The trial of the Baldwin poisoning case on Kauai brought out the fact that an attempt to poison the Baldwin family was made as long as two years ago, and by the same Jap who was finally convicted of the offense. The Japanese, Nomi Nizo, was given five years at hard labor for the crime.

Mrs. Naholowaa Wallace and her daughter Helen, the latter sixteen years of age and a pupil at the Wailuku high school, are reported to have been swept away by the tide and drowned on the Maui coast, between Waihee and Kahakuloa. They were hunting sea shells and are supposed to have been caught by the waves under a high cliff.

Mr. Wm. K. Hapai died at 11:30 yesterday at his mother's residence on Kinau street. He leaves a young wife, mother, brother and sisters, besides many relatives in Honolulu and Hilo. He was nephew of Judge Hapai of Hilo and was 25 years of age. The funeral will occur at 3 p. m. today from the Townsend undertaking parlors, burial at Makiki cemetery.

One of the veteran soldiers who has been seeing the sights in Honolulu during the stay of the transport is Corporal Wm. S. Crittenden of Co. F, 14th Infantry. Corporal Crittenden served in the Cuban, Chinese and Philippine campaigns and has been wounded. He comes from Ithaca, N. Y. With him in his sightseeing yesterday was James B. Rousseau of the same company, who is an Alabama relative of the Civil War General Rousseau.
