THE SENATORS GROW SOMEWHAT ORATORICAL

Achi Provokes Storm Trying to Find Out What it Will Cost to Run the Proposed Counties.

The Senators, in despite of the fact that they had been present in force at Governor Carter's first official reception Thursday night, gathered early for the business of the day yesterday and really seemed to be in fine trim for their work. A little playtime is a good thing for old boys, too.

The Senate has caught up with its work, and for a little time toward the close of the session yesterday it was thought that an adjournment would be taken over to Monday so that the committees could also catch up, but the chance passed and there will be a session today. The Senate, however, has got all its measures well in hand, and there will be a number of important bills on final reading at Monday's session. After these are disposed of, the session may possibly lag a little waiting the report of the County Act Committee.

The House also dispatched business in creditable fashion, with less tendency to oratory than usual. There was a slight unpleasantness when Representative Kaniho took exceptions to the work of Carl Smith's reference committee. Later Mr. Kaniho went before the committee, and expressed satisfaction at the disposition that had been made of his bills. And so that unpleasantness was a thing of the past. Representative Quinn introduced a bill that mends the Sunday law so radically as almost to wipe it out of existence.

There was a little stir in the corridors during the noon recess at a report that the translators had formed a hui and would not do any more work for less than 50 cents a folio, the price fixed by the printing committee being 35 cents. A member of the so-called hui had, it was said, gone to an outside translator and threatened him with deep legislative displeasure if he did some work that had been given him for less than fifty cents. The outsider went to chairman Greenwell of the printing committee for advice, and the chairman laughed at him.

"There was one man who refused to do work for less than 50 cents," said Mr. Greenwell, "but if there is a hui I do not know anything about it. The man who is said to have made the threat has been to me and taken work at 35 cents this afternoon. There seem to be plenty of translators, and they are willing to work at the price set."

And so a story of possible graft goes glimmering.

THE LEGISLATURE--EIGHTH DAY.

THE SENATE.

There was some little oratory in the Senate yesterday over a resolution introduced by Achi intended to get at exactly what part of the tax levy it would take to carry on the new counties, provided that there are to be any new counties, it being the sense of the Senate, apparently, that Achi was asking for something that it would be impossible to get at this time.

"He is jumping across his bridges before he gets to them," said Dowsett. "The spirit of the resolution is all right," said Bishop, "but Senator Achi is asking us to fulfill an impossible condition. He wants something that does not exist."

Achi spoke at some length in support of his resolution, claiming that it covered a plain business proposition, but in order to remove any vagueness in the matter, he consented to modify it so as to make the information sought relate to the counties that might be created under the bill presented by the County Act Commissioners. In that form the resolution passed. It is as follows:

"Be it resolved by the Senate, the House of Representatives concurring; that the Committee of Ways and Means of the Senate, and the similar Committee of the House of Representatives are hereby appointed a Joint Committee of the Legislature of the year 1923; said Joint Committee is hereby ordered to make, or prepare and report to either House within five days an estimate of the expenses of the following Counties, in case a County Act would be passed by this Legislature: East Hawaii, West Hawaii, Maui County, Oahu County, and Kauai County, according to the form proposed by the County Commission."

GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE.

The day's session opened with a message from the Governor to the effect that he had signed the joint resolution instructing the delegate in Congress to work for the passage of a law appropriating \$150,000 for the scientific study of leprosy.

An invitation was received from Superintendent of Schools Atkinson inviting the Senators to be present at the opening of Royal School. The Committee on Education was instructed to accept the invitation.

The Committee on Education reported in favor of appropriating \$1500 for a school at Honoupa, Hawaii, said appropriation to be immediately expended out of the unappropriated balance in the loan fund. It was explained that there is an unexpended balance of something like \$17,000 from which this money could be drawn. There was a lot of discussion, the resolution being at last returned to the committee for correction.

The Judiciary Committee reported recommending that House Joint resolution No. 3 be laid on the table. The report follows:

"Your Judiciary Committee to whom was referred House Joint Resolution No. 3, beg leave to report as follows: The idea of the resolution is a good one. But we are of the opinion that the Legislature of the Territory of Hawaii have ample power under Section 73 of the Organic Act to pass a law or laws which would enable homesteaders to construct roads to their holdings

and apply the value of their labor thereon to the purchase price. We therefore recommend that the joint resolution may be laid on the table."

