ECHOES FROM JUBILEE EDITION OF ADVERTISER

Our religious contemporary The Friend, which is now, we believe, in its 64th year, speaks thus generously of the Jubilee number of the Advertiser:

The Friend congratulates its big but younger brother, the Advertiser, upon its completion of fifty years of life. Honolulu is fortunate in the possession of a daily edited with such conspicuous ability. Fearless independent, public-spirited and devoted to the advocacy of the best things, the Advertiser is one of the most potent social forces in the community. That this force is wielded in the support of civic righteousness is most fortunate for our Territory. All may not agree with it all the time; there may be occasions when its outpoured vials of wrath burn and blister with a caustic severity seemingly beyond the need; but these are neglectable idiosyncrasies in the presence of the splendid civic virtue that is always on the watch for the public benefit, that constantly stirs citizens to the patriotism of faithful performance of duty, and that knows both how to handle the muck rake and reach out for the crown. After an experience of many years' reading acquaintance with dailies issued in Chicago, New York and Boston, calculating the handicap due to metropolitan conditions in those great centers and making the required allowance, it is our opinion that Honolulu has, in the Advertiser, a newspaper editorially of the first rank. Throughout the Russo-Japanese war the interpretations of cable statement and provisions made in its columns were not bettered anywhere in the Union, so far as our experience extended. Indeed Honoluluans were kept in better touch with the actual progress of events at the seat of war than vast numbers of mainlanders, who were treated to rumors and yellow news items mercifully withheld from the public here. In these early days, so critical for the upbuilding of Americanism in the mid-Pacific, in a Territory destined to be so vitally connected with Orient and Occident, holding a key position vastly out of proportion to its land area or possible commercial productiveness, Hawaii needs the best that can be had in every sphere of activity, if it is to achieve success in its great mission. The Friend is glad to believe that in the realm of the daily press the Territory has one of these best in the Advertiser.

"History, Prophecy and the Monuments." A book so entitled was issued some years ago and achieved a large sale. The Jubilee number of the Advertiser might well bear the same designation. Everything, past and present, concerning Hawaii is presented here in pleasing panorama and with remarkable accuracy, and even the future has not been neglected. The issue of 1906 is replete with good things. It has been a great undertaking to assemble this Cyclopaedia of Things Hawaiian, and the result is a conspicuous success. The matter herein collected is worthy of more permanent form. No one who wants to know about these Islands can afford to be without this informing compendium. Perhaps the best thing about the Fiftieth Anniversary number is that so much of it is of permanent value and is put so interestingly. One of the marked characteristics of Hawaii is the general readiness to cooperate in all large undertakings. FROM THE MAUI NEWS.

The Pacific Commercial Advertiser of Honolulu has commemorated its fiftieth anniversary by issuing a Jubilee number that is a credit to the pioneer paper in the Territory. On July second, 1856, that paper issued its first number and has continued to grow in size and influence until today it stands at the head of journalism in the Territory.

Many are the changes noted by the paper since that day. At that time Honolulu was a little village, hardly known on the map, and those who have figured so prominently in the development of the islands were but children.

The industries that have made the islands what they are, were but dreams at that time and have all been brought to prominence since the little paper began its career.

That this paper has had much to do with molding the thought of the community during the past fifty years cannot be denied, and that much is due to its help must be conceded.
