ON AGAIN ON TRIAL.

Jas. Love Trust Upheld. The Ballou-Parker Libel Suit.

Ah On, former Chinese policeman, yesterday morning was brought to trial on his second indictment for accepting a bribe. E. C. Peters appeared for the Territory, G. A. Davis, for the defendant. Nothing beyond empanelling a jury was done in the forenoon.

When the last name had been drawn from the box, the following were accepted and sworn: M. W. Parkhurst, J. Batchelor, H. W. Green, James Steiner, D. M. Ross, E. Henriques, J. J. Carden, B. Guerrero, Wm. L. Austin, A. Nephouse, F. A. Potter and H. B. Saylor.

Before the examination of jurors had begun, Mr. Davis moved to discharge the defendant, on the ground that a policeman was not an executive officer, but, as in the first case against Ah On, Judge De Bolt denied the motion.

The prosecution had not rested when the court rose for the day.

LOVE'S LABOR LOST.

Judge Lindsay yesterday sustained the demurrer to the bill in equity of James Love against James Love Jr., Annie K. Hart and Henry Waterhouse Trust Co., to cancel a trust deed. Henry Highton for petitioner asked if leave would be allowed to amend the bill. The reply was that nothing further could be done in that court. A. G. M. Robertson represented the respondents.

COURT NOTES.

William Mahuka's injunction suit against Superintendent of Public Works Holloway and Road Supervisor Johnson is to restrain the respondents from taking a strip of land, 50 feet wide and 92 feet long, for the extension of Kukui street.

S. M. Ballou's libel suit against Samuel Parker was set for trial before Judge Lindsay this morning, with two other cases to follow. Later all three were continued, in consequence of which the jurors were excused until Thursday.

Judge De Bolt made an order in the case of James E. Fullerton vs. Kohala & Hilo Railway Co., with Hilo Railroad Co., garnishee, that the garnishee pay into court \$300, which the court finds due under a certain lease, and that the money may be withdrawn by the plaintiff or his attorney. Douthitt for plaintiff, Ballou for garnishee.

Maria Leonora Thomas was appointed by Judge Lindsay administratrix of the estate of her late husband, Manuel Thomas, without bond.

Lyle A. Dickey was appointed by Judge Lindsay administrator of the estate of Eva Waipa under \$750 bond. Decedent was a beneficiary of the Kanoa estate.

Judge Lindsay received the fourth annual account of Wm. A. Bowen, guardian of Martha Bergerson, a minor, showing receipts of \$2334.86 and payments of \$2180.33, leaving a balance of \$154.53. About \$2000 of the payments was investment.

REGO NOT FAR AWAY

Wandering About Town. Most Arraignments Deferred.

Manuel A. Rego, late postmaster of Koloa, did not answer to his name in the United States District Court when it came up to him to plead to the indictment charging him with embezzling \$27,055 of U. S. postal money-order funds. His absence looked bad for his sureties, but it turned out to be due only to a misunderstanding. Leastwise, that is the gentle style in which District Attorney Breckons puts it. Rego was seen later walking about town. He will come into court on Saturday morning.

Arraignments on indictments were the order of the day before Federal Judge S. B. Dole yesterday. Many had their pleas reserved, for absence of counsel and other reasons. Three Japanese charged with illicit distilling, being without means, had Henry Hogan assigned to defend them.

Kubo Yamasita, illicit distilling, and K. Kosawa, adultery, pleaded guilty and their sentences were set for Thursday.

MAGOON CASE DEFERRED

Appeal of Kumalae and Johnson Heard Yesterday.

Owing to the illness of Judge Robinson, substitute for Justice Hartwell, the Supreme Court continued the Magoon case until next Monday. The immediately pending matter is a motion by respondent for a continuance until May 15.

Jonah Kumalae and Enoch Johnson's appeal from conviction for conspiracy to commit the offense of gross cheat was argued and submitted before the Supreme Court yesterday. Attorney General Andrews and W. S. Fleming appeared for the Territory, and C. W. Ashford for the appellants.

Mr. Ashford talked about the paradox furnished in the statutes, which made the conspiring to commit an offense worse than the committing of the offense—conspiracy being an infamous crime and gross cheat but a misdemeanor. He contended also that the indictment was illegal in charging two offenses in a single count. The Territory's attorneys, however, quoted analogous situations from the books where indictments were sustained.

LOOKING AROUND FOR OFFICES FOR COUNTY

Men interested in government matters and especially in the proposed county system, are beginning to look about the city for county offices. It is believed that the Kapiolani Estate building is being looked upon favorably. An improvement was recently made in the building by the addition of a metal awning.

ACCOUNTS SIFTED OUT

Lanai Ranch and Palawai Development Co. Affairs.

E. A. Mott-Smith, commissioner, files a notice that he has filed his report on the bill for accounting of Frederick Harrison Hayselden, administrator and trustee of the estate of Walter Murray Gibson, deceased, against William H. Pain and Elise S. V. Neumann, executrix of the will of Paul Neumann, deceased. The notice is addressed to Messrs. Creighton & Correa, Holmes & Stanley and Ballou & Marx.

The report is an elaborate one of 40 pages. It deals with the sale of the Lanai Ranch by the Gibson estate to W. H. Pain and the late Paul Neumann, with the ranching partnership of the purchasers and F. H. Hayselden, with a settlement of a mortgage on the property held by W. G. Irwin, with the defunct Palawai Development Co., with a reservation of one-third of the property to Talula L. Hayselden and husband (F. H. H.), with their agreement to convey to Pain and Neumann the said reservation when requested, with the payment of income to Mrs. Hayselden, residuary devisee of the will of W. M. Gibson, and with the accounts of the Lanai Ranch. There are sheaves of different accounts analyzed by Commissioner Mott-Smith, whose summaries of findings are as follows, condensed:

Settlement of purchase price, \$100,000; balance due Gibson estate, in equal shares by Pain and Neumann estate, \$615.68.

Lanai Ranch account: Due by W. H. Pain, \$17,207.65; due by Gibson estate, \$11,022.77; total to credit of ranch, \$28,230.42, divisible in the amount of \$9410.14 each to Neumann estate, Gibson estate and Pain.

Balance due to estate of Paul Neumann, \$9101.80.

Amount due by W. H. Pain, when credits are deducted, \$8105.55.

Amount due by Gibson estate, when credits are deducted, \$995.95.

The Lanai ranch is charged with an item of \$821.28 for lumber.

Pain is awarded an item of \$352.50, U. S. warrants for carrying mails.
