

BROMAN DROWNED OFF ALA MOANA

Gustav Broman, a contractor, was drowned in the breakers along Ala Moana near the foot of Ward street yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock. He was out rowing in a boat with another man and a woman. The boat was capsized on the reef and the party started to wade ashore. In crossing a deep hole Broman went down. Native divers recovered the body. A coroner's jury was summoned and viewed the body. The inquest will be held today.

Deceased was a Russian and had been here about twelve years. He left no relatives here but one of the Russian naval officers who passed through here lately from Port Arthur was his brother. Broman was a member in good standing of Lodge Le Progres.


