WALKED ON
THE WALLS

Then Waikiki Woman
Posted Up a Sign
"Kapu."

Various stories are going the rounds as to the event that caused the Attorney-General to begin his crusade against sea walls at Waikiki. It is now stated that the action of one woman owning property at the beach was the cause of the dispute. She is said to have posted notices prohibiting people from walking along her sea wall. The native fishermen and others have been accustomed from time immemorial to walk along the beach front and it is said that they made the complaint to persons who took it to the Attorney-General.

Following is a sample of the notices sent to property owners. The letter is one of the "mild" class, which gives the owner the option of furnishing a right of way or tearing down the walls. The letter is on the letter paper of the Attorney-General's office, but is evidently a carbon copy, the address alone being written in by a machine and the signature attached. The letter reads as follows:

Honolulu, August 7th, 1905.

Honolulu, Oahu.

Dear Sir,
You will please take notice that in accordance with information given to this office and from maps on file here, it appears that you have erected, or there has been erected, a certain sea wall or abutment upon a line outside of the high water mark upon your premises at Kapua.

While beginning at the point granted in the patent for the property, which you now own, you have extended your bulkhead considerably beyond the property owned by you, absorbing within your lines the beach between high and low water mark, over which the Territory has a right of way.

We therefore request that you remove your bulkhead to its proper place, or if you prefer it, grant to the Territory of Hawaii in writing, a right of way over the property taken outside the proper lines of your bulkhead.

MR. ROLPH'S BRITISH FLAG.

A San Francisco daily paper of June 9th contains the following, which will interest Mr. Rolph's friends in Hawaii:

"That the members of the police department in the vicinity of his home should take lessons in international courtesy is the opinion of James Rolph, Jr., who resides at Twenty-fifth and San Jose avenue. Rolph held a little flag-raising on Wednesday evening in honor of an English friend who was visiting him and used for that purpose a full-sized British flag. The flag was seen by two policemen from the Mission station, who evidently thought it betokened revolutionary designs, and, upon their objections, the banner was hauled down. Mr. Rolph is a member of the firm of Hind, Rolph & Co., with offices at 32 California street, and

when seen regarding the incident he said:

"Mr. Black, a large shipowner of Glasgow, is visiting me, and as, upon my last trip to Europe, he hoisted the American flag in my honor, I thought I would return the compliment when he came to see me. I therefore hoisted a British flag last night, and it had hardly been out when a couple of policemen came along and wanted to know what it was and why it was flying. They did not order me to take it down, but I thought it best to do so after the incident. I am a Native Son and a loyal American, but I think I have a right to hang out any flag I please. I will not take any steps in the matter, but, as the policemen did not seem to know what flag it was, I should advise a course in flag history for such members of the department."

LOOK OUT FOR A
MANGO INSECT PEST

Honolulu, Hawaii, August 9, 1905.

Editor Advertiser: Through the columns of your paper I would like to call the attention of the public to an apparently newly introduced insect pest of the mango, taken recently from the ripe fruit in the seeds where it has developed from the egg, living on the embryo and passing through the larval and pupal stages entirely within the seed, a matter of many weeks. This insect is a beetle, one of the true weevils of the family Curculionidae, and has been determined by the Bureau of Entomology of this department at Washington as Cryptorhynchus mangiferae. The original home of the insect is uncertain, but it is recorded from Madagascar, through India, Ceylon, etc., to Java and other Malayan Islands. Mr. Schwarz of the U. S. Bureau of Entomology gives the further information that: "The species is not enumerated by Sharp from the Hawaiian Islands and is no doubt a recent introduction there. The weevil appears to be extremely injurious to mangoes, and accounts of its ravages are numerous."

This station would urge all persons growing mangoes to look carefully into the fruit, removing the pulp and cutting through the husk for evidences of insect work, and if found infested in any manner to notify the office in order that a personal inspection may be made. Address U. S. Experiment Station, P. O. Box 753 or telephone Blue 412. It is extremely important that the present distribution of the pest on this island be determined and prompt, vigorous action be taken to stamp it out. At least the pest may be prevented by quarantine measures from spreading to the other islands. A more carefully prepared account will be published by this station in the near future.
