HAWAIIAN ELECTRIC ADJOURNED MEETING

The annual meeting of the Hawaiian Electric Company, which was slated for yesterday, was adjourned to meet in ten days. The by-laws call for the annual meeting to be held in January, but as the company's books cannot be made up to strike off a report in that month, an adjournment has generally been taken to the next month.

PAHALA IS TO BE REPLANTED

At the meeting of the directors of the Hawaiian Agricultural Company, whose plantations are in the district of Kau, island of Hawaii, the old board of directors was re-elected. The report of the manager was presented and will shortly be issued to the shareholders.

There was no crop estimate to report, owing to the fact that the leaf hopper ravaged Pahala plantation and made inroads into the Hutchinson properties.

A director stated yesterday after the meeting that Mr. Sweazy of the Sugar Planters' Experiment Station, would shortly leave for Pahala with lady-bird parasites recently brought here from Australia, and will establish the same at Pahala to prey on the leaf hopper. The successful fight waged with lady-birds on Oahu has made it possible for the planters to place entire faith in their ability to completely wipe out the leaf hopper in Kau district. Mr. Sweazy goes first to Hutchinson plantation, then to Pahala, and he will afterwards make the rounds of Olaa, Puna, Hilo and Hamakua districts.

The parasite stings the eggs of the leaf hopper and thus destroys it before it becomes old and large enough to do any harm.

The Hawaiian Agricultural Company is replanting Pahala entirely with Yellow Caladonia cane, which is hard, and has generally withstood the attacks of the leaf hopper. Two thousand acres will be planted which will be the crop for 1907.

The lady-birds which are being propagated at the Sugar Planters' Experiment Station are marvels. One is said to have laid six hundred eggs since her arrival here from Australia. This particular bird, with others was sent here by Prof. Koebele, the Planters' special entomological representative in Australia, who with Prof. Perkins has been finding parasites to prey against the leaf hopper.

The work of the entomological department at the Planters' Experiment Station is voluminous and has all-important results to achieve.

THE STOCK EXCHANGE

Four Million Dollar Business is Done.

Four million dollars and more represents the total of the sugar and commercial stock sales of the Honolulu Stock and Bond Exchange for the month of January, 1905. On Thursday of last week the biggest single day's transactions were recorded, in which \$600,000 were invested.

This is an enormous total for the handling of sugar and other stocks in the city of Honolulu. Much of it represents investments for stock which have been held in San Francisco. The movement to bring stocks back to Honolulu from San Francisco began early in the month.

The report of the Stock Exchange for the month of January gives the following facts, compiled up to the close of yesterday's business:

- Of the above the sale of 2514 shares of Wilder Steamship stock, bought by the Inter-Island Steamship Company, the forerunner of a merger between the two companies, was one of the largest single transactions, the stock going at 150 per share.

STOCKS ARE DORMANT.

While big dividends were paid by the sugar plantations yesterday stock selling and buying became somewhat dormant. At the same time there was a slight movement in prices. Kihel wavered between 14 at the morning session, to 16 at the afternoon session, at which latter time some stock changed hands. Ewa failed to move from 32. Ookala sold at 19 in the afternoon, Honokaa at 23, Oahu Sugar at 145 to 147.50, Hawaiian Sugar at 34.

The following dividends were paid yesterday: Ewa, 1 per cent; Brewer & Co., 2 per cent; Honomu, 2 per cent; Waimanalo, 1 per cent; Inter-Island, 1 per cent; Waiialua, 2 per cent; Hawaiian Electric, 1 per cent (an increase of one-half of 1 per cent); Haiku, 1 per cent; Pala, 1 per cent; Pioneer, 1 per cent; Honokaa, 1/2 per cent.

Another batch of dividends is to be paid today.

A feature of yesterday's stock transactions was the receipt of a cablegram from San Francisco by Halstead & Co., showing that of twenty shares of Hawaiian Commercial which the brokers had sent to San Francisco, ten were sold at 88.50 and five at 86.57 1/2, leaving five unsold. The cablegram concluded with the statement that the sugar stock market was "weak and depressed."
