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

Official visits were the order of the day yesterday. In the morning Commander Beggs of the German cruiser Condor paid his official visit to Commander Lyon at the Naval Station. In the afternoon Acting Governor Atkinson, his aides (Major Ziegler and Capt. Berndt) and Commander Lyon visited the Condor, and were entertained aboard the man-of-war. On returning to shore a salute was fired from the ship in honor of the Acting Governor.

THE SPARTAN SOLD.

News arrived from Maui yesterday that the ship Spartan which is wrecked off Spreckelsville was sold by Captain John Flynn to Captain D. F. Nicholson on last Monday, the purchase price being \$400. Last week Captain Flynn received a telegram from the insurance people to sell the wrecked ship, and in accordance with these instructions disposed of it to Captain Nicholson. It is understood that Captain Nicholson in turn sold the boat to a syndicate of Japanese, and still retaining a one-fifth interest in whatever may be gotten out of her. There is nearly two thousand tons of coal in the vessel, and if one-half of this amount can be obtained, a good profit will be made.

At the time Captain Flynn announced that the ship was for sale, Leon Kessel, one of the ship's crew, immediately arranged to buy it, and formed a partnership with Captain Nicholson for the purchase of the boat. The arrangement was satisfactory, but Captain Nicholson wished to know whether Kessel had his part of the price. The latter replied that he could obtain money at a moment's notice from the Bank of Walluku, and stated that he had \$6000 with his father at Buffalo. However, the money was not forthcoming, and Captain Nicholson decided to go into the deal alone. From Captain Flynn it is learnt that Kessel was working his way to San Francisco on the Spartan.

THE MIDWAY BEACON.

The light to be installed at Midway, materials for the erection of which were carried by the Iwaland yesterday, is a French lens lantern equal to the light in the local harbor. The light will be a beacon rather than a lighthouse and will be located on a mast 30 feet in height. The light will be placed on Sand Island at a height of about 40 feet above sea level, the lantern being 70 feet above the sea. T. M. Rae, head carpenter, J. F. Hunt, W. Small and W. Hickey went to Midway by the steamer to erect the light. The pole and house have been made here so that the assembling should not take long. The carpenters will return by the Iroquois. As the Iwaland, by arrangement with Captain A. P. Niblack of the Iroquois, took the material for the light to Midway, she had to leave a part of the supplies for the cable station behind. The Iroquois will take these to Midway, leaving here upon the arrival of the U. S. S. Iris, with stores for the marine guard at Midway.

SPARTAN'S CREW HERE.

The Maui which arrived from Maui yesterday brought twelve sailors from the ship Spartan wrecked off Kahului two weeks ago. The ill-fated vessel is reported to be resting on the reef with twelve feet of water in her hold and unless the weather grows much worse she seems to be in no immediate danger of breaking up. The mate and second mate were among the passengers of the Maui, Capt. Flynn remaining on Maui. The men are at the Sailors' Home. They have been paid off, but are going to see the United States District Attorney to find out if they can not force the master of the vessel to send them to Puget Sound, claiming that they signed on the vessel in Newcastle to go to Puget Sound and had a right to be sent there. The men state that they all signed the log book of the Spartan to the effect that the Maui could have saved the vessel if the steamer had answered the signals of distress flown by the Spartan when the steamer was passing.

SIBERIA OFFICERS' PILIKIA.

The Chronicle of August 14 says:—Fearing that a similar fate awaited him as overtook his fellow officer, John Francis Green, who was arrested last week charged with having obtained fraudulent naturalization papers which he used in securing the position of second officer of the big ocean liner Siberia, Arthur O'Neil, chief officer of the Siberia, signed a petition yesterday afternoon asking the Superior Court to set aside and cancel his naturalization papers on the ground that they were obtained on false testimony.

Coincident with the remarkable action of Chief Officer O'Neil, Walter Lewin, a marine engineer on the Siberia, living at 40 California street, appeared in the United States District Court and filed an application to have his citizenship papers canceled on the ground that they were invalid because he had obtained them only a few weeks after he first came to this country.

This is by far the most startling development in the rapid-fire arrests that have resulted from the investigation now being carried on by Service Agent

Richard H. Taylor. The latter has run to ground no less than a score of illegal citizens who were serving on American vessels, which positions they secured through false papers. In three cases the issuance of these bogus papers is said to have been traced to former Deputy County Clerk William C. Ralsch. Charged with this he was arrested a few days ago and released on \$5000 bonds. Still more sensational results are expected to break within the next few days.

O'Neil came to this country the first time in 1892 and touched at this port in 1893 and 1894. He was then serving an apprenticeship on British vessels. In 1898 he came here again and secured a position on the Doric, where he served until 1904. In 1902 he took out his intention papers as an alien, and instead of waiting two years as the law provides, he was advised that he could get his naturalization papers without further delay. He claims that William J. Kennedy, Deputy County Clerk at the time, advised him to that effect and consequently he secured his papers from Judge Trout, William J. Kennedy and Joseph F. Sullivan, a clerk in the County Recorder's office, appearing as his witnesses. Sullivan now lives at 809 Mission street. Before Judge Trout O'Neil swore that he had come here before he was eighteen years of age and that he had resided here until he was twenty-one years old, having in all lived here more than five years, as is required by law.

