MOSQUITO CAMPAIGN

Board of Health May Take Over the Work.

At a meeting of the Advisory Committee of the Citizens' Mosquito Committee held on October 24, 1904, it was agreed that it was manifestly unjust to continue the work of investigation and control of the mosquito nuisance on the subscriptions of private citizens since the work benefited the people of the Territory as a whole not only as regards the comfort of individuals, the value of real estate, tourist travel, and other interests of citizens, but that by controlling the yellow fever species the health of the entire Territory was guarded. The advisory committee submitted their opinions to the general committee and suggested that a special committee on legislation be appointed to obtain if possible an appropriation from the coming legislature for carrying on the mosquito work and provide for the work being undertaken by some department of the government. Dr. Cooper, acting chairman of the committee in the absence of Mr. Pinkham, called a meeting of the general committee, which was held October 28, 1904. This meeting accepted the report of the advisory committee and it was voted that the chairman of the general committee appoint a special committee of five on legislation. Mr. Pinkham on his return to Honolulu made the following appointments:

Dr. C. B. Cooper, chairman; Dr. F. R. Day, Dr. L. E. Cofer, D. L. Van Dine and W. A. Bryan.

This committee, after carefully considering the question and corresponding with such men as Dr. L. O. Howard, Chief of the Bureau of Entomology, U. S. Department of Agriculture; Dr. John B. Smith, State Entomologist of New Jersey, in charge of the mosquito control work, and Mr. Henry Clay Weeks, Secretary of the National Mosquito Extermination Society, at a meeting held last Friday evening, adopted the following resolutions:

Whereas, Mosquitoes are common and abundant throughout the Territory of Hawaii and do by their presence seriously affect the comfort of citizens, the value of real estate, tourist travel and other interests of the Territory, and are a menace to health, since it has been definitely determined that the Cuban yellow fever species, *Stegomyia fasciata*, is established throughout the islands, thus making an epidemic of this dreaded disease of the tropics possible if once introduced; and

Whereas, Through the efforts of a Citizens' Mosquito Committee, acting in conjunction with the Board of Health, the Department of Public Works and the Bureau of Survey, it has been found possible to reduce the numbers of mosquitoes in and about the city of Honolulu by at least fifty per cent in one year's work; and

Whereas, The money for carrying on the work has been subscribed by a comparatively few public-spirited citizens to the amount of from two to three hundred dollars per month; and

Whereas, The Hawaii Experiment Station has determined the species of mosquitoes responsible for the nuisance has worked out their habits, life-histories and breeding places and this data together with the experience of the committee in the work of control for the past year is sufficient to enable an organization with the proper authority and financial aid to further reduce the numbers of mosquitoes in general throughout the Territory; and

Whereas, Since the work of mosquito control is a public service and to become effective must be a permanent affair, comparable with other functions of the government, as the garbage system, street cleaning, etc., and since it is manifestly unjust to indefinitely support a public service on the subscriptions of private individuals, therefore, be it resolved:

1. That it is the opinion of this committee that the work of mosquito control should be placed under the supervision of the Territorial Board of Health.

2. That a sum of money of at least \$200 per month is necessary to carry on the work as already inaugurated by the Citizens' Mosquito Committee and that the legislature now in session is urged to appropriate to the Board of Health for mosquito control work in general throughout the Territory of Hawaii the sum of \$7200 for the coming biennial period.

3. That the work should be placed in charge of a Superintendent who shall be a person well qualified by experience or training to outline and carry on the work of mosquito extermination under methods now known to be effective and practical, whose salary shall be not more than \$150 per month, whose assistance shall be such as is in the opinion of the Board of Health necessary and who shall be especially instructed to continue the work of investigation of the subject with reference to local conditions.

4. That the Board of Health should enact such rules and regulations as are necessary to enable them to deal with the problem in all its phases and that it shall be the duty of the Superintendent to have printed such rules and regulations, together with recommendations and other information regarding the extermination of mosquitoes and distribute same to the residents of the Territory.

5. That it should be the further duty of the Superintendent to prepare for publication, at least once in three months, a report on the progress of the work with definite recommendations for the solution of the various problems connected with the work of extermination and the same, when en-

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
