 An entertainment in aid of the famine sufferers in Japan will be given at the Y. M. C. A. on Friday night.
 Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Chapin of New York, who have been guests for some weeks past at the Moana, leave today for Japan.
 The Survey Department has men at work surveying the line deposits near Waianae, for the development of a new road to the coast.

 Peter Adam leaves today for Yokohama on the Manchuria, where he will be employed by the J. A. M. Johnson Co., by which firm he has been employed for some time here.
 Fred Alexander sails for Japan today on the Manchuria to join his partner, J. A. M. Johnson, who left here a short time ago to establish a business in the Mikado's empire.
 The official thanks of the Japanese Acting Consul have been extended to Kaula, the Hawaiian who rescued a drowning Jap at Lahaina on the 7th inst. The boy is also to get a Carnegie medal.
 Mrs. C. M. White and family wish to thank the members of the local Masonic chapters, the Knights of Pythias lodges and the many friends who aided them during their recent bereavement.
 Henry Vida arrested three Koreans yesterday, who are being held at the police station for investigation, supposedly in connection with the shooting on Monday night. These, with two drunks, were the only arrests for the day.
 During Lent the congregations of St. Andrew's Cathedral and of St. Clement's church unite for the Wednesday evening services, and on these occasions the addresses are delivered by laymen. The service tonight will be held at St. Clement's church and the subject will be, "Religion in Business."

LOCAL BREVITIES.
 The organization of the Lahaina National Bank has been completed and the institution will open its doors for business on April 2, with C. D. Lufkin as cashier.
 A Porto Rican who interfered in a purely family row between husband and wife in a gambling joint near River and Hotel streets yesterday was arrested for assault, in addition to receiving a combined whipping from the pair.
 The trial of Johnson, who is under indictment for the murder of the little Wharton child at Waiialua a short time ago, has been set for Thursday next. No continuance will be allowed except by mutual consent of the attorneys.
 A mission for Chinese is to be established by the Salvation Army on Kaula, Adjutant Bamberly leaving for that point on the W. G. Hall yesterday. He will spend a week on that island making an inspection of the work being done.
 The German government has sent an expert from the Fatherland to take steps to destroy the rats which have been damaging the cocoa crop of Samoa, according to reports from there by Paul Brant, one of the leading men in the Samoan German colony, who is now in town.
 During the end of last week the roughest weather experienced in recent years was felt at Hanalei. The church and several houses were unroofed by the wind, which blew at a terrific rate, and sand from the beach was carried 400 feet inland, covering the road and gardens.
