

# SHARK NOW WEAKENING

## The Big Fish Has Eaten Nothing for Fifty-Seven Days.

"Dat shark is not half so big already as he was when I saw him three weeks ago. I will give him eight days to live yet."

Thus a Danish tourist in a cork helmet, hanging over the fence about the tank and looking down upon the big fish, lying prostrated at the bottom of the pool. As a matter of fact, the gentleman's memory was defective, and the shark was just as big as it ever has been. But it was not feeling very chipper yesterday, all the same. It showed a disposition to sulk at the bottom, and to be still in the corners of its tank, only coming up at long intervals, when the big turtles tickled it with their flippers, and then not having sufficient energy to make the complete circuit of the pool.

The turtles did not belong in the tank, having been moved out there temporarily while a new glass front was being put in their house, but seemed much more at home there than the shark ever has. In fact, the turtles were the star performers in the big tank yesterday—the turtles, and a very pretty green and blue fish with a bill like a parrot that seemed determined to attract attention.

The shark, as has been said, sulked in the corners or moved about slowly only when disturbed. There was that in the manner of the big fish that suggested early dissolution. The Danish tourist in the cork helmet was so far right, at least. It would have surprised none of those who visited the Aquarium yesterday to have seen the fish turn over on its back, dead, at any moment.

Indeed, it is wonderful how much vitality the brute has shown. It was put into the tank on the 30th day of December, 1904. That was fifty-seven days ago yesterday, or one day over eight weeks. In all that time, although it has been tempted with everything known to be dear to the appetite of sharks, save small boys and live puppies, the fish has not been known to swallow one ounce of food. What it keeps itself alive upon is a mystery, for, of course, there is nothing in the tale that it has been fed surreptitiously by natives who deemed it a god. There might be, and probably are, natives who would do that, but the shark itself would hardly discriminate. If it took food from the natives, it would take it likewise from Manager Fred Potter, and the fact of the matter is that food put into the tank for the fish has been taken out again, time and time again, untouched.

"It is not the first shark that has refused to eat, but it is the first one that we have kept so long without eating," said Fred Potter yesterday. "One we had once before only ate once and then refused food, but we found out when we cut its head off after it died that the hook with which it had been caught was stuck in its throat—and the meat it had swallowed lodged there, too. So that one could not eat. But we took the hook out of this one's throat when we put it in the tank, and so that can not be the trouble. When it dies, if it ever does die, we will make an investigation to see whether we can find out what is the trouble."

There was an unusually large crowd at the park, the day being bright and sunny, and bathers found the rollers big and coasting more than ordinarily exciting. The band played to a great throng under the trees at Mokee Island, and in the afternoon there was a double car service on the Kaimuki branch.

Brahms was born in Hamburg, May 7, 1833. His father, who was a notable double-bass player, spared no pains with his son's education. Brahms very early gave promise of his remarkable genius. At the early age of fourteen he appeared in public as a pianist, with success. In 1853 he undertook a concert tour with Remenyi, one of the most noted violinists of his day. (Remenyi died in harness—on the stage, while giving a concert in San Francisco a few years ago—the incident may be remembered by some of the readers of this column.) Remenyi once played in Honolulu on his way to Australia. During the course of this tour Brahms met Joachim, upon whom he created a profound impression, and who became his life-long friend; and Liszt, with whom he stayed several weeks at his home in Weimar. In this same year he also met Robert Schumann, who had no hesitation in predicting for him an exalted position in the art firmament. "He has come," wrote Schumann, "a youth at whose cradle graces and heroes kept watch. May the highest genius strengthen him. Meanwhile the spirit of modesty dwells within him. His comrades greet him at his first step into the world of art, where wounds may perhaps await him, but his laurel also; we welcome him as a valiant warrior."

For a while wounds did verily await the young composer, for in his work he struck out in a new and original direction, and who can do this and be promptly understood? In 1862 he settled in Vienna, that Mecca of musicians. Here he was well received, and here it was that he wrote nearly all of the compositions that have gradually won him his mighty fame. Brahms was described by those who knew him as being a kind, unaffected, jolly, congenial man. He persistently eschewed matrimony.

A word regarding his compositions, generally. At the outset of his career, Brahms hitched his wagon to a star, and never did he condescend to deviate an iota from his lofty ideals. Ehlerl says of his music: "A feeling of distance always seems to surround his art. I might also say that two atmospheres lie between us and it. He does not place himself before us like Mozart or Schubert, in whose eyes we seem to gaze, and whose hands we appear to press. Twilight rests upon him; height dissolves into distance and at once attracts and forbids. In his most beautiful works there arises at times a glimpse of another world, and from the stars there come flashes like glowing tears, but we can neither grasp nor hold them."

**Hagens and Wagner.**  
Editor Advertiser: I note that Chas. Wagner says that he has tried for some time to get employment as a carpenter, through the planters' employment agency, and failing to get it thinks that the agency is a humbug and the planters are talking through their hats when they say that they want white mechanics on the plantations. Hagens, who through a flood of light on the situation by letting us know that two years ago, when Mr. Wagner was getting \$4 a day at his trade, Mr. Hagens offered him \$3 a day, which Mr. Wagner failed to accept. Mr. Hagens thereupon moralizes thusly: "This is no doubt short sightedness for which Mr. Wagner is reaping his regard, and instead of blaming himself he blames the planters now."

Mr. Hagens is right. Mr. Wagner is an ingrate, and ought to be run out of town. If he has a wife she should be cut by all respectable women, and if he has children they ought to be sent to the Reform School on general principles, for the breed is too pestiferous to be allowed at large. The very idea! To think of it! Offered work two years ago, at 25 per cent less wages than he was then getting, with the additional advantage of working for the good Mr. Hagens and freely sniffing the soft, sweet breezes that emanate from the fertilizer works, and refusing the offer, and now actually complaining because he has been unable to get work for three months!

What are we coming to! Where's Pinkham? Can't he invent something that will meet the situation? I think myself that about 30,000 Chinamen is the proper reply to such ingratitude as this fellow Wagner displays.


