REPUBLICAN CONFERENCE

Talking Over Matters of Organization and Detail.

There was a meeting of the presidents and secretaries of the Fourth District Precinct Clubs with the members of the Fourth District County Committee last night. The object of the gathering was the settlement of the question relative to the selection of the three additional members of the County Committee, as agreed upon at a previous meeting.

Col. Ziegler presided and Secretary Buffandeau officiated at the minutes' book.

J. H. Boyd reported that a committee from the Fourth and Fifth had met the executive committee to the Central Committee. The Fifth District Committee of six had conceded three additional committeemen, the new members to have no vote until the question is finally decided by the Central Committee.

The chair said that these committeemen would have seats in the Fourth District Committee and would vote with them. J. H. Boyd made that as a motion and it carried. The chair called for nominations of the new members of the committee under the decision arrived at. W. F. Drake, C. L. Crabbe and H. J. Johnston were named and the secretary was instructed to cast a ballot for them.

The chair said an important matter is the provision of ways and means for securing the registration of voters.

Mr. Boyd said they were doing all they could in his precinct but as a member of both County and Executive Committees he could do no more than he had. He had one man out under pay. The club as an organization was doing nothing.

Mr. Buffandeau, from the Second, said there were 182 registered out of 230 in his precinct. Said money would be required to pay the men who are now volunteers.

Mr. Booth was informed that voters would have to appear before the Board—registration could not be done by proxy.

Geo. A. Davis from the Third Precinct said maps were in course of preparation and a general canvass of the entire precinct would be made.

Charles Hustace and Charles Coster from the Fourth and Fifth said work would begin on Monday. Sam Johnson from the Sixth said he was waiting to learn of a system to work on. E. W. Quinn and Clarence Crabbe from the Seventh and Eighth replied to the same effect. Chas. Booth said many had registered in his precinct but others were waiting the return of the Registration Board. When he procured maps he would get busy. The Tenth was not represented.

E. W. Quinn was asked for suggestions, as an "old war horse" relative to a plan of campaign. His reply was in the form of a recommendation that the Board sit all day during the last eight days of the term of registration.

The chair suggested that a committee of candidates wait on the Board and arrange for the sessions.

A. V. Gear was called upon to speak. He replied that the committee was doing everything possible but he thought it would be well for the candidates to meet the committee and draw up a plan of campaign. Believed the suggestion relative to longer sessions a good one. There are many who are showing indifference and others who do not find it convenient to get registered during the present hours.

Charles Hustace when called upon responded with a package of advice relative to the work of this committee in conjunction with the County Committee. "This one is subordinate to that one and it must be so understood," he remarked. He demanded that the County Committee be recognized to the fullest extent, that was what he had always fought for and what he wanted.

A. D. Castro said there was work to be done by the precinct clubs, it was not all to be put upon this committee. Much could be done by the harmonious action in the precincts, the members should get together and work together.

The chair called upon all of the members to be present at the meeting tonight, which would be for the purpose of completing the organization.

Geo. A. Davis gave out a lot of good ideas when he said the suggestion of Mr. Gear that the candidates meet the committee is a good one. "There is a lot of talk about knifing, and if the ticket is knifed it will be due to the negligence of the candidates." He was present, he said at the organization of the Republican party in this Territory in the old drilled, and while he had not attended the meetings of the present committee, he had taken a deep interest in the affairs from the outside. He believed the ticket nominated in the convention the other day to be one of the best the party had ever selected, and he did not believe it could be improved upon. It must not go down to defeat, and if it did it could be traced to the candidates, who had neglected to work among their friends. They could do more to bring the people into line than anyone else. It may be necessary before the time to vote comes, to whip the voters into line; the committee may have to engage a whip for this purpose, as is done in the East. He said he was present only by proxy and might not attend another meeting, but he proposed to work in his precinct, where they would make a personal canvass.

In an informal talk, the matter of maps, the mixing up of the precincts and kindred matters were discussed. Everything was considered except the deplorable condition of Beretania avenue on the Waikiki side of Pensacola, but that will be fixed up before election if the kickers' kicks are forcible enough.

The meeting adjourned after the chair had impressed the members to be on hand tonight.

GREAT GATHERING OF YOUNG PEOPLE

The quarterly rally of the young people's societies at Central Union church last night was a fine success. There were fully three hundred present, representing almost all the churches in the city. On the platform were Rev. G. D. Edwards of the Christian church; Rev. Dr. Heber Jones of Korea, acting pastor of the First M. E. church; Paul Super, secretary of Y. M. C. A.; the Hon. M. K. Nakuina, and Mr. Wong Hin, secretary of the union. The president of the union, Mr. Peter E. Tosh, presided. In answer to the roll call each society responded by rising in a body and repeating together a verse of scripture. The Christian Endeavor Society of Kakaako Mission was well represented, although members of the union and the Epworth League of the Episcopal church were present as members of the union for the first time and made a fine showing.

The first address was by Mr. Paul Super. It was practical, clear and straightforward, the manly utterance of a manly man. The last address was by Dr. Heber Jones and rang as a clarion, clear and strong, inciting to higher motives and loftier purposes in the investment of our lives. The speaker showed with precision and sound logic that "Nothing that altogether dies suffices man's just destiny," and that honor and shame are not attached to any condition, but depend on the acting well or ill our part, whatever that may be.

A specially pleasing feature of the meeting was the singing of the young ladies of Kawatahao Seminary and the boys of the Kamehameha School.

The banners for attendance were awarded to the Portuguese C. E. Society and the Junier Society of Japanese Makiki C. E. Society.

The young people of the city are to be congratulated on this most successful inauguration of the fall work. The large attendance, the exceptional character of the addresses and the fine singing made it a notable occasion and promises great things for the future meetings.