The report was adopted.

IMPROVING DIAMOND HEAD ROAD.

The Committee on Public Lands, to which was referred Senate petition No. 2, asking for an appropriation of \$35,000 for the lighting, fencing, widening and improvement of the Diamond Head, reported that it had secured estimates on this work from the Superintendent of Public Works and would recommend that the following be inserted in the Appropriation Bill:

Fencing Diamond Head road, 5549 feet of road, \$2,745.00; cost of widening road from Campbell's place along same and Kuleana, provided the owners donate the land required for such widening, \$2,10.

"Under the present financial situation of the Territory we do not believe it advisable to expend any further amounts for the improvement of this road at the present time. Such improvements might come later.

"And your committee further recommends that the report with the petition be laid on the table to be considered with the Appropriation Bill."

The report was adopted. Lane withdrew his petition offered yesterday, and presented the following, which was adopted:

Resolved, by the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Legislature of the Territory of Hawaii: That, in recognition of the valuable services rendered by the members of the Code Commission and the County Act Commission, the Secretary of the Territory of Hawaii be and is hereby authorized to present to each member of said Commissions and the clerks thereof, a copy of the Revised Laws of Hawaii and of the Session Laws of 1923.

BURN OLD WARRANTS.

Achi offered the following, which went to the Ways and Means Committee with instructions to learn the desires of the Territorial Treasurer:

"Be it resolved by the Senate, the House of Representatives concurring; that the Committee of Ways and Means of the Senate, and the similar Committee of the House of Representatives, are hereby appointed a Joint Committee of the Legislature of the year 1923; said Joint Committee is hereby authorized and empowered to burn up or destroy all paid up warrants of the government which were paid on or before December 31st, A. D. 1922; and all actions of said Joint Committee relating to the same are hereby approved by the Legislature."

A series of resolutions from Dickey appropriated various sums for the construction of roads on Maui. Public Lands Committee.

Achi introduced a bill, which passed first reading, amending sections 249, 251 and 247 of the Civil Code.

Dowsett introduced a bill, which passed first reading, to amend section 2-A of Act 51 of the sessions laws of 1922, relating to internal taxes.

THE REGULAR ORDER.

On the regular order of business, Senate Bill 45, to regulate laundering, passed second reading and comes up for

third reading on Monday. This is the substitute for the bill forbidding the spraying of washed clothes from the mouth in the process of starching.

Senate Bill 31, defining the duties of the Registrar of Conveyances, came up on second reading and read section by section, was passed on second reading. It will be read for the third time on Monday, February 27.

Senate Bill 32, to regulate the investment of funds by trustees, came up on second reading and was referred to the Ways and Means Committee.

Senate Bill 33, providing for the indexing of records in the office of the Registrar of Conveyances. On second reading it went to the Ways and Means Committee.

Senate Bill 34, authorizing the use of typewriters in keeping public records. To Public Expenditure Committee on second reading.

Senate Bill 37, providing a penalty for the wrongful taking, detention, alteration, erasure or mutilation of any public record. Went to the Judiciary Committee on second reading.

Senate Bill 38, to amend section 1473 of the Civil Laws of 1897, permitting postponement of sale of property sold under execution. Went to Judiciary Committee on second reading.

DISPOSING OF GARBAGE.

A long communication was received from the Superintendent of Public Works telling the Senators all about the collection and disposition of garbage in Honolulu, and the expense of handling it. The communication was referred to the Committee on Public Expenditures. Dickey expressing the belief that the garbage disposition could be made a matter of profit instead of expense.

From the Health Committee, Kalamia reported favorably on the bill for the proper sanitation of barber shops. It was amended to make the penalty for violation a fine of not to exceed \$25, and then passed second reading. It will come up for final disposition on Monday.

The Health Committee reported favorably on the garbage bill, and after it had been amended so as to apply to all portions of the Territory, it passed second reading. It comes up for passage Monday.

The Hayselden milk bill, favorably reported by the Health Committee, went to the Revision Committee upon Dickey's discovery that the English of it was bad.

