

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—The Navy Department continues to receive complaints respecting Commander James H. Bull of the United States Navy.

NEW PACIFIC LINE

LOS ANGELES, Cal., August 19.—S. T. E. Gibbon, third vice president and general counsel of the San Pedro, Los Angeles and Salt Lake railroad, will sail for Japan within the next two weeks.

It is further reported that the proposed steamship line will be controlled entirely by Senator W. A. Clark and will be operated in connection with the Clark road and is entirely independent of any similar lines controlled by E. H. Harriman or by Huntington interests.

RAILS FOR JAPAN

The Southern Pacific Company and the Pacific Mail Steamship Company have been granted a concession for the shipping of \$2,000,000 worth of railway steel to be used in the construction of a \$10,000,000 railroad which is about to be built in Japan.
