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TRIAL UPON HYPOTHESIS

Medical Evidence Upon Naone's Case.

Two Missing Husbands Whom the Police Can't Locate.

Title From Thos. Metcalf Once More Found Valid. Court Items.

Dr. J. T. Wayson followed Dr. Humphris, after a brief cross-examination of the latter, as an expert witness for the defense in the Naone murder trial yesterday. He testified from a personal examination of the defendant as well as upon the hypothetical question. In both regards his evidence went to place Naone in the epileptically insane class. Epilepsy, according to the doctor, was a symptom rather than a cause of insanity. Its manifestations varied with conditions and circumstances in the life of the subject. Sometimes he would be excited, and again morose. Criminal acts might be done unconsciously by an epileptic, though sometimes come to his remembrance later. The presence of the disease usually became known to infrequent observers through fits or convulsions, which in time affected the brain tissue and brought about dementia. As a rule victims of epilepsy took on flesh, but this might be checked if the disease interfered with digestion. Dr. Rossiter, assistant surgeon of the U. S. Navy, was the next witness. Part of his evidence was to the effect that an epileptic might go on for years performing the routine duties of a vocation and do nothing out of the way.

SUMNER GRANT CASE. Dowsett Co., Ltd., vs. Malle Kaauku, ejectment, came on for trial before Judge Lindsay yesterday morning. S. M. Ballou and R. B. Anderson appeared for plaintiff, and Henry Hogan for defendant. The land is a piece near Oahu prison, on which the defendant cultivates flowers for the trade of a flower-seller. She claims her family has held the land under deed from William Sumner, the original grantee of the Land Commission, for fifty years. John K. Sumner, who sold land including this piece to the O. R. & L. Co., was called as a witness for plaintiff and, on objection to a certain question on cross-examination, Mr. Hogan said he would call him again for the defendant.

The jury as finally accepted consisted of I. Lewington, J. M. Camara, A. K. Jones, K. B. Porter, A. E. Murphy, R. Weedon, Geo. Johnson, H. Rivers, E. E. Hartman, J. A. Auld, J. E. Goetas and A. Winterstein.

LAND TITLE GRANTED. Judge Philip L. Weaver of the Court of Land Registration has rendered a decision on a petition of Emil Klemme for registration of his title to a lot of land on Alapai Street, Honolulu, in favor of petitioner. Helen Rowland and James Prosser had contested the petition on grounds similar to those presented in the other courts in the cases of Honolulu Investment Co. vs. Rowland and Godfrey vs. Rowland. The decision concludes: "I find that Emil Klemme has a good title as alleged and proper for registration, subject to a mortgage for the sum of \$1500 dated April 13, 1903, to S. C. Allen," etc.

COURT NOTES. Summonses have been returned unserved in two divorce cases, the officers having been unable to locate the libelles. One is that of Hatsu Sakato against her husband, Masayuki Sakato. The other is that of Rose Couta Martello against Antone Martiness Martello. Wm. L. Whitney, administrator of the estate of C. Ahi deceased, sues John Ross for \$710 with legal interest from November 12, 1904, attorney's fees and costs. Judge Lindsay approved the accounts and granted the discharge of Paha Mahuka, executrix of the estate of Kawaihaunuiokahoupookane, alias Kawaiha Mahuka, deceased.

WANT LABAINALUNA FORFEIT MONEY

Castle & Withington and Smith & Lewis representing the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions filed in the Supreme Court under the special act an action against the Territory of Hawaii to recover the sum of \$15,000, the agreed forfeit in case the faith of the fathers ceased to be taught at Lahainaluna Seminary. The suit was brought in view of the fact that the proposed submission of the case to the Supreme Court on a statement of agreed facts fell through, the government not being able to agree to all the facts alleged by the board. The crucial question in the case is whether or not the government has

violated the condition under which the school property was deeded to it requiring it to teach the religion professed by the American Board or the Hawaiian Mission in 1849. A subsidiary question is whether the government has changed the course of study required by the agreement or not. In reply to the statement by some persons that \$15,000 is an excessive forfeit the attorneys state that in their opinion it is not, the American Mission having turned over to the government property which had cost them over \$70,000 on the conditions named.

TO FILL PULPIT OF CHRISTIAN CHURCH

One of the strongest ministers of the denomination on the Pacific Coast will occupy the pulpit of the Christian church in this city during the summer months. This is Rev. W. E. Crabtree, pastor of the Central Christian church of San Diego, California. Mr. Crabtree has twice been asked by the local church to come here as its pastor but his own church has refused to let him go but he has consented to accept an invitation to spend two months in Hawaii and will fill the pulpit of the local church during a part of the time before the regular pastor arrives. The official board of his own church has just granted him a leave of absence and he has cabled that he will come as soon as his supply arrives. Mr. Crabtree is expected here on the Mongolia arriving June 13.

Mr. Crabtree is a Kentuckian and a graduate of Kentucky University at Lexington, taking his theological course at the College of the Bible connected with that institution. Although still a young man he has had the longest Protestant pastorate in the country where he resides. He took a church deep in debt and worshipping in a building in the outskirts of the city of San Diego and now has a building on one of the finest sites in the city, the property of the church and absolutely free from debt. He has added hundreds to his church in the last few years and plans are being made for the erection of a new building in order to accommodate the growing congregations. Three years ago Mr. Crabtree made a tour of the Holy Land, studying it in relation to the Bible. For the past few weeks he has been conducting a revival and it is probable that there will be special meetings at the Christian church while he is here. Mr. Crabtree will be accompanied by his family.

COMEDY DRAMA AT THE ORPHEUM

The Ellefords scored another hit last evening in the comedy drama "Wanted - The Earth." The plot is clever, the lines sparkling with humor and the situations ludicrous and yet interesting. In a word, the play has all the requisites necessary for success. The greater part of the action falls upon Chas. Edler, and the character of Jay D. Smith is particularly suited to him. It is in such characters that his peculiar air of innocent mischief and the vein of humor, Pietro Sosso as Frank Smith and George Hernandez as Sammy Swipes gave particularly happy and graceful interpretations to their characters. Frank Howe's character of Judge Jennings was a bright bit, while Wm. Marion made a most acceptable Jack Montrose. As Gladys Kenward, Grace Lamont was particularly pleasing, and her most trying scenes were carried through in a finished style. Flaxy could not have found a nicer representative than Myrtle Selwyn, and Anna Dodge again came to the fore as Mrs. Mayor Van Duzee. The specialty of Miss Selwyn was well received.