"Who ever heard of keeping milk under a container?" asked the gentleman from Maui.

The Achi County Act was referred to the County Act Joint Special Committee, and the Senate adjourned after Dickey had given notice that the Railroad Committee would meet on Monday at 4 p. m.

THE HOUSE.

Yesterday was a day of real work in the House of Representatives, for while there was not a great deal of oratory, there was a business-like discussion of bills submitted after having passed the ordeal of the Committee on Public Lands and Internal Improvements.

A rift in the lute was apparent, however, when Rep. Kaniho objected to being called on to explain the object of one of his bills to the Reference Committee and his objection seemed almost certain to crystallize into a general protest if Chairman Smith's Committee of Reference should constitute itself rather into a Committee of Revision.

RESOLUTIONS REPORTED.

Chairman Mahelona of the Committee on Public Lands and Internal Improvements reported on the following resolutions:

For an appropriation of \$2,500 for a court house and jail in the district of Kawaihau, Kauai. Recommended.

For \$20,000 for the extension of Pua street from King to School street extension. Recommended.

For \$6,000 for completing the road from Kaola to Kalaupapa in Puna, Hawaii. Recommended.

For \$20,000 for the extension of Vineyard street to Kalili street. Refused.

For \$2,500 for a road from Kikulu to Hanalei. Recommended.

For \$15,000 for macadamizing the Waialae road. Recommended that \$8,400 be appropriated for macadamizing from Kaulani avenue to Isenberg's Waialae ranch.

For \$8,000, new bridges and culverts for Waimea district, \$1,000 for repairing road through Waimea village; \$6,000 for concrete piers for Hanapepe bridge and \$5,000 for roads and bridges, general. Waimea. Recommended.

For \$1,000 repairs to main road from Kukuhale village to top of Waipio pali, Hamakua, and for \$1,500 for repairs to road on the Pali o Kalaupapa, Waipio. Recommended.

For \$20,000, new road from Nuhli, Kohala, to the Honokane Nui gulch; \$3,000 new road from Mahukona to Puakea; for \$5,000 for road from Nuhli to Kalaupapa. Refused as unnecessary.

For \$12,000 to repair government road from Waimea court house to Kawaihau landing. Refused, as the road needs no repairs.

For \$22,200 for new bridges and culverts, Koloa; \$540 for relocating portion of Lihue road. Recommended. For \$12,455, macadamizing roads in and near Koloa; recommended that \$5,000 be appropriated for roads and bridges. For \$200 per month for roads in Koloa district. Disallowed.

For \$40,000 for the extension of Queen street to Wahakamilo road. Recommended.

For \$2,500 for new court house, jail and offices at North Hilo. Recommended. For \$3,000 for school house at Laupahoehoe and \$2,000 for school at Pohakupuka; referred to the Committee on Education.

For \$100,000 for constructing a waterworks system in Manoa. Refused, as the government is not owner of the water rights in Manoa valley. Rep. Andrade dissented from the finding of the committee and on his motion the report was tabled. It will be considered in connection with the Appropriation Bill.

For \$2,000 for Kaupo bridge in Waialua; for \$3,000 for Kalka bridge; for \$3,000 for Paukuaia bridge and for \$4,000 for bridges, piers and abutments across Keamania, Mokualea and Kawaihapa gulches; recommended to

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read \$15,000 for bridges and approaches in Waialua. For \$6,000 for new road from new Paukuaia bridge to Mokualea. Disallowed.

THE REFERENCE COMMITTEE.

The Reference Committee, by Chairman Smith, reported on the following matters:

Joint Resolution of Rep. Puaia to amend Section 83, referred back to the House, as it was a concurrent, not a joint resolution.

House Bill 53, Rep. Smith, recommended to table as other measures before the House involve the same subject.

House Bill 61, Rep. Kaniho, to provide for payment of claims for damages for persons imprisoned in 1895. Recommended discussed on the floor of the House before being printed.

House Bill 70, Rep. Waterhouse, to protect owners of bottles, boxes, siphons, etc., used in the sale of aerated waters, beer and medical preparations. Recommended tabled until the Senate Bill on the same subject reaches the House.

