## ELEVEN MEN OF THE JURY

### Judge Robinson Making Quick Work of Kan- saiora Case.

Yesterday Judge Robinson moved back into his own court room and proceeded with the attempt to get a jury to try Kansaiora Tania for the murder of Yamasaki, the crime having been committed in Honolulu on the 27th of May, 1904, and having been a particularly brutal one. A special venire for fifty jurymen was issued in the case on Monday, and was returned yesterday morning at ten o'clock. It seemed probable, when the Court adjourned at 4 p. m., that a jury would be secured, as there were then twelve men in the box, eleven of whom had been passed, and only nine challenges remaining, with nine names in the box. The prosecution had used one challenge, and waived two, and the defense had exercised six challenges.

The following jurymen were in the box: Richard Weedon, F. M. Kiley, J. T. Crawley, R. A. Woodward, H. H. Walker, Wm. Green, Joseph Richards, Wm. T. Paty, J. J. Carden, Chas. Lewis and Thos. McTigue, all but the last named having been passed.

The trial of the case will be resumed this morning. Deputy Attorney General Peters appearing for the Territory, and J. W. Cathcart for the defense.

#### AN ATTORNEY INDICTED.

John Richardson, a well known lawyer of Wailuku, Maui, has been indicted by the grand jury for that circuit upon a charge of embezzlement. It is charged that Richardson was given a check drawn in favor of John Tallett by A. N. Kepoikai for \$3000.00 to collect, and it is charged that he had collected the money and appropriated the same to his own use, subsequently paying back \$600 of the sum to Tallett. The case comes on trial at the term of court now being held at Wailuku.

#### COURT NOTES.

A jury in Judge De Bolt's court yesterday morning gave a verdict for plaintiff in the case of J. H. Schnack vs. Mary J. Montano for \$1000, without interest. This is the action that resulted in a mistrial a little time ago.

M. P. Robinson has been appointed by Judge De Bolt administrator of the estate of the late John Riley.

The divorce cases of Wilburton vs. Wilburton and Mossman vs. Mossman are set down for hearing before Judge Robinson this morning.



## D. HOWARD HITCHCOCK'S SPHINX OF THE PACIFIC



The (N. Y.) Collector and Art Critic, in an article on D. Howard Hitchcock publishes the above and says:

A painter from Hawaii is one of the products of our imperialistic, territorial acquisition. If England had grabbed the little island D. Howard Hitchcock might have gone to London; as it is, he came to New York and has shown us some Pacific Islands scenery, of which John La Farge once gave us a taste.

Hitchcock's palette produces the wonderful colors of the little tropical island in an admirable, convincing manner. His landscapes run the chromatic scale with undisturbing harmony, and the rich combinations of the spectrum are seen in his coast views in delicate tones. The painting, reproduced above, is a fine example of the painter's brush, the mass of rock looms overpowering on the sandy shore, the scaly and basaltic texture is truly represented, while the whole has the brushing of a sure hand. Another painting in the artist's studio shows a little island in a wide stretch of ocean; the water has all those vivid tints which one has seen in the Bay of Naples. Another canvas is a bold depiction of the crater of Kilauea in eruption. The crater is surrounded by a wall of cliffs which present the multitudinous colors of lava formation. The artist was born in Honolulu and pursued his studies at the Art Students' League and in Paris. He has fully arrived and is worthy of a collector's fancy. An exhibition of his recent work is now being held at the Salmagundi Club in New York.

## CENTENNIAL NOT FOR HONOLULU RUN
