DANCING EXHIBITION BY MRS. MARY GUNN'S PUPILS

Dainty little misses and handsome young masters, wooing Terpsichore before the footlights at the Hawaiian Opera House last evening, quite captivated the large audience. The exhibition of fancy dancing of the pupils of Mrs. Mary Gunn was one of the most creditable in the long series given under her direction in Honolulu. The originality of some of the dances suggested an intimate knowledge of the newest things on the professional stage.

Individually, the diversion created by Master Reynold McGrew, inimitable make-up as a Paris Boulevardier, coupled with his song and dance with ballet accompaniment, was one of the distinct hits of the evening. Master McGrew has a good voice and perfect self-possession before an audience.

Miss Esther Waller, a graceful young lady, gave a charming exhibition of dexterity, giving a series of living pictures representing "Catching the Butterfly," "At the Bat," "The Maiden's Prayer," "The Rose and the Butterfly" and "Snowballing." Little Thelma Murphy as a forceful little singer and dancer, won hearty applause. Mrs. F. Howard Humphris, attired as an Irish maiden in green skirt and white blouse, recited "A Bit O' Blarney" in a delightful manner, a ballet accompanying her in a pretty dance. In the Dance of Nations, Louise McCarthy as Ireland, Henrie Smith as Spain, Helen Center as Scotland, and Alice Brickwood as America, danced in a very fascinating manner. It remained for Hazel Buckland to show a most decided talent for buck and wing dancing, which took the house by storm. The little miss dances with an abandon which brings her to the front rank of youthful terpsichorean artists.

The march of the King's Guard was encored, while the Cupid ballet, with little tots dressed in blue and pink with wings to match to meet the traditional garb of the little god of the bow and arrow, was extremely amusing. The Puritan quadrille, with the girls dressed in the old fashioned gowns of the girls of Colonial times was a novelty.

During the intermission, while the curtain was down twenty-five Hawaiian boys and girls, dressed as pickaninnies of the South, marched upon the stage, all barefooted, each one carrying a doll. They sang a negro lullaby in a way which brought an encore.

The ballet of the seasons was one of the most picturesque on the program, four sets of beautifully dressed girls, dancing successively to represent spring, summer, fall and winter.

Rosen's Orchestra rendered excellent music during the entire evening. COMMISSIONERS DON'T AGREE ABOUT KALIHI

The Kalihi Water Commissioners have arrived at a partial report as a result of their investigations concerning water rights during the past two weeks, and have conveyed the same to the Superintendent of Public Works. The Commissioners do not agree, Commissioner Peterson stating that the investigation was not thorough and was incomplete, only two awards having been looked into. The report is as follows:

April 14, 1905. Hon. C. S. Holloway, Superintendent, Department of Public Works, Territory of Hawaii. Sir: In compliance with your letter of instructions of March 9, and acting under a commission issued under date

of March 7, 1905, to determine the water right values in Kalihi Valley, we beg leave to report as follows:

While it has been impossible for us to accomplish the work in a thorough manner in the limited time allowed, we find that the two upper awards leading off from the main Kalihi stream have a right to approximately 675,000 gallons of water every twenty-four hours, and we estimate the fee in this water to be worth about \$30,000.

We regret our inability to furnish an estimate embracing all the factors that should be considered, through the fact that many of the property owners interested have so far failed to present their claims; and this preliminary report is now submitted with the understanding that it shall be without prejudice to either the Territorial Government or to the owners of the property involved.

have been unable to go into the question with any degree of thoroughness, all of the claims for said water rights not having been presented. I therefore am not in a position to make any report concerning said matters at this time.