House Bill 89, Rep. Kaniho, to regulate the sale of goods, wares and merchandise. Recommended tabled as there is a general license bill before the House.

The report was adopted.

WHERE KANIHO KICKED.

It was over a second report of the Reference Committee that Rep. Kaniho made his protest. The report asked that the framers of different bills should appear before the committee and explain the objects of their suggested legislation and to this he objected strongly.

As a matter of fact it would have made no difference if the report had been filed rejected, tabled, passed, referred back or given a six months hoist as it was merely a request, but the House chose to debate it and finally, on Rep. Harris's motion, the matter was tabled.

REVISED LAWS PASSED.

Senate Bill No. 16, an act to enact the Revised Laws, passed its third reading on motion of Rep. Harris, seconded by Rep. Andrade.

Rep. Coelho voted against the reading, stating that he had discovered several mistakes in the new code.

THE FIRST REGIMENT.

Communications were considered at the afternoon session of the House.

Col. J. W. Jones of the First Regiment wrote that the only paid officer of the National Guard is the Janitor of the Drillshed who gets \$20 a month. He recommends that this be increased to \$40 a month and also that a permanent clerk at \$75 a month should be employed to perform the necessary work of the regiment.

A Senate concurrent resolution was read requesting the treasurer to supply a statement of the amount of taxes paid from the following places during 1924: East Hawaii, West Hawaii, Second Circuit, Oahu, Fifth Circuit. The resolution was adopted.

QUINN'S SUNDAY BILL.

Rep. Quinn introduced a bill to amend the act regulating the Sabbath. It was read a first time by title. The bill provides that all labor on Sunday is forbidden but that this shall not apply to newspaper printing offices, steamship companies, railroads, telegraph and telephone companies, hotels, inns, restaurants, cigar stores, ice cream parlors, soda water stands, drug stores, livery stable, hackmen, owners and operators of licensed shore boats, news depots, farmers, graxiers, ranchmen, electric light plants, gas works and slaughter houses. During the entire day milk, bread and ice may be sold and delivered and until nine in the forenoon fresh meat, fish, fruit and vegetables may be sold and delivered. Barber shops may be kept

open until 11 o'clock. The section respecting amusements is amended to read that no sport or game shall be played in such a manner as to be a common nuisance on Sunday.

RESOLUTIONS INTRODUCED.

During yesterday's session the following resolutions were introduced and passed on to the Reference Committee:

To appropriate \$5000 for repairs to bridges, \$2000 for culverts, \$4000 for general road work, and \$3000 for Kalaupapa breakwater, all in Koolauloa. (Rep. Cox).

For \$600 for the erection of a shed for Waimea landing. (Rep. Sheidon).

For \$22,150 for schools on Maui, Molokai and Lanai. (Rep. Hala).

For \$20,000 to complete the Manoa road. (Rep. Andrade).

For \$5000 to erect schools at Laupahoehoe and Pohakupuka. (Rep. Fernandez).

For \$20,000 to erect a new fire station at the corner of Maunakea and Pauahi streets, Honolulu. (Rep. Mahelona).

For \$3500 for a new fire station near Judd and Nuuanu streets, Honolulu. (Rep. Mahelona).

A joint resolution for the giving of a bounty for coffee raising was submitted by Rep. Greenwell and was received.

To appropriate \$40,000 for the new Pauoa road. (Rep. Liliikalani).

To appropriate \$10,000 for adding 50 new fire alarm boxes to the Honolulu system. (Rep. Mahelona).

To appropriate \$3000 for a beach road from Honouapo to Punaluu. (Rep. Puaia).

For \$950 for a teacher's cottage at Waialua, Molokai. (Rep. Nakuina).

For appropriation of \$870 for a new chemical engine, horses, harness and supplies for new hose company at Judd and Nuuanu streets. (Rep. Waterhouse).

For \$22,000 for the establishment of a new hose company at Kalihi near Gulick road. (Rep. Mahelona).

The bills introduced were:
To quarantine live animals. (Rep. Fernandez).

To regulate veterinary medicine, surgery and dentistry. (Rep. Andrade). The House rose at noon.

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
