SOME CASES DISPOSED OF

Contempt in Divorce, Foreclosure Order, Court Notes.

Lum Choon Tuck was found guilty of assault and battery with a weapon, and was sentenced by Judge De Bolt to be imprisoned at hard labor for one year.

Pang Kau saved the trouble of a trial by pleading guilty to assault and battery. Judge De Bolt fined him \$10 and costs, which were forthwith paid by Attorney Robertson.

CITED FOR CONTEMPT.

Judge De Bolt cited Chun Poon to appear at 9 a. m. next Tuesday and show cause why he should not be adjudged guilty of contempt of court in disobeying the court's order of March 28 to pay his wife, suing for divorce, \$12 a week, the clerk of court \$20 for costs and Messrs. Breckons and Hogan an attorney's retaining fee of \$50.

COURT NOTES.

The suit of H. J. Johnston, custom house broker, against Lee Toma & Co., for commission on cigar duties saved in appeal to Washington, was argued in the Supreme Court yesterday.

John Walker has filed three petitions for registration of titles in the Torrens court. The first is for four lots at Luanihilo and Keanamoku streets, the second for land at King and Pikoiki streets and the third for land at Hotel and Alapai streets.

Judge Robinson confirmed the sale of real estate by E. P. Kalama, guardian of Kahoopio, a minor. It was property in Nuuanu valley containing 8.4 acres and was sold at auction to W. R. Castle for \$1600.

Judge Lindsay made an order of foreclosure of mortgage in the suit of August Ahrens vs. the administrator and beneficiaries of the will of W. H. Cornwell. W. R. Sims was appointed commissioner of sale.

Default was ordered against defendants by Judge Robinson in the suit of Porter Furniture Co. vs. Deborah Pahau, Mary Kahela and Alex. Pahau.

Judge Dole adjudged L. F. Sternemann a bankrupt on his voluntary petition.

NAMES OF THE JAPANESE.

They Vary at Different Periods of Their Lives—The Baptismal Ceremony.

The naming of a Japanese baby is not simply the bestowal of a name upon it, soon after its birth, by which it shall be known during its lifetime. The name of a Japanese is changed at various periods of his life, says the Ledger Monthly.

When a Japanese child is a month old he is given his first name, with national religious ceremonial. The child is taken in state to the family temple. Servants carry the entire infantile wardrobe, the extent of which indicates the degree of wealth and the social position of the father. At the end of the procession a servant walks, carrying a box which contains money to give the officiating priest, and a slip of paper on which the three names are written. On entering the temple the father hands the paper containing the names to the priest, who copies them on three separate sheets, which he mixes and shakes at random, while pronouncing in a loud voice a sacramental invocation to the god to whom the temple is dedicated. He then passes them in the air, and the first one that touches the holy floor is selected as the choice of the presiding divinity. This name is written on a piece of paper by the priest, and is given to the child's father as a talisman. During the ceremony sacred songs, with instrumental accompaniments, are chanted. Visits to relatives and friends of the parents follow the christening, in celebration of which festivities of various kinds are indulged in and presents given to the child.

The Japanese child wears loose garments until he is three years of age. At that time they are discarded and his clothes are bound around his waist with a girdle. The girdling ceremonies are public and are accompanied by very elaborate religious rites. On that occasion he receives a new name. His education begins at this period and is considered finished at 15, at which time he attains his majority. He assumes the responsibilities of a man and takes his place in society with a new name.

Entering upon the duties of a public functionary, he takes another name, which is changed upon every advancement in rank or dignity in his official position. His name is changed upon the slightest pretext. If his superior officer happens to have the same name, the subaltern's must be changed, for it detracts from the dignity of a chief for a subordinate to possess the same name. He receives a new name upon his marriage. His last, and only permanent name, is the one given him after his death, which is inscribed upon his tomb.

HAD REMEDY IN THE LAW

Wireless Telegraph Co. Took the Wrong Course.

In an opinion written by Justice Hartwell, the Supreme Court has reversed the decree of Circuit Judge De Bolt and sustained the demurrer of defendants in the suit of Inter-Island Telegraph Co., Ltd., Henry Waterhouse Trust Co., Ltd., and Nellie D. Cross vs. Liliuokalani and A. M. Brown, High Sheriff. It is found that the L-I. T. Co. (wireless telegraph) is not exempt from execution for debt by reason of its being a quasi public corporation under obligation to perform service for the public, or by reason of anything contained in Act 75 of the Laws of 1903 providing a monthly subsidy for the company.

The demurrer to injunction against the execution sale of mortgage chattels is sustained on the ground that if execution may be levied on such chattels the mortgagee has an adequate remedy at law. It is unnecessary that all of the mortgaged property be sold.

If the interests of all concerned, including the mortgagees, would be injuriously affected by unnecessary levy and sale an action for malicious and vexatious use of process would give a remedy.

Judge Robinson sat, with Chief Justice Frear and Justice Hartwell, in place of Justice Wilder, disqualified. Castle and Withington for plaintiffs; Robertson and Wilder for defendants. The case arose from an execution levied on the wireless plant at the head office, which completely wrecked it as a telegraphic outfit.
