**MUST PAY THE TAX**

**Japs Leaving for the Coast Find Trouble.**

The cases of the three Japanese hotel keepers arrested on Tuesday for violating the emigrant agent law passed by the Legislature of 1905, were called up before Judge Whitney yesterday forenoon, and, by consent, were passed over until July 5.

There is more trouble ahead for all the Japanese who have agreed to go to the coast per the steamship Stanley Dollar. The tax office will require from each man his tax receipt, and if not shown they will have to pay \$5.50 each. Many of the Japanese evade the payment of the taxes when possible, but the vigilant tax office agents keep a watchful eye on them, and no Japanese will be permitted to go aboard without showing his receipt or paying the cash equivalent thereof.

This \$5.50 in addition to his hotel bill of from \$5 to \$8 and the advance of \$12 toward his steamer fare, makes the actual cash outlay in order to get aboard the steamer considerable for a Japanese who has been working on a plantation at from \$18 to \$19 per month. Besides this, he is compelled to give an order for \$20 against his wages before beginning work on the mainland. Actually, therefore, he has to disgorge about \$45 for the privilege of going to Uncle Sam's mainland, where the bait of "360 per month wages," has been held before his eyes by unscrupulous runners for the local hotel keepers.

Every Jap going to the mainland on the above basis will find himself in debt for some time to come.

**COUNTER CLAIM IN MORTGAGE SUIT**

Waialua Agricultural Co., Ltd., by its attorneys, Castle & Withington, files an answer and a cross complaint in the suit of August Dreier vs. John D. Holt Jr. and others. It claims under a mortgage executed by John D. Holt Jr. and wife to Mary E. Soper for \$3000, which is now owned by this respondent and on which \$1326.67 is alleged to be due.

Jose Nobrega has brought suit against Jose da Costa and Antonio da Costa for \$300 damages on account of trespass upon a piece of land at Kamaheki, Kalihi, containing 1.63 acres.

Judge Lindsay approved the accounts and granted the discharge of Joseph O. Carter, executor of the estate of Thomas Jefferson Cummins, deceased.

The ejectment suit of W. R. Kalejokeki vs. Waiuku Sugar Co. was still on yesterday before Judge Lindsay and the following jury: Farm Conn, George Johnson, E. E. Hartmann, R. Weedon, A. E. Murphy, I. Livingston, W. A. McGowan, J. A. Auld, C. J. Schoening, James Veary, John K. Inch and A. Winterstein. C. W. Ashford for plaintiff, E. B. McClanahan for defendant.

Joinders in demurrers of various defendants have been filed by plaintiff in the suit of Charles R. Hemenway, trustee, vs. Honolulu Clay Co., Ltd., et al. In this case the trustee in bankruptcy of the defendant company seeks to make stockholders liable for the debts to the amount of their stock not paid up.

W. O. Bowen has petitioned the Court of Land Registration for a title to a parcel of land with the buildings thereon, situate in Makiki, Honolulu, and containing an area of 32,000 square feet.

**A PICNIC CELEBRATION**

**July 4th Exercises to Be Held in the Afternoon.**

In response to a call made last week by Governor Carter, a meeting was held in the Throne Room yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock to arrange for a celebration of the 4th of July. Most of those present were members of last year's committees. Col. Jones, chairman; A. P. Taylor, secretary; and W. W. Hall, treasurer, were re-elected, and L. E. Pinkham was again made chairman of the finance committee, owing to his successful canvass of the merchants last year for funds.

Instead of appointing several committees to look after the celebration, Col. Jones appointed a general committee of the whole, comprising the persons above named, and, in addition, Messrs. W. R. Farrington, Roy Chamberlain, Col. Zeigler, Clarence Crabbe, William Savidge, W. H. Hoogs, E. M. Boyd, C. M. White, and Guy Livingstone.

Taking in all the events scheduled for the day, the general program will be about as follows:

Artillery salute by National Guard of Hawaii, at daybreak.

Championship boat races at Pearl Harbor, 9 to 11 a. m.

National salute by N. G. H., at 12 noon.

Baseball games (two), 1:30 to 4:15 at baseball park.

Patriotic band concert at Capitol Grounds, 4:30 to 5 p. m.

Literary and musical exercises, with address, at 5 p. m.

Fireworks and music at Capitol Grounds in the evening.

Dances at the Alexander Young and Hawaiian Hotels in the evening, under the auspices of the committee.

Mr. Chamberlain made the suggestion that a celebration plan followed in many of the states be adopted here. That is to have a big general celebration one year, and the next year a home or picnic celebration. The idea was thought a good one, and this year in Honolulu it will be a picnic celebration.

There are to be no exercises in the forenoon or early afternoon, thereby giving everybody an opportunity to enjoy the main portion of the holiday as he or she sees fit. The members of the National Guard, for once, will be let off from duty, and they may go to the boat race at Pearl Harbor and to the ball games, without feeling that they are under orders. There will be no military parade.

The committee proposes that it might be a good plan for people to bring their picnic suppers to the Capitol Grounds and enjoy them there under the trees during the band concert and literary exercises. As soon as darkness sets in the fireworks will be let off.

Just who will make the patriotic address is not certain, although several names have been suggested. That of Col. Hepburn of Iowa has the lead.
