AN EQUITY SENSATION

Woman at Kalaupapa Accuses Priests of Fraud.

Rosario Barete by her attorney, W. C. Achi, brings an equity suit against Antonio J. Lopes to set aside a deed.

On or about April 26, 1899, the complaint runs, "Antonio J. Lopes, together with Father Clement and Father Wendelin, induced your orator to execute and deliver a deed of said property to Antonio J. Lopes, for only one hundred dollars."

The deed is attached to the complaint, and complainant says "that said deed was procured by fraud and undue influence on the part of said Antonio J. Lopes, Father Clement and Father Wendelin on your orator."

"That on or about the execution of said deed to Antonio J. Lopes your orator was willing to sell the land to one Agnes Soares, a sister of your orator; said Agnes Soares and Manuel Soares came over to Kalaupapa and were ready to pay one hundred dollars; but, through the influence of said Father Wendelin, the sale was not executed and the sister of your orator was referred to Father Clement; said Agnes Soares and Manuel Soares came back to Honolulu and went to Father Clement to arrange for the purchase of the property; but said Father Clement refused to make the sale, claiming in that the property was worth one thousand dollars."

Complainant prays that defendant may be summoned to answer and be bound by all proceedings in the case, that the deed may be ordered to be set aside and canceled, that the defendant may be decreed to deliver to her a property to be required to pay all costs and charges of the suit, and that the plaintiff may have "other relief as to justice shall appertain."

Father Wendelin was formerly stationed at the Settlement. For some years there was friction between him and the superintendent, caused by the alleged meddlesome conduct of the priest with regard to the Settlement administration. Once, out of recognition of the good works of the Catholic church at the Settlement, the Board of Health withdrew a request to the Bishop for his consent to the removal of Father Wendelin. Yet, matters not improving, the substitution of the priest by another was ultimately effected. There has been peace between the church and the Board of Health ever since.

Father Clement is one of the most venerable of the Catholic clergy and universally revered for his zeal in religion and charity. The entire community would be glad to find, when the cause of the plaintiff in this case has been tried out, that the complainant is laboring under a mistake so far as Father Clement is concerned.

ONE DOLLAR DAMAGES FOR DELEGATE KUBIO

Delegate Kubio Kalaniana'ole was awarded one dollar damages, where he sued for about \$1200, in his libel in admiralty against the Pacific Mail Steamship Co. for damages to personal baggage on a voyage of the steamer Manchuria from San Francisco to Honolulu.

Judge Dole rendered the decision yesterday, holding that, while the company was responsible for injury to a passenger's baggage outside of the limitations of the contract, where the injury was due to its negligence, the plaintiff must prove that the goods were in good condition previously. There was no evidence to this effect produced in the case, so that the plaintiff was entitled only to nominal damages.

TESTIMONY RESTRICTED

With regard to the commission to take the testimony of plaintiff in San Francisco, in the suit of George Tourny vs. The Orphan Co., it is stipulated by Smith & Lewis and C. W. Ashford, counsel for the respective parties, that nothing in the interrogatories and answers shall be considered as evidence of either of the following facts, namely: 1. That the mortgage was executed by defendant or is his deed; 2. That the mortgage has been assigned by the German Savings & Loan Society to plaintiff.

CONCERNING THE NUUANU RESERVOIR

Editor Advertiser: No one who has lived for thirty or forty years in Nuuanu valley and seen the freshets tearing down through the stony water course, has any doubt as to the copious supply of water which could be saved with a well-regulated system of storage reservoirs, or even with one large lake at the head of the valley.

It is not the quantity we are worried about, but the quality. The wash from the mountains will do for irrigation or water-power or for bathing and laundry; it is also valuable for extinguishing fires. But some of us like water as a beverage and we like it best when it is clean and pure.

Can we safely use the valley water unless we have a large, expensive filtration reservoir? Will such a reservoir be less expensive than a pumping system? In speaking of the cost should we not also include health? It is costly to be unhealthy, as we have learned from two expensive quarantine experiences.

These questions are asked not in a spirit of carping criticism, but because they seem to be worthy of careful consideration. The Superintendent of Public Works has my profound sympathy, but my home is in Nuuanu, and a resident of that locality has a right to express interest in a subject so vital to health and general comfort.
