LOCAL LABOR PROBLEMS.

The easiest way to settle the Japanese labor problem in a manner to satisfy all concerned except the field hand who wants to go from here to the coast has already been pointed out in these columns. Let the United States and Japan agree that no Japanese, embarking here shall land on the coast without a passport from the Japanese Consul at Honolulu.

The plan is so simple as to make it seem remarkable at first glance that the expedient of shutting off immigration to Hawaii altogether by order of the Japanese government, should be proposed instead.
