New York Refined: Successive reductions over previous quotations occurred May 30th, 20 points; June 21st, 30 points; 23rd, 10 points; 26th, 5 points, and July 12th, 10 points, establishing a price on that date of 5.29c. net cash in barrels equivalent to 5.15c. net cash in bags. Since that time no further change has occurred.

London Cable: July 13th quotes Java 96 per cent. test 11s. 9d. Fair refining 10s. against 10s. 6d. and 9s. 7 1-2d. respectively, same date last year. August beets 9s. 10 1-2d. against 9s. 8 1-4d., corresponding period previous year.

Eastern and Foreign Markets: Throughout the period under review prices have continued to decline in this country and abroad almost without interruption. The sagging tendency in European beets has been particularly pronounced and refiners in the United States have not failed to take full advantage of existing conditions. Cuban holders yielding reluctantly to the exigencies of the situation. Periods of comparative quiet and dullness have intervened, broken now and then by cable reports of fresh declines in Europe, which have reacted adversely on the course of prices here. Transac-

tions in Cubas have transpired lately at terms clearly indicative of the fact that holders, impressed with the advent of new crop Javas, have abandoned all pretense of maintaining the firm stand formerly displayed and apparently justified earlier in the season by the statistical position of sugars.

On the other hand, refined has displayed little activity and the demand has been disappointing, business proceeding for the most part on the hand-to-mouth basis. Successive reductions in list prices have seemingly not helped the situation materially and prospective buyers even yet consider the margin between raws and refined too large and no inducement for anticipating wants. Recently there have been some heavy cuts in freight rates, notably the reduction to 14c. from New York to Missouri river points which becomes effective 20th inst.

Consumption has fallen off in Europe as well as in America, but certainly not to any such alarming extent as to justify the present demoralization abroad and it is encouraging to note from telegraphic advices indicated above that in the last few days there has been a sharp rally in the prices of European beets, which, however, may be speculative in nature and of temporary duration. Moreover it is to be remembered that invisible stocks in the large consuming countries must be considerably depleted, and this fact may exert an influence later on in the season. Mr. F. O. Licht cables from Magdeburg that the weather abroad is favorable for the growing crop.

Latest Statistical Position.—Willett & Gray report U. S. four ports in all hands estimated July 12, 227,456 tons against 206,000 tons same date last year. Six ports Cuba estimated July 11, 317,000 tons against 129,786 tons, corresponding period previous year. United Kingdom, June 29 (Bonded stock) 102,900 tons against 139,000 tons same date in 1904. To all stocks in all the principal countries by cable July 13 at latest uneven dates 2,652,456 tons against 2,470,786 tons; decrease from last year 418,339 tons. Sugar crops of the world, total cane sugar production 4,473,129 tons against 4,297,725 tons same date previous campaign. European beet sugar production 4,681,000 tons against 5,874,968 tons same date in 1904-5. United States beet sugar production 299,722 tons against 208,135 tons same date previous year. Grand total cane and beet sugar 9,363,851 tons against 10,299,828 tons; estimated decrease in the world's production 936,977 tons.

Charters.—Owing to damage from rust and other causes, our wheat crop has turned out considerably less than was anticipated and it is now feared there will be very little for export from this State and the barley crop is not as good as prospects promised earlier in the season. Last charter yesterday 23s. 9d. Liverpool or London direct with merchandise.

Lumber Freights.—Are easier in sympathy with wheat and we quote, Sydney 32s; Melbourne, Adelaide or Port Pirie 30s 3d to 30s 6d; direct West Coast 37s 6d to 38s 9d.

Exchange.—London demand, \$4.87 1-4; London, 80 days, \$4.85 1-2; New York, regular, 6c; Telegraphic, 8c.

Coffee.—Stock of Hawaiians in first hands today is 96 bags. We quote: Pape, 13c to 14c; prime, 11 1-2c to 12 1-2c; good, 10 1-2c to 11 1-4c; fair, 9 1-2c to 10 1-4c; inferior, 7c to 9c; peaberries, 10 1-2c to 12c.

ROBERTS CROSSED
OCEAN IN IRONS

Private John C. Roberts, who for six years served the United States in the Philippines and in China, arrived from Honolulu yesterday and is in custody at the City Prison, charged with burglary. The crime he is accused of was committed last March, when Roberts was on furlough from his battalion, the Twenty-eighth Coast Artillery, now stationed on the islands. The place robbed belonged to John Lawson and is located at Jackson and First avenue. There Mr. Lawson, who is a prominent clubman, has his bachelor's

quarters. On March 26th they were entered and a great quantity of clothing and trinkets were stolen. Among the latter was a gold clock which Mr. Lawson had won at polo.

Early in June Detective Harry Reynolds, who was working on the case, in conjunction with Detective Wren, received a letter from Honolulu which intimated that, if the quarters of Private Roberts were searched the stolen property might be recovered. The search was made, and every article stolen from Mr. Lawson's house was found, the prize clock serving to identify the goods positively. Roberts found out that the search was being made, and gave himself up to his superior officer, Lieutenant Trotter, at Camp McKinley. After making a statement of his case Roberts drew a revolver and attempted suicide by shooting himself in the breast. The wound inflicted was only a slight one.

When Roberts arrived on the steamer yesterday he was removed, to the Presidio, where Detectives Conlin and McGowan of the Harbor precinct got him last night. At the City Prison, where his name was placed on the detinue book, especial precautions were taken to prevent Roberts making another attempt on his life, for the accused man has threatened to kill himself repeatedly sooner than stand trial. Up until the time of his arrest and accusation Roberts bore a good character.—Chronicle.
