PARK WILL GET MONEY

Supervisors Can Appropriate for City Playground.

The Supreme Court yesterday decided that the county of Oahu has the right to set aside money for the maintenance of Kapiolani Park.

The decision was in the test case brought to determine whether the Board of Supervisors could pay bills incurred in park maintenance, and covered therefore the point of the appropriation of money for the Park by the Board. The syllabus of the decision, which was delivered by Justice Wilder and concurred in by the court, sets forth succinctly:

"The County of Oahu has power to appropriate county funds for the maintenance and up-keep of Kapiolani Park and the roads therein."

The decision covers the two cases of the Pacific Oil Transportation Company and the Schuman Carriage Company, Limited, in which Judge Robinson granted the petition for a writ of mandamus against County Auditor Bicknell, compelling him to issue warrants to the petitioners for supplies to Kapiolani Park. The Supreme Court affirms Robinson's judgment in both cases, so the mandamus issued by him will stand, and Bicknell will have to issue the warrants. The decision of the court says, in substance:

"These two cases were argued together and are appeals from judgments granting peremptory writs of mandamus against the County Auditor of Oahu to compel him to issue warrants on the County Treasurer to pay two claims against the County, which claims have been examined, allowed and ordered to be paid by the Board of Supervisors, one for a certain amount of oil for a road in Kapiolani Park and the other for repairs to a dray used in that park.

"The question to be decided is, whether the County of Oahu has power to appropriate County funds for the maintenance and up-keep of Kapiolani Park. "As to the claim for the oil, there is no question but that that is a lawful and valid one. The County has express power to maintain "public streets, highways, roads, alleys, trails and bridges within its boundaries," (County Act, Sec. 9, subdivision 3), and whether a road, on the maintenance of which County funds are spent is within or without Kapiolani Park is immaterial.

struction of subdivision 2 of Sec. 9 of the County Act, which reads as follows: Each County shall have the power to purchase and otherwise acquire, take on lease and hold real and personal property within its defined boundaries and to manage and dispose of the same as the interests of the inhabitants may require.

"The general rule, as stated by Mr. Dillon, is that "A municipal corporation possesses and can exercise the following powers and no others: First, those granted in express words; second, those necessarily or fairly implied in or incident to the powers expressly granted; third, those essential to the declared objects and purposes of the corporation,—not simply convenient, but indispensable."

"The County having the power to purchase, hold and manage (which includes power of maintaining) property such as that comprised within the limits of Kapiolani Park, it is to be fairly implied therefrom that the County also has the power to maintain such property without purchasing and holding it, and therefore the second claim is also legal and valid.

"The judgment appealed from in each case is affirmed."

Attorney General Peters appeared for the Park Commissioners, and County Attorney Douthitt for the Auditor.

COURT NOTES.

Judge Dole yesterday entered an order discharging George K. Lowe, petitioner in bankruptcy.

Judge Weaver, of the land court, has entered a decree to the effect that Allen C. Robinson has come of age, and can therefore sign deeds to realty.

During the April term, the Circuit Court disposed of 96 criminal cases, of which 37 resulted in verdicts of guilty, 5 in acquittal, and 54 were not proscribed.

Chong You, a Chinaman accused of running a gambling game, was found guilty in Judge Derby's court yesterday, and fined \$250.

Judge Lindsay has assigned the matter of the Antone Rosa estate to Judge Robinson.

The case of Paris vs. Scott was argued and submitted in the Supreme Court yesterday morning.

Chas. F. Peterson has begun suit against Kahai Ahiena et al for \$682.60 which he alleges to be due him for professional services.

Judge Lindsay yesterday gave judgment for plaintiff in the suit of the Seattle Brewing and Malting Company against Treasurer Campbell for the recovery of a \$500 license fee and \$250 penalty thereon. The collection was made from the company as from a foreign corporation, which it claimed it was not.

W. C. Achi yesterday filed a petition for a writ of habeas corpus for a Japanese woman, by name Kiona Nakashima, the claim being that the woman is detained by a woman of the name of Hisano, who prevents her from going to live with her father.

LEADING CHINESE MERCHANT DEAD

One of the most prominent Chinese merchants in Honolulu, Lee Ahlo, died at his home in this city at 3:45 o'clock yesterday morning. Mr. Ahlo was born at Chong Lok, Canton, China, on the 23d of April, 1841, and came to Hawaii with others in 1865. He was the youngest child of Lee Fung Sem, a fortune-teller, and his wife Chong Shee, and although his parents were not in the poorest circumstances, he received no education. He came to Honolulu as a laborer and for seven years was cook for Mr. Lewers, of the firm of Lewers & Cooke. He was married on June 22, 1872, and for one year thereafter he worked for Marshal Parke.

In 1873 he started a small grocery store at the corner of Mauna Kea and King streets, and in 1876 moved his business to the corner of Nuuanu street and Chaplain Lane, doing a rice planting and general merchandising business. He continued in the business at that place up to the time of the Chinatown fire, since which time he has not been actively engaged in merchandising. His health began to fail during 1904.

He had three sons by his marriage, two of whom died, and the third, Anthony, who was educated in England. Mr. Ahlo also leaves one grandson. The funeral services will be held at 2:30 this afternoon from the Catholic Cathedral, and the interment will be in the King street cemetery.

UNLAWFULLY IMPRISONED

Victim of Police is Discharged on Habeas Corpus.

There was something of mystery connected with the habeas corpus case of Joseph Ford, who was released by Judge De Bolt yesterday on a petition presented by Ex-Judge Gear. Ford was employed on the Oceanic steamer Ventura, and was arrested it is said at the instance of the second officer of the ship. The compliance shown by the Honolulu police in making the arrest was most remarkable. There was no charge against Ford. The officers of the ship made none. The police had nothing, apparently, to hold the man on. He was marked on the police register, as "held for investigation."

When the Ventura passed through Honolulu on her last trip to the colonies, last Thursday night, the second officer of the vessel made a demand that Ford should be arrested. It does not appear that the officer preferred any charge. Certainly he did not get a warrant. Ford was then at his dinner. Later, when he had gone to his bunk, the second officer of the ship again asked that the man be taken into custody, and Ford was taken to jail, where he has been ever since, with no charge against him.

When the habeas corpus case was called yesterday, Police Captain Clark, John Kaaua and Deputy Sheriff Kalaikiela told of the arrest and detention of the man, but new nothing of why he was held. County Attorney Douthitt could say nothing on this showing, and Gear did not have to. Judge De Bolt at once entered an order discharging the man. It is said, in lame explanation of the affair, that the second officer of the Ventura intended to place a charge against Ford, but went away and forgot to do it.


