EVERYBODY INTERESTED

City Improvement Plan Meets With Much Approval.

Honolulu is certainly enthusiastic over the city improvement scheme, judging from the number of letters received in answer to the committee's circular letter, asking for support of the project.

The circular letter was sent out to a large number of citizens selected by Mr. Spalding of the committee who districted the city so that various persons should act as organizers in their respective sections.

The Promotion Committee is gratified at the ready response of citizens. Mr. Spalding and Secretary Wood ask that those who have not yet responded do so at their early convenience, stating whether they can serve or not, or if they have suggestions to make, to make them.

The offer of Mrs. Eliza Wilder, as given in her letter printed below, was acted upon favorably. She proposes to furnish Golden Shower trees for the full length of Pensacola street, both sides. The Promotion Committee endorsed this scheme of street improvement.

One letter was from Superintendent Holloway endorsing the committee's action in requiring that tree-trimming by the telephone and electric light companies be done under trained supervision. The letters referred to are as follows:

HOSMER READY FOR WORK.

My Dear Mr. Wood: At the meeting of the Honolulu Improvement Committee, held on Friday evening, January 5, it was voted that the secretary be instructed to request the Promotion Committee to furnish for its use a supply of stationery and stamps. It was further suggested that it would be well if a letter head be prepared for the committee, the arrangement and design to be left with the Secretary of the Improvement Committee.

GOLDEN SHOWER AVENUE.

My Dear Mr. Wood: At the meeting of the Honolulu Improvement Committee, held on Friday evening, January 5, the question of the improvement of Pensacola street came up for discussion, as the result of an offer made by Mrs. Eliza Wilder, widow of the late W. C. Wilder.

Mrs. Wilder, desiring that Pensacola street be lined with Golden Shower trees, offered to contribute for the work 100 plants which she now has on her grounds, growing in sake tubs. After due consideration the committee adopted the following resolution: "Be it Resolved, That it is the recommendation of the Honolulu Improvement Committee that Pensacola street from Lumaillo to Wilder avenue be planted with Golden Shower trees, the trees to be set along the outer edge of the sidewalk, as near 30 feet apart as is consistent with the intersections of the side streets, and other reasons interfering with regular spacing. Be it resolved, further, that the committee express its appreciation of Mrs. Wilder's generous offer, which is hereby accepted." Very sincerely yours, RALPH S. NO TREE MUTILATION.

Sir: I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 29th ult., also copy of letter from the Honolulu Improvement Committee, which acts as an advisory board to the Promotion Committee.

After consultation with Mr. Hosmer, I have decided that it will be advisable to call the attention of the telephone and electric companies to sections 635-636 and 637 of the Revised Laws of the Territory. I shall also require them in future to notify me of any proposed tree-cutting or trimming, and I will then make arrangements with Mr. Hosmer to have someone present from the Board of Agriculture and Forestry in order to see that the work is properly done and that the trees are not mutilated.

Dear Sir: Prior to anything kindly accept my compliments of the season. I am exceedingly sorry that I let the opportunity slip by—of my attendance at your meeting of yesterday afternoon—for the knowledge that one acquires through newspapers is only secondary and very often one can not feel sure that that which he reads is the absolute truth or fact.

Since our last conversation, at your office, I started out to form my auxiliary club, but have come to the conclusion that it is too close to the end of our holiday celebration to expect them (those that I've personally asked) to attend meetings of any nature, but I am confident of success in this particular in the near future.

Judging from the character of the populace which surround me, and with whom I shall have to deal, I have resolved to issue a call, including the ladies as well. If I succeed in interesting the ladies our work is done, and the goal of ultimate success reached.

I read with great pleasure the proceedings of your meeting and find that certain suggestions were made that will better the conditions of the poorer classes of our city, by offering them advantages that such can not be obtained on account of their inability to pay for them. I have reference to the suggested or proposed public "golf links" and "bathing resorts."

It should be the aim of the General Committee to endeavor to interest and reach primarily that class of people, even though the committee should feel the least encouraged by them. Let us reach them, give them all the material aid in our power, and by all means show them that their co-operation is sought for the best interests of our city; and, once we have their good will, we will not and can not ask for more. The better class of our cosmopolitan population does not need much assistance.

After conversing with some of my countrymen and advising them along the lines of their required improvements, one of them stated that he was not inclined to make one step toward improving his dominions any more than already apparent, for two reasons. I asked him what his reasons were, to which he replied as follows: "You see that I am living on leased land, and having only a few more years of tenancy, I am not justified in spending a cent more on the place; besides, if I do, why the Government will raise my rate of taxes and water rates." That argument, coming from such a source, was quite laughable and it took me some time to convince him, if I really did succeed in that feat, I do not wish to tire you, Mr. Wood, but I feel that you ought to be made aware of all little obstacles that arise in our way. I shall keep you informed to the best of my ability.

In the meantime, I am going to cause the fences along the front of our place to be removed and remodel the entire yard. At the conclusion of the work I shall ask you to look at the place. I am going to do it as an example to the people around me, and with the hope that they may follow in my footsteps. To accomplish what I have stated is quite a task, owing to the deplorable condition in which the Department of Public Works left the street directly in front of us.

It will be my aim to ask for the assistance of the Government in this respect. I should like to take you up there and show you just what I mean to convey. Personal inspection is the best. And to conclude, dear Mr. Wood, I wish to accept the invitation, pro forma, of the General Committee to act as chairman for the formation of this club, thanking you and the committee for the honor conferred.
