Secretary Jack Atkinson has a plan in hand to secure the erection of a band stand in Alaia Park.

The date for the Elks' Minstrels has been definitely set for April 27 and 29. The program will be most elaborate.

It is reported by the Star that Brother Serapion von Koop, of the Settlement on Molokai, has fallen a victim to leprosy.

The comrades of Theodore Roosevelt Camp, Spanish War Veterans, propose to honor Secretary Taft upon his arrival in Honolulu.

A wireless to the Wilder Steamship Company received yesterday stated that at present there is no fire visible in the crater of Kilauea.

The Masters and Pilots' Association will have a meeting next Sunday at 7 p. m. Business of considerable importance is to be discussed.

Jean Sabate left for Hilo yesterday to join the ship John Ena, on which he has shipped as steward. The ship will sail for New York very shortly.

Capitol gossips are becoming more strongly of the opinion every day that an extra session will be necessary in order to pass the appropriation bills.

Senator Hayselden has declined to return to Maui for the second trial of the Richardson embezzlement case, in which he is a witness, as he regards his legislative duties as the more important.

William Waterhouse, an old and well known resident of Honolulu, has been elected Mayor of Pasadena, California. Mr. Waterhouse is a Republican, but headed a citizen's ticket in the town of roses.

John G. Woolley, the Prohibition leader, will arrive here April 14 on the Sonoma and will stay three weeks, visiting outlying islands and the volcano. He will sail May 3 for the Samoan Islands.

The Palolo Water Commissioners, R. H. Trent, H. M. Von Holt and R. C. L. Peterson, inspected the sources of supply in the valley yesterday afternoon, and later held a meeting to hear the pleas of water claimants.

Dent H. Robert, managing editor of Mr. Hearst's San Francisco Examiner, is here on a trip for his health. He reached Honolulu on the bark Gerard C. Tobey last Friday, and will visit the Volcano and the other islands before going back to the coast.

W. B. Tucker, the lad who passed the highest examination for both West Point and Annapolis in the competitive examination called by the Delegate to Congress, has pluckily refused to accept appointment as alternate to young Lyman of Hilo, who passed fourth and was given the West Point appointment.

Governor Carter was stirring up the heads of the several departments with a sharp stick yesterday because it was the forty-first day of the legislative session, and he wanted to get the deficiency appropriation bill, for which the estimates had not been submitted to him, in shape for presentation to both Houses.

In the police court yesterday, the charge of gross cheat against G. H. Stevens, accused of passing a worthless check, was continued. Stevens is said to be the son of very good people, but to have preferred to be a sport to earning an honest living. A number of local merchants have been victimized by him.

A subscription list is being circulated for the benefit of the children of the late Mrs. L. J. Levey, whom the death of their mother has left practically destitute. Mrs. Levey was the widow of one of the men imprisoned during revolutionary times, and her husband had a claim against the government on account of having been confined in jail as a royalist in 1855. It is said that imprisonment ruined Levey's health, and was the ultimate cause of his death.
