EIGHTEEN MONTHS' OLD PLANTS IN BEARING SMOOTH CAYENNE.

The Haiku Fruit and Packing Co., was organized on Oct. 1, 1903, acquiring on that date the pineapple plantations of Mr. D. D. Baldwin, comprising some twelve acres of "Smooth Cayenne" plants, which formed the nucleus on which the company has expanded. At present the company has over 300,000 plants under cultivation. A well equipped up-to-date canning factory was erected where the cans are made in which the fruit is packed. The first packing was done last summer when 1500 cases of two-pound cans were put out. This season the pack is expected to be at least 3000 cases of two-pound cans, while for the season of 1906 it is estimated that the output will reach 10,000 cases of a value of \$30,000. The company also ships a considerable amount of fresh fruit to the Coast during the winter months, for which good returns are obtained.

The Haiku Fruit and Packing Co. plant over 9000 plants per acre and are this season getting a yield of about 22½ tons of fruit per acre for the first or plant crop, which makes an average of about five pounds per pine. The canned pineapple finds ready sale at profitable prices and the company looks forward to a bright future.

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INDEMNITY ASSET LOST IN SAGHALIEN

ST. PETERSBURG, July 10, 2 a. m.—With the Japanese flag hoisted for the first time on Russian soil, after 18 months of war, the importance of the landing on the island of Saghalien is generally admitted, both in newspaper comment and in Government circles. Complete occupation of the island is regarded as a foregone conclusion. The Novoe Vremya voices the general sentiment in holding that control of Saghalien puts a powerful lever in the possession of Japanese diplomacy, which finally has something tangible in its hands to throw upon the scales with the sword in the coming conference. There is a divergence of opinion with regard to the effect it will have upon the negotiations at Washington, some of the irreconcilables declaring that it makes peace at the present juncture more impossible than before, as Japan will be able to demand the cession of the island and a heavy indemnity as well, at which terms peace will be too costly; but the more prevalent view is that Japan has now in her hands enough triumphs to take the game.

The attack on the island certainly dissipates one of the hopes of the peace advocates, who have been suggesting that a voluntary cession might be an offset, with Port Arthur and the Chinese Railroad, against the payment of a large part or all of a monetary indemnity. No further report of the landing operations has been received. M. Muravieff, the Russian Ambassador at Rome and one of the peace plenipotentiaries, has arrived in St. Petersburg and called upon Foreign Minister Lansdorff yesterday. His sailing arrangements have not been perfected, as they are dependent upon the date of his audience with the Emperor, which will probably take place Tuesday. His suit has been completed by the selection of two secretaries from the Foreign Office.

The Novoe Vremya joins in the press chorus against M. Muravieff, saying it is hard to tell how good a diplomat he will prove, as he certainly was not a success at The Hague. The paper says that Baron Rosen, the other plenipotentiary, on the contrary, is a skillful diplomatist and has been socially successful.

Hilo advices state that Mrs. John Scott is ill with diphtheria, at her home at Wainaku Lawns. She is thought to have contracted the disease whilst nursing her niece, Miss Florence Scott, who recently died of it. The Scott family has been placed in quarantine.

CHINESE TO OCCUPY OLD HOPP PREMISES

The building at the corner of King and Bethel streets formerly occupied by J. Hopp & Co. has been leased from the estate of Thos. Cummins, to which it belongs, by a hui of nine Chinese, who will divide the main building into two stores, one of which will be occupied as a restaurant and the other as a furniture store for the sale of household articles made in China. The hui, it is said, has made an arrangement with a number of manufacturers in China to supply this stock. The old building was put up by J. Hopp about 1884, the front being attached to a number of small shacks which stood on the lot. All these were finally thrown together to make the Hopp store. Before that time, back in 1873, the father of the Lucas boys had a paint shop on the corner. The Chinese hui has been tearing down some parts of the old building, in obedience to the orders of the Board of Health, in order to admit more light and air to the premises.
