

CORRESPONDENT TELLS OF COMING CHINESE UPHEAVAL

Heralding an uprising of the revolutionary forces in China, W. C. Bunner, an old-time newspaper man of San Francisco, passed through Honolulu on Tuesday on the steamship Korea, en route to China.

Mr. Bunner stated that he was attached to the Examiner staff, with special reference to the disaffected Chinese of the Empire. He said that he had been sent to get in touch with the revolutionists, in preparation for any uprising that might take place when the Nippon-Russo war is over. He stated that there is at present an unusual state of affairs among those generally opposed to the present ruling dynasty. Dr. Sun Yat Sen, the Honolulu Chinese who was educated at Iolani College, this city, heads the revolutionary forces, or those who would upset the dynasty and put a new Emperor, or even a president, on the throne. Leung Chi Tso heads the Bow Wong movement, which supports the Emperor as against the Empress Dowager, and then there are the guerilla bands, arrayed both against the imperial troops and the foreigners, or the Boxers, to be plain.

To secure the co-operation of all three classes is the great task which some Chinese has before him. Mr. Bunner says that Ho Ying, although that, he says, is not his true name, is the man who might be chosen to lead the armed hosts to battle. Ho Ying, says Bunner, was in South Africa during the Boer war, and learned the ways of the Boers. The Boer tactics he proposes to make use of in drilling his troops.

"There is a good deal of talk about the Japanese Empire Japanizing the Chinese Empire," said Mr. Bunner. "That is no doubt true, but when a Chinese learns anything he beats the Japanese in the end, and the Japanizing of China means that in time China will swallow Japan."

PROBLEM TO SOLVE IN TORRENS COURTS

A peculiar point arose in the Land Registration court yesterday, causing Judge Weaver to continue a hearing until authorities could be consulted. The late John Magoon had petitioned some time before his death for a registered title to land at River street, near the Japanese Methodist church. When the first survey was investigated it was found to encroach six feet on the premises of a Japanese society.

The hearing had therefore to be advertised over again and it fell due yesterday. This was three days after the death of the petitioner and the point that caused a continuance was whether the petition survived the petitioner in court or would have to be revived, if the registered title was to be procured, by the legal representatives of the decedent's estate.

It would appear that the Torrens law of the Territory does not provide for such a case, so that the point will have to be cleared up by consulting the general probate authorities.

President Tenney will appoint a committee of the Chamber of Commerce, to act with a corresponding one from the Merchants' Association, with a view to having all imports of foreign merchandise, so far as possible, entered at the Honolulu custom house. It was shown at the meeting of trustees of the Chamber that a considerable amount of goods imported for local consumption the past year was entered and passed at New York, New Orleans and San Francisco. Collector Stackable represented that this business abstracted so much credit from the port of Honolulu which should tell on behalf of appropriations by Congress for harbor improvement.

A circular issued by the mercantile bodies of Boston to induce customs entries at that port was an exhibit at the meeting.



PRESS CENSORSHIP IN RUSSIA.

This picture shows the method of blocking out matter regarded as objectionable by the Press Censor in Russia. The paper is a copy of the London Times of September 30. The column preceding the blocked part is a duplicate of the same column, and shows the matter it was thought advisable to obliterate.
