

## LADIES TO BOYCOTT BILLBOARD GOODS

A boycott is being waged by many Honolulu housewives against several brands of eatables which are being advertised on various billboards about the business, residence and suburban sections of Honolulu. A social organization composed of ladies recently decided to take such a stand and they will continue to boycott certain brands of eatables until the objectionable billboards are removed and the placards are withheld from public gaze, especially in places where the scenery is marred by them.

During the meeting of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union yesterday afternoon at Central Union church, the matter was indirectly referred to and a discussion of the subject resulted. Mrs. Whitney, president of the W. C. T. U., thought it would be a proper thing for the Union to organize a "Village Improvement Society," to prevent any more of "those horrid posters and billboards from being put up."

Two or three of the members stated that they had boycotted a certain line of goods extensively advertised on the billboards and would continue to do so until the posters came down. Some action may be taken at a future meeting. In this connection, one lady showed the following clipping from the Rochester Union and Advertiser:

"Many of the largest advertisers in the country have come to the conclusion that out-of-door advertising is a waste of money, and that no results come from the placing of signs on hill-sides and in all sorts of conspicuous places. The concerns that do that sort of work are curtailing expenses, knowing well that the beginning of the end of their business is at hand. In addition to this, there is a decided movement all over the country to do away with the billboard horror, the argument against it being its hideousness and the marred effect on the scenery in the rural districts and its damage to contiguous property in the cities."

Superintendent of Public Works C. S. Holloway is considering the use of crude oil on the streets. It will likely not be used on macadamized streets.

The Associated Charities will hold an annual meeting this afternoon at 3 o'clock in the Board of Directors' room Bank of Hawaii. A general invitation is extended the public to attend this meeting.

The grand jury was excused yesterday by Judge Robinson until October 2nd pending the decision as to the lapse of the term. The criminal cases on the calendar were continued to the same date.

Alexander Young, proprietor of the Alexander Young Hotel, accompanied by Mrs. Young and daughter, leaves in the Alameda today for California. They will occupy their Oakland home for a while.

Auditor Fisher stated yesterday that he did not see the force of the arguments made against taxing the big plantations at Honolulu as their ownership is here and their head offices, while only one-half the tax goes to Oahu.

A decree of foreclosure was signed yesterday in the suit of George W. Macfarlane against the Waikiki Seaside Hotel Co. for the sum of \$13,750 and Fred Wundenberg was named as commissioner by Judge Robinson to sell the property.

A. N. Campbell, Frank Hustace and P. J. Lowrey yesterday made their answer as respondents in the suit of Charles R. Hemenway, trustee of the Honolulu Clay Co., a bankrupt, against the Honolulu Clay Co. and others. The respondents deny knowledge of any irregularities.

A special meeting of the Honolulu Symphony Society will be held this evening at 8 o'clock, at the Club House, Halalea Lawn, to consider the continuation of Mr. Jos. H. Stockton's engagement as leader of the orchestra and such other business as may be brought before the meeting.
