

STEWART BUTTED-IN

Unusual Feature of a Communion Service.

Last evening, during a united communion service at Central Union church, T. McCants Stewart, the colored lawyer, arose and began a voluble expostulation. As near as could be ascertained, Stewart did not want the revival to go on unless everybody in the churches got on speaking terms with him first, it appearing that many members of the congregations had grown into the habit of not seeing him when he came around seeking social recognition. Stewart spoke of "disension" in the churches, saying that he had personal differences with some in the audience and was not on speaking terms with some and that others were in the same plight. He urged that the people get together and be more tolerant of one another. Until this was done, he said, the time was not ripe for the summoning of an outside revivalist. He thought that harmony and brotherly feeling should reign among the Christian people before Mr. Ostrom was called in to preach the revival. Upon a vote of the people the calling of the evangelist was overwhelmingly ratified.

The service was a simple but beautifully impressive one. The Central Union choir led in the singing. On the platform were seated the pastor of the Methodist church, Rev. J. W. Wadman, the pastor of the Portuguese Protestant church, Rev. A. V. Soares, the pastor of Central Union, Rev. W. M. Kincaid and the Superintendent of Central Union Bible school, Rev. E. B. Turner. In front of the rostrum was the table upon which were the bread and wine. About the table was a semi-circle of chairs. During the communion service these were occupied by the ministers and the deacons who passed the element of the communion. Among these were representatives of Central Union and the Methodist and Christian churches.

The service opened with a hymn after which Rev. A. V. Soares read the 103rd Psalm. The hymn, "In the Cross of Christ I Glory" was sung and Rev. E. B. Turner offered prayer. After the singing of "Rock of Ages", Rev. J. W. Wadman delivered a short and eloquent address. Another hymn was sung and the communion service proper followed. At this time T. McCants Stewart butted in. With the singing of "Just as I am" the congregation was dismissed with a benediction pronounced by Dr. Kincaid.

There is considerable complaint in the meetings of the constant self-advertising of Stewart," said a church-member last night, "whose impressions of his own importance are not shared by the rest of us."

Y. M. C. A. Easter Meetings.




