# GOOD MAN SENT AWAY

## Wanted Hawaii Cattle Ranch But Buys in Mexico.

The Salt Lake Tribune says of a recent purchase of grazing lands in Mexico made by J. A. Cunningham who was here last year trying to buy a cattle ranch on Hawaii: Valuable land, 37,000 acres in all, has been purchased in Mexico by J. A. Cunningham of 81 First street. The land includes about 3000 acres of tillable soil with more or less timber surrounding it, the balance being mountainous grazing land. In speaking of his purchase Mr. Cunningham said:

"I had no idea of buying the property in question when I left Salt Lake, my intention being at that time to close a deal for another property which I had had in mind for some time. After that deal had fallen through I was told about the 37,000 acres referred to above, and at once accepted the offer made by the owners. There are one hundred and twenty families living on the sugar plantation, which has a well-equipped plant."

As far as Mr. Cunningham knows, there are no valuable mineral lands in that immediate vicinity, although several old claims in that section of the country were at one time worked at a profit, it is said. He purchased the property simply as a matter of speculation, believing that it would some day make him a handsome profit. About a year ago Mr. Cunningham had negotiations well under way for a large stock ranch on one of the Hawaiian islands, but the deal fell through.

## ZERO AT DES MOINES; 70 AT HONOLULU, H. I.

The Des Moines Daily News, of which Louis Meyer, formerly of the Advertiser staff, is now city editor, is doing some promotion work for Hawaii. In the issue of February 13 the first column on the front page is devoted to a description of a record-breaking cold spell in which the hardships of the poor are set forth. The thermometer registered 28 below zero at Des Moines on that day. Another column sets forth the freezing figures way down in the thermometer bulb which came from various southern states.

Louis Meyer sets forth in a line of red type which runs entirely across the front page, the following comparison: "It may comfort you to know that in Honolulu today the thermometer registers 70 in the shade."

## USE HUMAN FLESH AS BAIT

### Hawaiian Chiefs Specialists in the Catching of the Shark.

It appears that the Hawaiian chiefs of some years ago were much addicted to the use of human flesh as bait for sharks. It came cheaper than pig, was equally acceptable to the shark and gave the chief an opportunity to kill anyone whom he disliked. The victim was cut up and left to decompose for two or three days in a receptacle. Kamehameha I. was a great shark hunter, and kept those of his victims who were intended for bait penned up near the great Temple of Molokini.

Mrs. Beckley gives a particularly interesting account of another method of capturing the huge niuhi, or man-eating shark, followed by the natives. They first of all captured a large number of the small common shark, saved their divers with a portion of the flesh, wrapped them in ki leaves and baked them underground. From fifty to 100 canoes were loaded with the baked meat and large quantities of the pounded roots of awa, mixed with a little water and contained in large gourds. The fleet would sail many miles out to sea in the direction in which the niuhi is known to appear.

Arrived at a comparatively shallow place, the canoe containing the head fisherman and the priest and the sorcerer who was supposed to be indispensable, would cast anchor; meat and the baked liver would be thrown overboard, a few bundles at a time, to attract sharks. After a few days the grease and scent of cooked meats would spread through the water many miles in radius. The niuhi would almost always make its appearance after the third or fourth day, when bundles of the baked meat were thrown to it as fast as it could swallow them. After a while it would become comparatively tame and would come up to one or another of the canoes to be fed. Bundles of the liver with the pounded awa would then be given it, and it would become not only satiated but also stupefied with awa. A noose was then slipped over its

head and the fleet raised anchor and set sail for home, the shark following, a willing prisoner, and the occupants of the nearest canoes being careful to feed it upon the same mixture from time to time. It was led right into shallow water until it was stranded, and then killed.—Forest and Stream.

#### Divorce and Separation.

The Freitas separation case was continued by Judge De Bolt until moved on. This is the case where the respondent was arrested to prevent his shipping in the schooner Robert Lewers for San Francisco.

Judge De Bolt granted a divorce to George H. Sanford against Emily Pae Sanford on the ground of desertion.

Cecilia Loe Davis was granted a divorce by Judge De Bolt from Thomas Davis on the grounds of extreme cruelty and non-support.

#### Plant Soil From Olan.

A Hilo resident has received a request for fifteen bags of Olan earth for use in a Honolulu garden. It is stated that the decomposed lava character of the Olan soil has growing qualities unexcelled by sand or common earth, or a mixture of both. The volcanic soil retains the heat and moisture at the same time, two qualities indispensable to plant life. For growing violets, roses, house palms and plants, the correspondent says the Olan soil is unequalled.—Hilo Tribune.

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