Walter Lewin, one of the assistant engineers of the Siberia, came here in 1899, and was then in the service of an English vessel. On October 25 of that year he secured his naturalization papers as a minor, or under eighteen years of age. On December 9, 1902, he appeared before the local inspectors and secured a license as chief engineer on ocean steamers. His witnesses were James McCann, then of 1501 Jackson street, and Thomas Finnigan of 270 Lexington avenue. They appeared for Lewin in Department Seven of the Superior Court and swore that he came to this country before he was eighteen and that he had resided here more than five consecutive years. According to Lewin himself the only time he had ever been here before was when he had stopped one week in New York city en route from Montreal to Liverpool. Owing to the fact that Lewin and O'Neil have surrendered their papers voluntarily the Government is not inclined to prosecute them and it is also possible that no action will be taken against the witnesses who appeared for them.

RESUMPTION OF RUN.

The local agents of the Toyo Kisen Kaisha expect to be informed shortly of the departure from Yokohama of the first of the Maru liners to resume its regular trans-Pacific run abandoned when hostilities with Russia commenced. The Nippon, America and Hongkong Marus were used in the naval service during the war as scout ships and auxiliary cruisers. One of the trio is reported lost, but the others will resume their mercantile career at once and one at least should be through here this month.

DIRIGO COMING.

The Marine Exchange received word yesterday of the departure of the ship Dirigo from Norfolk, Va., for Honolulu, with a load of coal for the local naval station. This is a very quick dispatch, as the vessel only reached Philadelphia from Hawaii on the 3th ult., with a cargo of sugar, after being out 159 days. She was discharged and then taken to Norfolk. The Dirigo was only 23 days discharging her sugar, going to Norfolk and loading coal. She is under charter to take sugar to Delaware Breakwater next season.

ALAMEDA'S BIG LOAD.

A cable was received yesterday by Acting Governor Atkinson from Colonel Jones, who is with the Hawaiian rifle team at Seagirt, asking the Governor to arrange with the War Department for transportation of the team back to Hawaii by the Alameda. A reply was sent that arrangements have been made for the Alameda to bring the team back, laurels and all. The vessel is due to arrive here on September 15.

YESTERDAY'S ARRIVALS.

The steamer Maui which arrived from Hilo and Maui ports brought her usual large list of passengers. Bags of seed corn to the number of 4743 were landed at Kipahulu from Hakalau. The Nihau arrived from Kaula with three deck passengers. The following sugar was reported left on Kaula: K. S. M., 5000; M. A. K., 2556; G. & R., 3000.

LINER ACTIVITY.

The Doric, Smith, from the Orient, although anxiously looked for, did not put in an appearance yesterday. She should arrive early this morning. The Mongolia from the Coast should also come in today. She or the Doric will probably dock at the Hackfeld wharf, whichever arrives first.

IWALANI TO MIDWAY.

The Iwaland left for Midway yesterday afternoon with supplies and stores for the isolated cable station. Six head of cattle and some hogs and sheep were taken by the vessel.

The cargo included a new boiler for the Midway ice plant, the old one being found too small. Capt. Pilz took the steamer out and expects to reach the island next Wednesday and complete unloading his cargo within a week. The Iwaland carried materials for the construction of a beacon light at Midway and four men to assist in its erection.

BIG BLASTS.

A number of big blasts were set off early yesterday morning at the Alakea street slip now being constructed. The explosions were terrific and debris was scattered over a wide radius. The large lumps of coral, weighing several tons each, which have been brought up by the dredger were being reduced to fragments. The charge was inserted in the top of the boulders with such nicety that the force of the explosion traveling downward, no hole was made in the ground on which the great coral boulders rested.

PLENTY OF FISH.

There was big fishing in No. 1 Naval slip yesterday afternoon about the top of the high tide. A school of akule appeared in the harbor and quantities were taken by fishermen operating from the wharves. Bamboo poles were used and fine lines, the bait being live shrimps. The fish were of small size, but bit readily and several good catches were made.

SHIPPING NOTES.

The Sierra is due from the Colonies on Tuesday.

The Ventura is due from San Francisco on Wednesday.

The Mikahala has gone on the marine railway for a general overhauling.

The Kauai took the Kauai port run yesterday, in place of the Mikahala.

The bark Rhoderick Dhu arrived at Hilo from San Francisco on the 27th inst.

The American bark Lord Templeton sailed for the Sound in ballast yesterday morning.

Purser Wilburton of the Nihau reported that the bark Mary L. Cushing had 1275 tons of coal out at Eleese on Wednesday.

Notice is given that the bell buoy off Humboldt bar, California, has capsized. It will be replaced as soon as practicable.

H. Hackfeld & Co. have received no advices to the effect that the Korea will omit Honolulu on her next trip from the Orient.

The Naval Station had heard nothing yesterday of the departure of the U. S. S. Iris from Mare Island for here. She was to have sailed yesterday.

Three Japanese laborers went to Midway by the Iwaland yesterday to relieve three other Japanese who have been working on the island for some time past.
