At the annual meeting of the stockholders of the Oceanic Steamship Co. at the office of the corporation, 327 Market street, San Francisco, the announcement was made that the loss on the year was \$182,217.77. The over-draft due J. D. Spreckels & Bros. Company now amounts to \$1,710,883.13, an increase during the year of \$153,440.41. John D. Spreckels, the president, in his address to the stockholders, assigned the season's loss to the advent of stronger competition and the new tariff laws of New Zealand and Australia. The old board of directors were re-elected.

MANCHURIA FILLED UP WITH FREIGHT

The Pacific Mail steamship Manchuria arrived off port yesterday morning about 10:30 and departed from that anchorage shortly after 8 o'clock last night for Yokohama, Manila and Hongkong. The vessel is loaded with cargo for the Orient, but not a pound for Honolulu. She carries 14,000 tons cargo, measurement, or about 7000 tons dead weight. She had a heavy passenger list.

Among the saloon passengers for Honolulu were G. R. Field and bride of San Francisco, who will spend their honeymoon here. Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Brown returned from New England and are again at the Hawaiian Hotel.

Bishop Restarick, who has been East to look after his son, who was ill, returned after a long absence. On the way back the Bishop was in a train wreck on the Santa Fe near Stockton, Cal., but escaped injury. He was ill at the time and the shock of the collision made him worse. Thomas Dunn, yeoman at the naval station came back, arriving a day later than his wife, who returned on the Sheridan. Mr. Dunn had gone up to the coast to meet his wife, but missed her there.

T. C. Ridgway of Hilo, and Mrs. J. A. Scott and daughter, will remain here until a steamer is available to take them to Hawaii.

H. H. Williams and wife returned from an extended trip East. Dr. Walter Hoffmann is back from a business trip. Mrs. M. A. Stansbury comes to visit with her daughter, Miss Ella Stansbury.

The larger part of the passengers for Honolulu are tourists. Among the through passengers is Captain Cowles, U. S. N., brother-in-law of President Roosevelt, on his way to the Asiatic station. Captain Cowles was in command of the battleship Missouri when the turret explosion occurred, in which Midshipman "Ned" Neumann of Honolulu lost his life.

Wong Kai Kah, Chinese commissioner to the World's Fair, and family are returning to China, the former having closed up the Empire's affairs at St. Louis. Judge Charles Willard of the Philippine judiciary is returning to Manila; Surgeon Braisted, U. S. N., is en route to the Asiatic station; Carl Leeger of the North German Lloyd Steamship Company is making a tour of the world; Count Tejima, Japanese World's Fair commissioner, is returning to Yokohama; George Hooper and three young ladies of San Francisco are making a tour to include the Philippines, China and Japan.

More than two hundred Japanese, who went across from Japan to San Francisco in the Manchuria direct, were landed here yesterday. The vessel had a rough trip, and although a huge steamship, she did some rolling.

THE LOGAN MADE PASSENGERS HURRY

The sudden coming of the transport Logan from Manila, at least a couple of days ahead of schedule time, created no end of worry here among people who were to depart for San Francisco on the vessel.

The early time for departure—9 a. m. yesterday—did not leave any too much margin, for many had not yet secured their authority for transportation. Among those who did get away were Mrs. Francis Moore, wife of Brigadier General Moore, and Miss Moore, who have been stopping at the Hawaiian Hotel. Lieutenant Slatery, Engineer Corps, U. S. A., departed for the coast to be married this month to one of the Bradley girls who visited here with Princess Kawananakoa last summer. The lieutenant and bride will return here next month.

Frank Hatch of the United States District Court also secured passage and went away for a few week's vacation. Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Raven managed to get aboard about the last moment. Mr. Raven is chief inspector of the Customs force. Bert Webster, formerly of the United States Revenue office, and wife also departed. They may remain permanently on the mainland.

A large amount of old quartermaster's supplies of the National Guard of Hawaii was shipped to be forwarded to Benicia arsenal. The stuff comprised old guns, etc.

Rains on Hawaii.

Purser Conkling of the steamer Mauna Loa, which arrived yesterday from Kau and other Hawaii ports, reports that Hamakua has been visited by a heavy and welcome rain. Kau, however, failed to receive any moisture from the clouds. Showers were quite light in Kona. The Mauna Loa brought a cargo of cattle, sugar and coffee. Among the returning passengers were United States Judge Doie and Clerk Maling, who have been holding court

at Hilo. The Mauna Loa goes out again next Tuesday.

Brought Big Cargo.

After a voyage of seven days and eighteen hours, rough nearly all the way, the A-H. steamship Nevada arrived yesterday morning from San Francisco. She left San Francisco January 26, twenty-four hours after the Sheridan. Four thousand tons of cargo were brought for Honolulu, and there were also 163 packages of mail for Honolulu. On the deck was a consignment of stock, among which were several blooded horses consigned to Chas. Bellina. The Nevada will leave for Kahului Sunday afternoon, whence, after taking on sugar, she will sail for San Francisco.

Shipping Notes.

The bark Annie Johnson is bringing a cargo worth \$32,231.

The French cruiser Protet is still in a San Francisco dry dock.

Seven cases of yellow fever are on board the cruiser Boston at Panama. The R. P. Rithet arrived at San Francisco Jan. 24, twelve days from Honolulu.

Purser Niswander of the Doric has resigned and will go into business in the Orient.

The U. S. S. Adams has been condemned. She will be roofed over and left at Pago-Pago.

The schooner Emily F. Whitney will load general merchandise at this port for Honolulu and Makawell.—S. F. Examiner.

The Arizonan is supposed to have sailed from San Francisco for Honolulu last Saturday. The Sherman was scheduled to leave on Wednesday. The agents for the American-Hawaiian S. S. Line expect the Arizonan to arrive here from San Francisco tomorrow. She will bring a general cargo.

W. G. Irwin & Co. have been advised that the S. S. Sonoma left San Francisco for this port, fourteen hours late. The vessel sailed yesterday at 4 p. m.

The ship Abner Coburn has left Tacoma for Callao, Peru, with lumber, whence she goes to Newcastle to load coal for Honolulu. From here she will carry sugar to San Francisco.

The cableship Burnside, off Sitka, raised a severed end of the Alaska cable and found a dead whale attached to it. The jaws of the monster were securely held by the rubber, copper and packing.

Dr. Hauxhurst of the S. S. Coptic has passed examinations for the medical service of the Marine Hospital Service. He has been assigned to the department at Nagasaki. Dr. Hauxhurst was at one time surgeon aboard the S. S. America Maru.

F. H. Coker, clerk in the army quartermaster's office, departed yesterday on the Sheridan for Manila to take a position in the quartermaster department there. Mr. Humphreys, late of the Engineer's force of the army, departed on the Logan for San Francisco

FULL INDEXING MADE OF THE ORGANIC ACT

The act passed by Congress creating a government for Hawaii repeals and amends scores of civil and criminal statutes previously enacted by Hawaiian legislatures.

No man knows what is in the Organic Act except through the medium of an index. The previously printed copies of this law in use in Hawaii contain only 657 indexed subjects.

The index of the Organic Act in the "Fundamental Law of Hawaii" contains 1399 indexed subjects and cross references.

REPEALED LAWS NOT HERETOFORE INDEXED.
