A FEW OF PROFESSOR BARON'S CORKLIKE POSES




FIGURE 1.

This position is one of the easiest for novices to learn. Simply lie on your back, keeping your lungs well filled, your spine rigid and chest well expanded.



This is not quite as easy, but with a little practice can readily be mastered. As in Position 1, and in fact all positions in the water, the respiration must be natural.



FIGURE 3.

This is a difficult position to acquire and very hard to maintain. As the feet are inclined to either raise forward or backward, the equilibrium must be governed by the head only. The Professor is standing in the water, hands crossed over chest, without moving hands or feet.



FIGURE 4.

A difficult position, but one which can be acquired by practice. It consists of lying on your breast, as in the breast stroke, without making a movement. The spine must be rigid, limbs all straight, arms extended to preserve balance, and head well back.

ROWING RACE DAY'S FEATURE

Germans and Britishers Pull for Silver Trophy.

There will be crowds at both the Healan and Myrtle bathhouses this afternoon, to witness the rowing race between the officers of the British cableship Restorer and the German training ship Herzogin Sophie Charlotte.

The captain of the H. S. C. and his friends will view the contest from the Myrtle headquarters.

The race will start at 4:30 p. m. from off the old Fort street wharf and the course will be round the knuckle buoy, a distance of about a mile and a half.

The race is for a handsome silver cup. The barges Kapiolani and Keokalani will be used, the Restorer boys rowing in the first-named boat.

Picturesque Custom to Be Revived Today.

Today is the Hawaiians' greatest holiday and it is eminently fit and proper that the Hui Holopua-u Maile Alii should have selected the date for their first public parade.

The society was formed for the purpose of preserving the old Hawaiian style of horseback riding with the picturesque pa-u or divided riding-skirt, which was rapidly dying out.

The club has thrived since its organization and great preparations have been made to make today's parade a strikingly spectacular event.

The program is as follows:
6:30 a. m.—Meet at the Waikiki residence of Mrs. Kalnana Puahi and don the pa-u.

8 a. m.—Procession forms with Sheriff A. M. Brown marshal of the parade.

8:30 a. m.—Procession moves to the Kapahulu road, thence to Washington place.

9 a. m.—Riders pay their respects to Queen Liliuokalani.

9:30 a. m.—Procession moves from Washington place and proceeds by Richards and Hotel streets to the Young Hotel, stopping to pay their respects to the Hawaii Promotion Committee.

10 a. m.—Procession leaves Promotion Committee's rooms and continues by Hotel, Nuuanu and King streets to Palace Square.

10:45 a. m.—Decoration of Kamehameha statue.

11:15 a. m.—Procession starts to Waikiki, moving on King street and the Waikiki road to Kapiolani Park, where the members will give an equestrian exhibition.

After the exhibition the riders will return to the home of Mrs. Puahi, the founder of the club, where they will be entertained at a luau.
