The tides at Kahului and Hilo occur about one hour earlier than at Honolulu.

Hawaiian standard time is 10 hours 30 minutes slower than Greenwich time, being that of the meridian of 157 degrees thirty minutes. The time which the tides blow at 1:30 p. m., which is the same as Greenwich, 6 hours 0 minutes. Sun and moon are for local time for the whole group.

## WENT UP IN SMOKE

**Hundreds of Thousands of Firecrackers Were Discharged.**

The grand finale of the Chinese New Year celebration came last evening, when hundreds of thousands of firecrackers were discharged on Maunakea street in the presence of hundreds of celestials. The pyrotechnic display cost the Wing Lock Society \$500, and the Chinese looked as if they were well satisfied with the result.

The fireworks were discharged from a platform erected outside the second story windows of a Maunakea street store. Strings of Chinese lanterns overhead displayed two yellow dragon flags on crossed staffs. On the platform a dozen Chinese were gathered. Two ropes reeved through pulleys at either end of the platform were used to swing the long strings of fireworks out into the street away from the building. To prevent injury to the front of the building, an awning was hung, which was kept wet. The strings were discharged alternately. When one string was all burnt out another would be lighted. The sharp crackling of the smaller fireworks was intermingled with successive detonations of larger firecrackers, or small bombs.

The crowd of Chinese stood fascinated with the fiery spectacle. For two hours and a half the firecracker display held the attention of the colony.

## WATERHOUSE MAY LOSE HIS OFFICE

PASADENA, January 17.—For the second time in the history of the State, the famous "recall" provision which is in the charters of both Pasadena and Los Angeles, is to be invoked in the case of Mayor William Waterhouse of Pasadena. This decision was reached this afternoon at a meeting of prominent citizens, which roundly scored the Mayor for an alleged attempt to block a municipal issue.

A recall petition is being circulated, and if 25 per cent. of the registered voters sign it the Council must call another Mayoralty election. This action follows a wholesale petition to the Mayor to remove City Attorney Fitzgerald from office on the same grounds, which the Mayor turned down. The only other occasion upon which the "recall" was used was when the voters of Los Angeles, two years ago, ousted Councilman J. P. Davenport, accused of being in league with the liquor interests.

Mayor Waterhouse came from Honolulu, where he has relatives.

### BATTLE LOSSES.

Although Austerlitz was for France undoubtedly the most glorious of the Napoleonic epoch, it was not by any means the bloodiest. The army on that day lost fourteen generals killed and wounded. At Eylau, the number rose to twenty-three, at Wagram to forty, at Moscow to forty-nine, and at Leipzig to sixty. Twelve generals were killed at Moscow and sixteen at Leipzig. Of all Napoleon's marshals and generals, Oudinot is believed to have held the record for the number of wounds. He was wounded thirty-eight times altogether, and Napoleon one day said to him in chaff, "You seem to make it a specialty."—London Globe.
