, not showing his authority to subscribe and verify the petition. Finally, it is said to be nowhere alleged that the alleged bankrupt is not a person engaged chiefly in farming or tilling the soil.

**SOCIETIES IN GOOD WORK**

**The Annual Meeting of Children's Helpers.**

The Free Kindergarten and Children's Aid Society held its annual meeting yesterday at Haaalea hall, Mrs. Elizabeth Waterhouse presiding. After a hymn and reading of Scripture the Rev. E. Turner made the opening prayer.

The Recording Secretary's report was then read by Miss Elsie Waterhouse and various reports followed. These reports cover a period of fifteen months as the time of the annual meeting has been changed during the year from October to January. The Treasurer's report shows that while the association is far from being wealthy, a wise economy has prevailed and a balance of over \$100 stands to the new account.

Miss Lawrence read a very interesting report from which the following items are culled. The total enrollment in Honolulu kindergartens is 498. Of these 132 are Hawaiian, 111 Portuguese, 106 Japanese, 87 Chinese and 23 scattering. There are fifteen young ladies in the training class for teachers, three of whom were interested in the work because they had been pupils in the school at Queen Emma Hall.

Mrs. Thompson, whose valuable work in the Sanitary Department can hardly be over-estimated, gave an interesting report of wounds bound up, eyes cared for and a general helpfulness extended to the neglected little ones. This department certainly deserves liberal support for the need is very great. In spite of care there are many neglected children in our streets. Those who attend the kindergartens are especially fortunate.
