AGRICULTURAL INDUSTRY AT LAHAINALUNA SEMINARY


An idea of the agricultural activity at Lahainaluna Seminary will be gained from the accompanying photographs made by the Advertiser's art department.

"We started the taro patches at Lahainaluna which had not been touched for a very large number of years," Superintendent A. T. Atkinson said, on behalf of the Department of Public Instruction, to a reporter.


"I have striven, since I have been Superintendent, to bring for-

ward that kind of work. It is reported to me now that there are forty patches planted. There are a number of others from which the lantana is being cleared off and they will be planted very shortly.

"Not only will the work done by these boys be of essential help to themselves in their life work, but we shall be able to save the Territory a considerable amount of money by raising a goodly portion of the school's food supply. That was the essential idea when the school was first established.

"Yes, Mr. McDonald is the principal and the highest meed of praise you may accord him for his management of Lahainaluna I am prepared to endorse.

"Lahainaluna is aiming, as the Advertiser has intimated, to earn the \$25,000 of annual subsidy from the Department of Agriculture (Washington) for an agricultural college in this Territory, and there are excellent hopes that the efforts to that end will be successful."

A STEAM RAILROAD THROUGH THE CITY

Editor Advertiser: Public attention should be called to the fact that a bill is being seriously considered by the Senate which would authorize the construction of a steam railroad along the entire length of Queen street, the Beach road to Waikiki, through Kapiolani Park, and around the point of Diamond Head. If this bill passes, Honolulu will be cut off from its waterfront and we shall have a series of grade crossings, with gates and flagmen, which if the experience of scores of cities be any guide, will be removed by the next generation at enormous expense. The taking of the Beach road and the invasion of Kapiolani Park can only be described as vandalism.

At the last meeting of the Senate Committee the only opponents of this plan were two corporations whose interests would be injuriously affected. The hearing was adjourned till Monday at 3 p. m. Should not the merchants of Queen street, the property owners at Waikiki, and the various organizations which are trying to make and keep our city beautiful have something to say at this hearing?

Carpenter Wagner's Case.

Editor Advertiser: In reply to Mr. Chas. Wagner's assertion that he is unable to obtain work from the planters I beg to state the following, which may throw some light on the subject

and explain why Mr. Wagner is out of work at all.

About two years ago Mr. Wagner was offered a permanent position at our factory as carpenter at \$3.50 per day, which he declined, stating that he was then earning \$4 per day, working for contractors. Here was a permanent position in view, which was declined owing to the fact that somewhat higher wages were paid for temporary employment. This is no doubt short sightedness, for which Mr. Wagner is reaping his reward, and instead of blaming himself he blames the planters now.


The Kahuku Meeting

Kahuku Plantation Co. had its annual meeting yesterday, when very favorable reports were submitted. Net proceeds for 1904 were \$415,515.33, and after permanent improvements were deducted there was a surplus of \$370,957.79. This was despite a loss from floods of \$75,000. The directors announced a 3 per cent dividend for March 1 and a monthly dividend of 1 per cent thereafter. Manager Andrew Adams figured a yield of 7000 tons for 1905 from 1460 acres. Officers for this year are: W. R. Castle, president; C. M. Cooke, vice president; J. P. Cooke, treasurer; Geo. M. Rolph, secretary; D. B. Murdoch, auditor; Geo. F. Davies and L. T. Peck, with the first three officers, directors.
