TRADE AND INDUSTRY.

Over 100,000 people are employed in the cork wood industry in Andalusia, southern Spain.

Roumania is now the fourth largest petroleum-producing country in the world. The list is headed by the United States; then comes Russia, while the third place is held by Austria-Hungary.

The north and northeast Lancashire cotton spinners have agreed that an advance of five per cent. in wages be paid to weavers, winders and warpers in July next.

Shanghai has a new cotton mill owned by a native Chinese company, with a mandarin as president. The mill has 40,000 spindles, and the cotton used is of Chinese growth.

Cold storage of fruit in the United States has grown to enormous proportions, nearly 3,000,000 barrels of apples having been stored last year.

In 1883 the cotton industry of British India was represented by 62 factories, with 1,554,000 spindles and 15,000 looms. Now there are: Factories, 205; spindles, 5,164,000, and looms, nearly 44,000.

Newfoundland is developing a new industry, the marketing of whale flesh in place of beef. One of the dealers claims that whale meat tastes "more like venison than beef."

SUNRISE ON HALEAKALA

Capt. Peterson Makes Trip Into the Crater.

Captain Peterson of the Inter-Island Steam Navigation Co. returned on Saturday from a trip to the crater of Haleakala on Maui. The mariner expresses the opinion that Haleakala is one of the wonders of the world, and should be one of Hawaii's best tourist attractions, if only a road and a shelter house are built to make traveling a comfort.

The sunrise which Captain Peterson viewed while in the crater was to him one of the most glorious natural wonders he ever saw.

Captain Peterson was one of a party of fifteen persons led by Senator Kalamana, and among them were Mrs. Peterson, Mrs. Kalamana, Mrs. Jones, Miss Louisa Young, Mrs. Kikumano, Miss Kikumano, Miss Keola, Joe Morris, Miss Robertson, Miss Carrie Brose, Miss Stewart.

The party started up the trail from Makawao at 10:30 p. m. last Tuesday and arrived at the crater at 5:10 a. m., remaining there until 9 o'clock the same morning, just to have time to view the sunrise. After breakfasting, the party returned to Makawao, arriving at 2:30 p. m.

Captain Peterson said that within 10 minutes after the sun had sent its rays into the crater all the mists were chased away and the whole landscape was as clear as crystal.
